



SKI POINTER

If you've been away from the slopes for a while and are wondering how to bring back the magic of turning, here's a simple mental cue to use: Imagine your big toes controlling the skies.


To turn right, roll and press your left big toe up and around (Fig. A). To turn left, roll your right big toe left.

Whether you're skiing parallel or in a wedge, these big-toe turns work. Left big toe to turn right, right big toe to turn left.

Once you begin a turn with either big toe, make sure that you continue pressing and guiding the ski until it's turned uphill enough to slow you down (Fig. B).

As you descend the hill, direct your skis from one big toe to the other. Remember: Your toe tells your skis where to go.



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



The SCSC contingency has just re-turned from Vail with the second place trophy in hand! This is quite an improvement over our last-place disaster at Keystone in November. The results are as follows:

Lone Star 4272 pts. (3473) SCSC 2854 pts. (2854) Los Amigos 1996 pts. (1901) Clear Lake 817 pts. (380)

I'm glad to see that we made a good showing in this event after that

dismal performance on our last TSC event. Of the 90 racers who ran the course, 4 won gold medals, 26 captured silver and 19 garnered bronze; not a bad day by any standard even if we missed first place by 1418 adjusted points. In the Individual Races, Senior Division, Cheryl Houge was the fastest of all women TSC contenders while George Hirasaki took second place honors in the men's Senior

Our Trip Race Director, Gary Sequeira, Randy Hassebrock and Steve Benson deserve a hardy slap on the back for their time and management skills before and during this contest.

1993 - 1994: A MIGHTY FINE YEAR

Did you know that we have five racers who are members of the State BUDWEISER CHALLENGE ALL-STARS? They are: Kayleen Kill, Lotty Gautschi, Karl Gautschi, Harry Gaston, and Alex Potter. Skiers were ranked in one of six age groups, based ontheir single best handicap of the 1993-94 season. I dare not reveal which age bracket each is attached to. You'll have to find that out for yourselves.



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
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SCSC HALLOWEEN PARTY

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
