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


Afraid the trip of your choice has been filled?? Not to worry!!! The best deal in town is SCSC's trip WAIT LIST. Why is this such a great deal??? Well, simply put, there is absolutely NO RISK!!! Your deposit check is held by the TC until you elect to join the trip and, until then, your deposit check is totally returnable. When an open spot becomes available, the TC contacts you and, at this time, you choose to accept or decline the open spot. Totally your option!! Once you accept a place on a trip, then your check will be deposited and all standard SCSC cancellation policies apply. If you decline, your name goes to the bottom of the list for the next round or you may request to have your deposit check returned. And, ask around....the WAIT LIST is a super way of signing up for a trip!! Unfortunately, plans sometimes change and folks simply cannot go on the trip they originally signed up for. The WAIT LIST insures that you get a chance at the opening!! The first trip I went on with SCSC was after I cleared a Trip Wait List. So, I know first hand that they work!

A BIG THANK YOU goes out to our hard working DOTs, TCs & ATCs. While many of us have just been trying to just stay cool this summer, they are continuing their efforts to bring us SUPER TRIPS at SUPER VALUES!! Last month the gremlins somehow found their way into my trip list, but the SUPER DOTS, TCs and ATCs were kind in their messages to point out my oversights and errors. I don't care how many times I?ve looked at this list, there is always something that seems to miss my attention. My apologies for the errors!!! The BEST ADVICE I can give is to contact the TCs & ATCs for the latest and accurate details on the trip of your choice.




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V. P. PROGRAMS

Satisfy your craving for delicious turkey dinner and great skiing in one spot. Join us for the TSC Fall Roundup in Breckenridge over the Thanksgiving weekend.

We'll depart IAH after work on Tuesday.

November 25, for Breckenridge via Colorado Springs. After a 2° hour bus trip, we'll arrive at the 2 bedroom/2 bath condos at Beaver Run Resort. This is a perfect ski-in/ski-out location with access to both the Beaver Run Super Chair and Quicksilver Quad chairlifts. Each condo has a ski locker close to the slopes. Beaver Run Resort has an indoor/outdoor heated pool (with bar), and 8 hot tubs. Other amenities include: 24 hour deli, small convenience/grocery store, huge game room with miniature golf, and several restaurants and bars (daily \$ drink specials). All buildings are connected by elevated, enclosed walkways.

Your first morning (Wednesday) in Breckenridge will feature lift ticket pickup and breakfast served by your smiling (but tired) TC and ATC. Free beer is available at the Wednesday and Saturday events. If this is not enough, take the private shuttle or free town trolley from Beaver Run and visit all the shops, restaurants and bars awaiting you in town.

Breckenridge is the second most popular ski resort in the US. The ski mountain today encompasses four distinct mountains and serves up more than 2000 acres of skiable terrain serviced by 19 lifts and 138 trails. There is snow making on hundreds of acres to compensate for whatever shortcomings Mother Nature might have. Your lift ticket is good for Breckenridge, Vail, Keystone and Copper mountains. Skiing a different mountain each of your four ski days is possible. An optional day trip to Vail is planned for Thursday. TSC club races will be conducted on Friday and individual races will be held on Saturday.



G'Day, Mate. Don't miss out on the plans for skiing New Zealand and a bonus visit to Australia! Here's the facts we've been waiting for!!

Town: Queenstown is on the South Island, with a 10,000

population on Lake Wakatipu. Tucked into a valley in the "Remarkables Mountains" range, Queenstown is the most popular Alpine Resort in New Zealand. Plus, SCSC has an easy walk from our central hotel to everything in town.

Hotel: The Park Royal Queenstown is a 4 star luxury hotel in the heart of the shopping & restaurant area. We have a hotel sauna and each double room has its own balcony with a gorgeous view of the lake across the street and the nearby snow-capped mountains.

Skiing: 10 to 30 minute free bus ride to 3 ski hills: The Remarkables, Coronet Peak, & Cardrona.

Renting: \$45 for 3 days; \$65 for 6 days.

<u>Lift Tickets</u>: About \$30/day. Cheaper for larger groups and multi-days.

Snow: July is winter in the Down Under!! On Aug. 1/97 Coronet Peak had all lifts running and a trail base of 1° to 3 feet.

<u>Climate:</u> Winter temperatures in Queenstown are 40-50 degree F (downtown) and just below freezing up in the mountains. So bring your knitted gear while you are in NZ.

<u>Price:</u> Airfare, hotels, parties, and all ground transport for one week at \$1,731. Price will decrease if airfare to Los Angeles is reduced. Down payment is \$300 (the usual \$30 cancellation before final payment date). Mid payment (\$300) on Feb. 15/98. Final Payment for all the rest, including the full payment on all add-on trips, rentals, and lift tickets, is April 13,1998. Anyone not paid in full by April 13, 1998 will be replaced by the Waiting List.

<u>Land Package</u>: Make your own way to L.A. and save \$300, but you still need to fly with the group from there. We don't know the exact L.A. departure and arrival times yet.

Options: While we are in Queenstown, NZ, if you want more than just ski every day, we'll try various one-day group trips, at extra cost (based on group interests), for heliskiing, river canyon jetboating (Shotover Gorge), Skippers Bridge bungy jumping (229' leap where it all began), & Lake Wakatipu paddle wheeler cruise. Shopping and an in-town Gondola rides are always available on your own.

Add-on trips: At the start or end of the trip, or both. Add on a week in Australia with 3 nights in Sydney and 3 nights in Cairns. In Sydney we'll be staying next to the Opera House and walking distance to most downtown sights and harbor ferries. Cairns is in a beautiful tropical rain forest area and HOT all year round! This is in northern Australia on the Great Barrier Reef

where the water temperature in July is 83F. The Sidney and Cairns package (\$850) includes all airfare, 4 star hotels, a bus tour and harbor tour of Sydney, along with a boat tourto the Great Barrier Reef for snorkeling. SCUBA is also available for a small extra fee. Or do Sydney only for 3 nights (\$525).

Other Add-on trips: At the start or end of the trip, add on 2 extra days in Queenstown (\$275), or at the end of the trip only, add on 3 nights/4 days at a beach resort in the tropical Cook Islands at Raratonga (\$390). If you can afford the time, add on a trip to the before the skiing week and add on another one after!

<u>Parties:</u> This is a TSC trip, and most of our Texas ski clubs will be in Queenstown at the same time. There will be at least 3 parties "catered" for us during the week

Marsha Lutz and Gene Soo broke-in brand new bikes.


Along the way Marsha Lutz and Steven Teoh picked up a little road rash.
