Most openings occur at or just before the final payment date, so you need to be prepared for a nearly immediate payment. FYI: If you find you have some time available just before a trip is scheduled to leave, call the TC, there are often last minute openings that are hard to fill.

Your response to our schedule was great, and I hope you've told all your friends about the great trips we have planned. Our club thrives on new members, while making it vibrant, the fresh ideas add to our strength. Bring a friend to the next meeting or happy hour and talk to VP of Membership, Ted Bergeron, about signing them up. I'll see you at the next meeting or maybe on the slopes.







Shotokan Tigers Karate Club Dion Easton, Chief Instructor The Texas Ski Council met for its Quarterly Delegate Meeting in Austin on August 12, 1995, with all Clubs represented except Ski Jammers. If an award were in place for best representation it would have been given to SCSC. In addition to your TSC Representatives, myself and Kayleen Kill, also attending this meeting were President, Marti Toomer; V.P. Trips, Merrel Smith and V.P. Publications, Gary Butler. Other members there in their official roles were TSC President, Jerry Montgomery; V.P. Fall Roundup, Debbie Bergeron and TSC Race Committee Chair, Ted Bergeron.

Many reports/decisions were made at this meeting starting off with TSC Treasurer, Laura Kuchcinski, reviewing the 1994/95 year end figures and distributing the Audit Committee report from **Sharon Inman** and Mark Brown. The Officer Training Meeting held in Dallas on July 15th was reported a success with 30 people participating (7 SCSC members attended the training).

Proposed changes to Standing Rules, Bylaws and Race Rules were presented to and voted on by the Delegates. The following is a brief synopsis of the outcome: Clubs will no longer be penalized for taking more participants than originally reported; Small club participation requirements have been amended; TSC Board of Directors will no longer have a vote on trip destinations. Changes to race rules were minor, mostly housekeeping, however a new rule has been implemented. The TSC VP now has the option to choose race starting times for all TSC Officers and appointed personnel who are assisting with the races.

Speaking of races, beginning with the 1995/96 ski season the TSC will allow snowboarders to race Nastar. No revisions will be made to Race Rules as there is currently nothing in the eligibility section to prevent snowboarders from participating at areas that allow them. Guidelines established by Nastar will be followed.

The 1994/95 Ski Season Marketing Survey presented by V.P. Marketing, Bill Sneed, showed that TSC Clubs generated almost \$3 million in revenue to resorts, lodgings and transportation. Report also indicated number of skiers was less than last year, however skier days had increased. There was discussion of Bid Procedures and announcement again of Clubs that will provide members to the 1996/97 Pre-Select Committee; Flatlanders, Lone Star, Los Amigos and Ski Jammers. A committee has been formed to research the feasibility of resorts submitting two (2) year bids. This committee will be chaired by Gary Kuchcinski and members are Diane McClendon, Tere Ayson and Charles Rowland.

MOISTURE NEEDED IN THE FACE OF ALL THAT SNOW

Arid conditions in the Rockies are a blessing for ski snow and a villain for ski vacationers. Packed snow can dry out and fluff up overnight after a grooming that exposes more surface area. Snow falls soft and powdery when it is dry, which makes it easier to maneuver in (and it will not stick as much to your boots, either).

The same arid air can suck water we need right out of our skin, nails, hair, respiratory passages and eyes. Forced air heat takes even more moisture out of indoor air. Results are cracked skin, split ends and nails, breathing disturbances and increased risk of infections.

Once we know what is wrong, we can take corrective action. Hotels and condos should have a cool-mist humidifier that runs all night in the bedroom. Cool mist encourages restful sleep. Open the window to let in cool air and moisture as well as oxygen.

Pack your most emollient moisturizer (creams are better then lotions). Lips need frequent applications of lip balm. Do not lick your lips or put water on them; that dries them out more and promotes chapping.

Apply moisturizers not just after bathing, but as often as possible. Before bed and skiing are other opportunities, or during changes of clothing. It is tempting to leave extras at home, but moisturizers should be considered as essentials. These can include moisturizing sterile saline eye drops and nasal sprays. They have a remarkable healing effect for red and itchy eyes and nose.

Drink as much water as you can to provide a moisture source from within and to replenish all that water evaporating from the body. The recommended daily water intake at home is about two quarts. The combination of the dry climate and increased activity may bring your daily water needs up to five or even ten quarts per day.

Of course, before you know it, you will be home again to face humid spring, summer and fall in Houston. We cannot have it all. All at once, that is.

picture you get an enlarged view of the area. If the resort has their own Web Site a connection will also be provided.

Another option within the Weather Cam menu is access to a U.S. Weather Map. If you click on a part of the country within the U.S. map, the nearest weather service forecast for the next five days is shown. When I click on Colorado the weather out of Denver is displayed.


