Off To The Races

This month marks the departure of SCSC's first ski trip, Keystone over Thanksgiving. This is also the Texas Ski Council's Fall Roundup, the first of four TSC trips and the first chance for SCSC to earn points in the Texas Ski Cup Challenge Series.

For those of you who have been reading the Sitzmarke for years, this will be old hat to you. But for our new members, let me take a moment to explain about TSC and The Cup. TSC, of which SCSC is a charter member, is a non-profit coalition of twenty-three Texas ski clubs with a single purpose: to secure the highest value for your ski dollars. Each year the Council successfully negotiates tremendous savings as evidenced by our trips to Keystone, Steamboat Springs, Telluride and Big Mountain.

Additionally, all of the TSC trips include a NASTAR race. All of the clubs participate in these races and awards are handed out to division winners at the last TSC trip in March. (There are three divisions based on membership and SCSC, being the largest club in the Council, is in Division I.)

If you have never tried a NASTAR racecourse (NASTAR = National Amateur Standard Race) it is a giant slalom layout typically set up on a smooth, average slope. The whole idea of amateur racing is to improve your skiing ability. TSC couples with that friendly competition among the clubs for the Cup. This year the TSC Race Committee, chaired by our own Jim McIntyre (ATC for Big Mountain) has changed the race rules to include a point for each trip participant whether they race or not. Of course, the racers will still earn points based on their times and handicaps.





NEWS FROM THE SKI DESK by Cheryl Clements



With the onset of cooler weather, one's mind starts to wander and dream of that first snowfall and making tracks through virgin snow. With the first trip of the '88-89 season upon us, I find it hard to believe that it's still 90 degrees.

As most of you are aware, by the time that you get your Sitzmarke each month, things that appear in that issue have already been acted upon. Last month I wrote about investigating the expansion of the Vail trip. Well, before the October publication, Vail II was formed with the addition of 36 new participants. One thing you should be aware of though. This trip was created solely from the Wait List of the first trip. So if you stood in that awesome line at the September meeting, your patience may very well have paid off. Just remember, being number 50 or 60 on a wait list does not necessarily mean that you will not make a trip. The turnover of trip participants after final payment date ranges anywhere from 30 to 50 percent. So, if you have not been called from the Vail (or any other trip) wait list, hope is not lost. And don't forget: At this writing (sometime in early October) we still have vacancies on the following trips:

Kitzbuhel (we still have the ability to add space); Taos: and Winter Park.

There exists only small wait lists for the Steamboat trips, Breckenridge, and Telluride.

I reiterate. If you want to go on a trip that is presently full, please sign up on the wait list. The possibility exists to move up the wait list onto the participant list.*

Now I've heard some rumors about our DOTS. Gloria Rooney has been seen partaking in other activities outside of cracking a whip at all of her TCs and ATCs. On the other front, Floyd Hanks is rumored to have been seen herding his TCs and ATCs into line while assisting in locating adequate sites for pre-trip parties and encouraging all trip participants to race for the infamous Texas Cup.

This brings to mind another subject -- racing. Although I personally would like to see 100% participation in all of the Texas Ski Council races, I do not want you to injure yourself or feel that you are racing under duress just because SCSC wants to beat Cowtown and bring home the Texas Cup. The Texas Ski Council Challenge is not intended to be a downright bloodbath between the Clubs. The intention is to

As such, the Texas Ski Council has implemented a new Race Rule this year which awards one point to each participant on a trip. So, if you're a first-time skier, don't feel compelled to race if you are not comfortable with racing -- you have still contributed one point to the Club just for going on the trip. If you are so inclined to race, you will earn more than the one point already awarded you provided you complete the race course. Again, I would like to see all of you race, but please, do so in caution and ski within your abilities.

Lastly, I, the DOTs and the other officers wish the very best of luck to the participants on the inaugural trip of SCSC's '88-89 ski season -- Fall Roundup at KEYSTONE. Have a wonderful trip and BEAT THE PANTS OFF COWTOWN!





PACKING FOR TRAVEL EASE AND SKIING PLEASURE

Going on your first ski trip? Know what you need to take?

Do you need to take as much as this poor guy? Believe me, if you do, you'll look about like he does after your second time of loading and unloading your luggage.

Some additional helpful hints - especially for the first timers:

• You may want to rent your equipment at the resort so you won't have the hassle of carrying your equipment until you see what skiing is all about.

• If you do carry skis and boots and have the carrying bags for them, stuff these with socks, underwear and other non-crushable clothing to save more room in your suitcase.

• Try to line up your roommate before your trip and see if you can't combine some items: hair dryer, hot rollers, travel iron, etc.

• Ladies, think about leaving your purse at home. You probably won't be needing all the stuff you usually have in it for this one week. When you go out at night, all you'll need is a small billfold for money and charge cards, lipstick, compact and comb. These fit very nicely into zip up jacket pockets. See? One less thing to wag around!

New to the club?

Unless your TC or ATC tells you differently, assume that your condo will have 4-6 people in it with two people per bath. Condos will vary considerably in the arrangment of beds and rooms. There may be one room with a double or queen bed, one with



twin beds and a fold-out couch in the living room. Most condos have kitchens and fireplaces with the kitchens being well enough equipped to fix a pot of coffee and cook a breakfast. You and your roommates may want to combine efforts in a run to the grocery after your arrival for a week's worth of coffee, breakfast items and fire starter. Don't forget your bathing suit since most resorts offer access to jacuzzis and pools.

After you have your things packed, stand back and re-evaluate your bags. Can you comfortably handle them yourself? Is there anything you can leave behind? Most people find that they take too many clothes. Washers and dryers can be found if you run out of something. Dress comfortably! This is not a style show week and ski areas welcome people dressed in jeans and sweaters at night.




RED FISH REEF SAILING EXCURSION


