The Hunt for Redfish Sail was a blast! Thank you, RON BRANDON for coordinating a fun time for all.



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
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Spring Tennis Tournament

"A" and "B" brackets were set up by players evaluating their tennis skills using the USTA Tennis Skill Level Evaluation for 1.0 (Beginner) to 5.0 (Near Expert). This evaluation goes to 7.0 and interesting enough no one in SCSC said they were 7.0. For the men, everyone who evaluated themselves 4.0 or higher were in "A's". Below 4.0 ratings were in "B" class. Martin Matras wants to reclassify himself to get out of "A" bracket. That was an even split of the men. For the women, it was the same arrangement with the exception of two 3.5 women who played in the "A" bracket. Those two women had played "A" before.

The best competition was in the "B" class men where 9 of the 11 men were close to winning something. Steve Ausin played in another tournament and won first place and then showed up to finish up the SCSC tournament. Karl Gautschi keeps saying he is the best senior "A" player in SCSC.

Several of the group were so proud of their scores that they didn't even turn them in.




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Editor's half Page
