

# It's that Time Again... Turn Clocks Forward & File Tax Returns & Clean Out Closets Renew your Membership!

The current membership year will be ending on April 30, 2009 and if you don't have a multi-year membership, it is time to renew. By renewing before May 31st, you can receive a \$5.00 discount off your single-year membership. Or, you may choose a multi-year membership (3 or 5 year), receive a discount AND avoid having to go through this every year!

No need to wait until the last minute—you can renew online right now!

Go to www.spacecityskiclub.org and click on the "My SCSC" tab.

- 1. Log in with your Username and Password. The light blue print above "Here are your member-only features" verifies your membership expiration date.
- 2. Click on "Update My Membership Profile" and check all information for accuracy, including your e-mail address. Save any changes.
- 3. Click on the "Click here to renew your SCSC membership online..." link. Decide if you want a single year membership (through 4/10) or a multi-year membership.
- 4. Proceed through PayPal to complete your payment. It's secure, it's free and you don't have to have a PayPal account just a major credit card or checking account.

#### Don't have a SCSC online account?

Click on the "My SCSC" tab and then click on the "SCSC members may request an account here" link. You will need your member number which can be found on a Sitzmarke label. Alternatively, you may e-mail the VP of membership at <u>vpmembership@spacecityskiclub.org</u> and request your member number. After you submit the information requested, the system will email your Username and Password to the email address on record within a day. Check your spam or bulk folders as many email providers intercept these system messages and tag them as "junk".

#### Have an SCSC on-line account but forgot your Username and Password?

Click on the "My SCSC" tab and then click on the "Lost Your Password?" link. Enter your Username, member number or email address of record. The system will email your Username and Password to the email address on record within a day. Check your spam or bulk folders as many email providers intercept these system messages and tag them as junk.

You might consider using the "Change Password" feature after you sign on, to alter your password to one that is more convenient to remember.

Alternatively, you can always set up your account again, as if it is a new one, and the system will provide you with your original Password.

Having trouble with PayPal? You're not alone!

To avoid problems with PayPal, you must have your computer settings set correctly. According to our friends at PayPal, if you follow these instructions, you should be good to go:

While in your browser, go to

TOOLS =>INTERNET OPTIONS

Click on the ADVANCED Tab and scroll down to the bottom of the list to ensure the "Use SSL 2.0", "Use SSL 3.0", and "Use TSL 1.0" boxes are all checked Click on the PRIVACY Tab and ensure the level is set at Medium or lower Click on the SECURITY Tab and click on the "Trusted Sites" icon. Add https:\\\*.PayPal.com to the list Click on the GENERAL Tab and check to delete the cookies in the Temporary Internet Files REBOOT

Did you get the "Your session has timed out" message when trying to complete the PayPal process? Don't worry - it's just a browser cookie setting. Go back to the payment page. Below the PayPal button there is a link to a help page to get that all straight.

Memberships can also be renewed by downloading an application (click on the Membership tab) or at any General Meeting or Happy Hour—just see Nancy Schultz at the membership table.
