some special pampering at The Peaks.



SCSC Shredder "Wanna-Be's"???

A fellow SCSC member (and I won't mention his last name is AMY), who kindly gave me a "dirtbag" shirt a few years back, has now decided that this is the year he wants to try boarding. So, he asked me if I'd give him some pointers in Montana. Now, knowing this guy as I do, I wouldn't be surprised if he hasn't already started practicing his smooth womanizing lines for all of us ladies on the trip. But, on the outside chance that he and Rodney H. and a few others could really be serious, I thought I might offer a few tips to all who may be planning to clandestinely sneak off to learn to board - thus saving public humiliation - since club members can be unmerciful upon "yardsale" and "face plant" mishaps - ending up with the victim of the snowsnake attacks having to buy the beer to silence all witnesses.

My first words are a disclaimer. I ain't no expert and still spend a lot of time on my rear - but hopefully, I can give you a few hints that will make you forever grateful - and appreciative - perhaps if you see me at the bar or at other opportune moments, etc. etc.

Do not plan to board on your trip without packing a few ESSENTIAL items. If you are a rollerblader, you already have the knee pads and wrist guards that you should always wear when boarding. The majority of areas do not have these protectors available, and if they do, you pay a premium and have few choices with brands or sizes. I did not use pads the first time I tried boarding, and my knees paid a BIG price. You will really thank me for this advice! Wrist injuries are probably the most common injuries for boarders, and wrist guards can prevent serious sprains. Instinctively, a boarder will use the hands/ arms to brace for a fall, and you need those guards! Remember, your feet are locked into your bindings, and they do not release like skis, so your arms and hands get a workout. Most boarders remove the front plate, which allows you to wear your gloves over the guards.

Now, rear padding also helps - whether natural or added. I understand **Dale A.** and **Tom H.** used "bubble" packing material at Jackson Hole - which probably worked - but looked a little strange. (Oh well, we have a reputation to uphold wherever we

go.) Anyway, rollerbladers can now purchase guards to protect their tailbones, so if Mother Nature was not as generous to you as to some of us, you might want to include this added protection.

Before you decide to try boarding, think about the snow conditions. If the snow is not good for skiing, don't decide to spend the day trying to learn to board. (I stole this advice from Angie W. in Sun Valley a few years back.) You want SOFT, FLUFFY snow. It is much kinder on the body, and gives you traction. Remember this saying: "A price for ice!"

A lot of areas have special packages for beginners - saving money on tickets, lessons, and equipment - so check it out before you pay. Rental shops are pretty good about fitting you with the right board for your height, weight, and ability. On days when crowds are expected, you should reserve a board in advance to ensure you have one suited to your size and needs. (Or support our local retailers and really get good service!) If you are comfortable with your left foot in front, you are "regular." If you board with the right foot in front, you are "goofy." If you are unsure which leg to have in front, stand with your legs together and have someone (you trust) gently push you forward. Whichever foot you place in front to catch yourself is the foot to try forward. You can always experiment and try both ways. Experience on skateboards is a real plus. But regardless, be sure to take a lesson before you start. You will save yourself a lot of down time - and I mean down time. Because learning is very visual , if you are "goofy" try to have an instructor who is also "goofy" or if you have your left foot in front, have an instructor who is regular. It is much easier to learn when you can mimic the instructor's maneuvers. As a beginner, it makes it more difficult to translate their movements and understand weight shifts when you face opposite directions going down the slopes.

Last year my real high was when a teenage guy asked ME for a few tips and lessons on the slopes. This gave me an immediate attitude which was great until reality set in on my next flop. However, now when I go down, I have perfected the art of faking a rest stop - since boarders can only rest when sitting. (You learn that real

quickly.) Anyway, by the end of the day, I am sure my teenage prodigy was zooming by me, but then when you are that age you're invincible - and everything heals faster, you need an good excuse to skip



school, Dad pays the bills, and Mom takes you to the doctor and waits on you as you relax in bed with the TV blaring and compassionate friends visiting over the next few weeks. Ask **Harry G.** if he forgot he was not 16 when he did BLACK last year at Breckenridge on his first day out for the season and then had to cuddle crutches for the next month or so. It helps if you practice saying "First GREEN, then BLUE, then maybe BLACK - in that order. Repeat after me: GREEN, BLUE, BLACK. GREEN, BLUE, BLACK (or light gray).

Courtesy mandates that you never ask a first time snowboarder if they had a fun day. Even the best of friends will receive a dirty look or that fond finger sign. And don't plan to learn when you have a heavy evening planned - the spirit may be willing, but the body protests big time - although I witnessed **Scott P.** do his best after a hard earned day.

The word is out that **Ray D.** is getting around pretty good now, and **Big John C.** is getting to be a "hot shot" although he has hugged a few trees (*I said trees*) along the way.

It has been stated by an SCSC member that all new snowboarders should be required to wear "orange" attire (with skull & crossbones insignia) as a warning to everyone on the slopes to beware.

Even if you choose not to board, do remember, new boarders are just like new skiers. They want control - but it takes practice, so be understanding. As a precaution, please note that a boarder has a blind side (we need rear view mirrors) - so when approaching their back side - be careful! Also on the lift, a boarder has one foot in the binding and one foot out - and is doing a "balancing" act when unloading. The kids make it look so easy - but it is not! It is always a good idea to quickly move out of the way after unloading, but really important if you have inexperienced boarders behind you. Talkers make unfortunate bowling pins! I am always so grateful if I don't fall. You know you might be in trouble when you start negotiating who is going to be on top before you get off!!! (Did I say that right?)

The good news is that boarding is like biking - once you grasp the balancing - it is grins. The maneuverability is soo much fun!! It is a whole new form of freedom on the slopes - forward/sideways/backwards, etc. You even get credit for "tricks" you weren't trying to do. They say boarding is easier to learn than skiing. If you just get past that first learning curve, you will have a ball. Trying to understand all the lingo is really the hard part. And, the good news is that you only have to look after "one" board - not two skis and two poles!

Now I understand the average age of boarders has greatly increased over the past few years. I have even endured the remarks of SCSC "friends" commenting how I single-handedly skewed that average. I don't think so. We have enough members in the club entering their second, third and fourth childhood and elsewhere around the country to have lent me a hand.

Well, hope my tips help those adventurous souls. If you can't beat 'um, join 'um. People will always be wanting to try new "toys." Next thing you know, we'll all be racing down Nastar on shoe skates or sleds!!
