By 7:30 p.m. Friday, April 28th, $28+4$ extra participants were off to New Orleans via Southwest Airlines for the 20th Annual Jazz \& Heritage Festival. Eunice Young came in from Austin to fill in for a late cancellation even though she was in the midst of moving to another house. Now that is determination, but then again New Orleans does that to some people. Upon arrival at the Clarion Hotel in New Orleans, we were greeted by wall-to-wall people in the lobby (the Knights of Peter Cline?) and SCSC's own Ed Cain and Kay Ellig.
