

HOT SUMMER ... HOTTER SKI DEALS!!!

As I write this it's hard to imagine that time to sign up for ski season is NOW! Sure it's (September as you read thisAugust as I write), ...but it's time to dig deep for that <u>El Depositito</u> for your trip. More on that later, but first an update on mail in sign-up. If you are reading this and getting ready to go to the nearest mail box for sign-up..... well it's a little late. Entries for the sign up are closed. I wish I could update you on the sign-up but this is written prior to the first day of sign-up.

New this year!! I will try and update the Trip List's Status/Wait list column (page 5) as late as possible for inclusion in the current <u>Sitzmarke</u>. The Trip List details will be current as of the date shown on the Trip List; however, even as of the posted date, the info could be as much as two weeks old.

So, if you still have cash to put on those trips, hustle over to the NEW MEETING LOCATION. Where you ask? WHY, AT THE HOLIDAY INN SELECT, —— SOUTHWEST FREEWAY. How much cash? Only a \$100 will hold you a place on any of the trips except Italy. Deposit for this one is \$300 (sorry no lire accepted yet). The deposits are partially refundable in accordance with club rules, tide tables, and availability of Jimmy Buffet concert tickets! Further details can be had, just for the asking. Find any of our outstanding TC'S or ATC'S for explicit information. O.K. so you mailed in your deposit. Now what? Stop by the trip table and get an update from the trip's leaders. Even though the cold war has ended and the Olympics are fin for a few more years, BIG CHANGES ARE EXPECTED!!! Read on for details.

But first, If you haven't signed up for a trip, the September meeting is your chance to see all the trips displayed and **pick a 96-97 ski vacation**. Even if you're just wondering about what's available, this is the ideal opportunity to get answers to all those questions from our top-notch TC'S and ATC'S. What happens if you get there and the trip you've been dreaming about has filled? Well, just ask around and you'll find out about getting on a WAIT LIST. What's a wait list? It is just about the <u>best deal</u> you can find. A wait list allows you to be called when a position on the trip opens up, with no risk! Your check is held by the TC <u>until you elect to join the trip</u>. Your deposit is *fully refundable*, until you join the trip. The TC will notify you when an open spot is available. At this time, you may *accept or decline*It's your option. If you decline, your name goes to the bottom of the list for the next round, or you may request that your deposit is returned. You can drop from the wait list at any time, no penalties. If you accept a place on the trip, of course all standard SCSC cancellation policies apply and your wait list deposit will be deposited at this time.

This season we have been able to secure lower air prices for a majority of the trips. There are many reasons for this and one of the reasons was the airline tax or better yet, lack of the tax. Last year a 10% tax on the value of each airline ticket expired January first. Reenactment of this tax will probably occur in the next week or two. This means a price increase of approximately \$16 to \$35 per trip. The trips incurring the costs at the upper end will be; Snowmass 1 & 3, Jackson Hole, Telluride, Montreal, and Sugarloaf. However, we are unsure of the details and the tax could expire year end. More as the news breaks.

Threat of a price increase just makes those land packages look better all the time! While on the subject of **land packages**, there is <u>limited space</u> on the flights and we <u>do not</u> anticipate adding more. If you are planning to use frequent flyer bonuses to travel with the club, be sure to secure your space early. As soon as you have your itinerary, **give your TC all the details** with the scheduled times and flights.







Bulk Mail Woes

Major Postal Service bulk mail changes took effect July 1. Since the July <u>Sitzmarke</u> was mailed prior to July 1, the Postal changes were not obvious. But what a difference a month makes!

By now, if you live in zip code prefix 773, 774, or 775, you are painfully aware of the delay between the time 770 zip code prefix members received their <u>Sitzmarke</u> and when you received yours. This column is an attempt to explain the new bulk rate rules and how the membership card insertions compounded the problem. (SCSC's printer explained the rules to me; when I called the Post Office, the mailing specialist didn't know the details and needed time to research them. I'm still waiting for that return phone call.)

To qualify for bulk rates, there must be at least 200 pieces of identical mail (same weight) which are bundled and marked to exacting standards.

So what does this mean in August <u>Sitzmarke</u> terms? When the membership cards were inserted, this changed the weight per item, giving two weight groups; those with one membership card enclosed and the another group with two cards enclosed. Then these two groups were further subdivided by zip code prefix. Prefix 770 is the largest bundle so it passes the minimum count and was routed through the Downtown Post office for delivery to your neighborhood Post Office. Prefixes 773, 774, and 775 are then grouped together and *if* the count is greater than 200, the bundle is sent to the North Houston Post Office (Conroe) for redistribution to your neighborhood Post Office. *If* this bundle has less than 200 items, the bundle is sent to Fort Worth for redistribution to your neighborhood Post Office. Fort Worth? Hard to believe, but true.

You guessed it. Prefix 773, 774, and 775 zip code bundles made a visit to Fort Worth before being routed to your neighborhood Post Office. Your Post Office then controls when bulk rate mail is delivered to your home. There are <u>no time requirements</u> for bulk mail delivery; it's at the discretion of your neighborhood Post Office and your mail carrier.

Future <u>Sitz</u> delivery should not be delayed any more than usual as the 200 minimum per bundle (weight and zip code) will be met, thus bypassing the Fort Worth leg of the delivery process. Should the mailing specialist return my call, I have one more question. Why do I always get the Tuesday grocery ads on time, without fail, but my <u>Sitzmarke</u> is a week late? Second thought, maybe I shouldn't ask - I may never get my <u>Sitz</u> delivered again.
