



Don't forget, advance sign-up continues. Contact the TC of your trip preference.



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

### General Meeting - Trip Sign-Up Monday, September 10 • 7:30 P.M. HOLIDAY INN - CROWNE PLAZA 2222 WEST LOOP SOUTH

- 1. Decide which trips you want to sign up for, ahead of time, by reading *The Sitzmarke* articles about the trips and consulting the Trip Schedule for dates and prices.
- 2. MAKE SURE to bring your CHECKBOOK and MEMBERSHIP CARD *(included in the September Sitzmarke).* You will need these to sign up for a trip. You must be a member in good standing to sign up for a trip and there will be a \$100 deposit required for each trip within North America and a \$300 deposit for the trip to Courmayeur, Italy.
- 3. Arrive EARLY. The meeting will be at the Holiday Inn Crowne Plaza at 2222 West Loop South. Admittance to the trip sign-up will be by ticket number on a first-come, first-served basis. These tickets will be given out starting at 5:30 p.m.
- 4. DO NOT LOSE YOUR TICKET! You will be allowed into the "Holding" Room by number, starting at 7:00 p.m. You will also be able to sign up for activities in this room. Admittance to the trip sign-up will start at 7:30 p.m. from the "Holding" Room.
- 5. If you are signing up a friend for a trip, make sure you have THEIR MEMBERSHIP NUMBER, a check and pertinent information such as address and telephone numbers (home and work). You may sign up for yourself and one other **member**.
- 6. If you have any questions or need help to understand the trip sign-up procedures, ask an officer (*wearing white plastic name tags*), the Board of Directors (*wearing red plastic name tags*), or a Lift Liner (*wearing sheriff badges*).


### **BRAZOS BEND** by Sandy Hoffman and Nolan Badeaux


as cheerleader for both sides. Jan Eifert arrived somewhat later. She probably thought it started at 7:00 p.m. instead of a.m.

#### 4. BECOME INFORMED ABOUT THE TRIP BEFORE YOU SIGN UP.


Read information concerning trips in the *Sitzmarke's* Trip Schedule. Ask the Trip Coordinator any questions you may have before you sign up.

Lodging. The Sagebrush Inn, built of adobe in the Pueblo-Mission style, will provide our accommodations. The town of Taos has become one of the foremost art colonies in the country, and Sagebrush Inn is a Taos historic



# VAIL II


#### (Family optional) March 23-30, 1991 \$618

Vail Mountain offers more variety than any other ski area in North America.

There will be 61/2 possible days of skiing to enjoy Vail Mountain. There are 120 named trails that cover 3,787 acres of skiing terrain. 32% of the trails on the face of Vail Mountain are for beginning skiers, 36% are for intermediate skiers, and 32% are for advanced skiers. The longest run of "Flapjack" to "Riva Ridge" is 4.5 miles. On the back side there are the legendary "Back Bowls." In Sun Down, Sun Up, Tea Cup, China, Siberia and Mongolia Bowls, the skiing is 36% intermediate and 64% advanced. In the new bowls the skiing is 50% intermediate and 50% advanced.

Vail has a total of seven (7) express lifts enabling skiers to reach every part of Vail Mountain in minutes. That means you'll spend less time riding the lifts and more time skiing. Your Vail lift ticket is also good at Beaver Creek which makes another 49 named trails available for skiing.

The Vail Ski School offers a program for almost every skier. The Learn-to-Ski program is for adults in a group lesson with other beginners. The Advanced Beginner program allows skiers to perfect basic skiing skills. The Intermediate to Advanced/Expert program allows skiers to improve and

strengthen skiing techniques. There are half-day workshops in Style, Bumps and Powder, Race and Snowboarding. The Children's Adventure Mountain program guides children through historical attractions such as the Dragon's Breath Mine and Tombstone Territory where they'll learn the tale of the Indian twins Gitche and Gumee, told by Sourdough Pete and Jackrabbit Joe, while learning to ski. Mogul Mice and Super Stars are for 31/2 yrs. through Kindergarten. 1st grade through 12 yrs. will enjoy all-day classes including videotaping and a special race with ribbons. There are also special versions of adult programs

for teens from 13 to 18 years old.

Evenings will be filled with a myriad of activities. We are planning an evening of ice skating at Dobson Arena. Plan on joining us for Satch's Dinner/Sleigh Ride at Vail Country Club. Also planned are two (2) getacquainted dinners for our group. Snowmobiling, snowcat tours, and cross country skiing are also available.
