





FROM THE SKI DESK



SNOWBIRD TSC Fall Roundup *November 22-26, 1989*








SKI THE SUMMIT "Texas Ski Week Traditional" January 6-13, 1990 January 9-14, 1990





WOLF CREEK COLORADO January 18-22, 1990

They receive more snow than any other ski area in Colorado and it's the light, fluffy stuff. The terrain is not terrifying (20%) beginner, 50% intermediate, and 30% advanced). It is not crowded and it is inexpensive. So let yourself go this year, go to Wolf Creek and find the real joy of snow skiing.

January 27 - February 3

Last season, Whistler/Blackcomb (70 miles north of Vancouver) logged one million skier visits. It is now the most popular resort in Canada and number four in North America behind only such heavyweights as Vail, Aspen and Killington.

The two highest verticals in North America are a dizzying 5,280 feet at **BLACKCOMB** and 5,006 feet at **WHISTLER.** They have an immense variety of terrain, profuse snowfall and a picture-book pedestrian village which is among the best of its kind. They have a joint lift ticket, a coordinated ski school and a cooperative transportation system.

With the possible exception of Beaver Creek, Colorado, Whistler Village is the most carefully designed and implemented ski center on the continent. Planned with full mountain views from virtually every perspective, the village has a distinctively European style oriented to pedestrians with a wealth of restaurants and night spots.

LAAX-FLIMS SWITZERLAND Texas Ski Council Expedition January 26 - February 4, 1990

Guten Tag! Let's ski Switzerland this year!

Laax-Flims is a holiday resort located on a plateau above the Upper Rhine River in the Bunder Oberland district of Switzerland. These two little villages are nestled along the valley floor amongst some very major mountains. Swiss quaintness is everywhere in the villages. Non-skiers can, as ususal, shop in Laax or Flims or take tours to the local areas in Switzerland or Italy.

The Laax-Flims ski area is known as "The White Arena". It is appropriately named because of the huge bowl shape the area encompasses. The longest run extends 9 miles from the Vorab Glacier down to Flims, followed by a $7\frac{1}{2}$ mile run. A variety of runs will satisfy most skier types. Ski excursions will be offered to St. Moritz (with the Glacier Express train) or to Davos and Arosa by bus, all within $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours from Laax-Flims.

As part of the Texas Expedition, we will be treated to a welcome party following the Opening Ceremony, a midweek Swiss Party and closing Awards Ceremony and party. We are reserving only 30 spaces, so be prepared to sign up early at the September meeting!

Flight arrangements will be with KLM. So while we have to go through Amsterdam anyway, we will spend our first day and night in Europe in the beautiful and interesting city of Amsterdam. This will give us a day to get acclimated before hitting the slopes.

EXPLORE UTAH! February 8 - February 12, 1990

There are plenty of summer sports suitable for skiers. Some seem almost tailor-made for people, who would otherwise only enjoy winter sports, such as grass skiing and water skiing. Why not try some sport entirely new to you in the summer — such as cycling, tennis, canoeing, and wind surfing? There is a wide range to choose from; here is a brief survey:

Sport	Effect				
Walking, Mountain Climbing	Good for the circulation				
Cycling	Improves endurance and strengthens the leg muscles				
Swimming	Improves flexibility and staying power				
Tennis	Good for reflexes, muscles and circulation				
Canoeing	Good corrective for the skier's overworked legs, good for mobility				
Water-skiing	Improves balance, strengthens the leg muscles				
Wind-surfing	Ideal for skiers; improves balance, strengthens the muscles of the trunk, arms and legs				

You may prefer to train on your own rather than attend clases at fixed hours in possibly overcrowded gymnasiums. It might be a good idea to go in for moderate but regular outdoor exercising on the basis of outdoor training methods.



will receive some information on the trip. Trail maps, area information, accommodation information and possibly the flight times may be included in the information you will receive. You will now be free to move into another trip line or sign up for some of the Great activities we will be offering. The TC and ATC will be keeping you informed on the latest trip information and calling to remind you of the final payment date.

What is a "Wait List" you might be asking yourself. After all, you did wait in lines outside the door and another line to get to the sign-up table, why a wait list??? Well, if you read the Sitzmarke articles about each trip, you will note that there is always a limit to the number of people that will be able to go on the trip. During sign-up, once the trip fills its limits, the over flow will be placed on the wait list. Many times things change through the period of time one signs up for a trip and when the trip actually departs. The TCs and ATCs call people off the wait lists to fill those spots. Many times, wait lists have been called through their entirety to fill trips. DO NOT get discouraged if you are on a wait list. MORE THAN LIKELY YOU WILL BE CALLED.

A wait list is also good for two other reasons.

[1] If you decide at the last minute you might want to go on another trip, but just don't know if you can get that vaction time, this is an ideal way of being "on call" while checking dates with the boss.

[2] Being on the wait list does not tie up your cash. Your \$100.00 DEPOSIT is held until there is an opening on the trip. When called by the TC or ATC to inform you of an opening, you have the option to go or decline. At that time, your check will go in for deposit, or be destroyed.

TIPS FOR THE SEPTEMBER SIGN-UP MEETING

[1] Read the Sitzmarke and decide what trips you want to go on.

[2] MAKE SURE to bring your CHECKBOOK and **MEMBERSHIP CARD!!**


[3] Arrive EARLY! Remember we will be at the HOLI-DAY INN CROWNE PLAZA, 2222 West Loop South.

[4] DO NOT LOSE YOUR TICKET. You MUST have this to enter the door. (If you lose your ticket, you will need to get another one from the door guards or Lift Liners who are handing them out, and this one will have a higher number.)

[5] If you are signing up for a friend, make sure you have THEIR MEMBERSHIP NUMBER, a check and their information to give to the TC and ATC (phone numbers, work and home, address, etc.) You may sign up yourself and one other member.

[6] There will always be people to help you at the meeting should you have any questions. The Board of Directors (wearing RED plastic name badges), the Officers (wearing WHITE plastic name badges), the Lift Liners (wearing the SHERIFF badges) and of course, the members of SCSC.


