HEAD OF THE LIFTLINE

ARTICLE IV

However, in a few short months, the group who will be presented in February and voted on in March will be looking for volunteers to run trips, plan activities, and serve in other ways to help prevent SCSC from joining the Whigs in some organizational hall of fame. How does the process work? Each person on the nominating committee takes responsibility for a specific office and interviews those who currently hold the position as well as those from the recent past to determine what particular skills and qualifications are helpful. At Keystone over the Thanksgiving holidays, we raced 68 skiers, 34 of whom won NASTAR medals (1 gold, 11 silver, and 22 bronze) and all who finished scored points toward the Cup.


KEYSTONE I by Melissa Frazier



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
