This goes to show that every year a new generation of members takes control of SCSC; that it's not the same group of old timers.

The usual route to become an officer is to go on ski trips and become involved in activities for a couple of years. Then you run an activity or two, then become an Assistant Trip Coordinator. Becoming a Trip Coordinator the next year is usual. After this your choices go to either running for your favorite office or getting an appointed position like Director of Trips, Assistant Treasurer, or Auditor. If you have the inclination and the ability to commit the next 5 years of your life, the presidency is another step.

What I am trying to show, is that most of this year's and next year's officers made a decision 2 to 3 years ago that they were going to get more involved in the Club and in most cases decided they wanted to be an officer. All it takes is a little work and effort and you will be the next generation running Space City. We need you! Without members stepping up, getting the training and running for office, the Club would fall apart. Each year we seem to have about 10 or 12 people run for 7 offices. With well over 1000 members in the club, we should be able to have twice as many running each year. We have been fortunate to have so many super candidates run each year, but there have been years where we have had to have old officers step up and fill positions due to lack of candidates. I want to encourage all members, even you new ones, to start planning your future. Volunteer to run activities and ski trips. Find out what it takes to run this Club and become part of it. If you have any questions on what is needed for a particular office, on being a Trip Coordinator, or Activity Coordinator, ask any officer or former officer. Remember, Space City needs volunteers.






Slalom Scoop
