



This is absolutely unbelievable, but there is still space on *Crested Butte*, March 2 - 7. Anyone just joining the club or those of you who put off your 1999 ski decision until the last moment are truly in luck, but I'm sure this opportunity wont last, so get on the phone and call Louella before this gem of a trip fills up. For five dollars your name and number will be placed on a list used by TC's in the last week before a trip when unexpected vacancies occur. You will discuss trip price directly with the trip participant canceling. Right now there are only 5 people on this list, so your chances of being

called are very good.

Ski trip planning is somewhat cyclical. As this year's planning winds down, several of us are already thinking ahead to the 1999 - 2000 ski season (that is if we make it past Y2K). Planning has been a lot of fun, but it wouldn't have been possible if it wasn't for the dedicated work of the DOT's, TC's and ATC's. Several of this year's ATC's will probably utilize there newly learned skills to run trips next year, however, to avoid allowing one group of people to have too much fun we will be needing a whole new group of innovative volunteer's to help with next year's ski season. If you're curious as to just how much fun this is, just approach one of this year's TC's or ATC's (maybe the week before their trip isn't the best time to do this!) and ask what is involved in running a ski trip. Or just observe on the trip how much fun they're having. Seriously, the best way to really enjoy being part of the club is to help run a trip. The next few months your Sitzmarke and meetings will have!!! Get Involved!!! forms for you to use in volunteering to run or assist in running a trip next year. Please feel free to ask any of us about the volunteer opportunity and consider filling out a form to be part of next year's ski planning team

In closing I just want to reiterate that we are having a spectacular ski season. If you don't ski this year, it's entirely your fault, because the opportunities have been virtually endless. Thanks again to everyone involved, this is a volunteer organization and

volunteers have made this a great ski planning experience. Until next month, Happy skiing!
