It's the dedication of our volunteers that makes this club great!!! Have a Happy St. Patrick's Day and remember to THINK SNOW!!



Further, a candidate you has successfully completed running club activity prior to applying for a ski trip leader position increases his/her chances of being appointed to a trip coordinator position.


***Application for trip coordinators are taken by the incoming VP of Trips in March & April of each year for recommendation to, and approval by, the Executive Committee. This process is completed a the May Executive Committee Meeting held within the first 10-14 days of May.

***Current officers & Directors of Trips are ineligible to serve as Trip Coordinators and/or assistant Trip Coordinators (Standing Rule 10.3.A).

***An ATC does not automatically become a TC the following year; they must reapply and go through the approval process again. Further, TCs generally are not permitted to repeat the following year in the same capacity.
