

HEAD OF THE LIFTLINE

PIECE OF CAKE

With just a few days remaining in the reign of Gordon the First, it appears that this administration will escape untainted by rumors of corruption and graft which have plagued so many in the past (no, Virginia...). Those of you who have heeded my previous admonitions and have committed the By-Laws to memory know that Article 3.2E1 assigns no particular function to the office of the President. I must humbly admit that I fulfilled this mandate with distinction. In this, my last hurrah, I will make my annual report to the membership by giving credit where credit is due.

Ann Batten produced more programs with greater variety and did so using a host of new member volunteers. These provide the organization with its future supply of ATCs, TCs, and officers, and we need this flow of committed talent. The second major program success was the increased member involvement at Happy Hours. What you may not know is that SCSC played the role of the angel of death and many would-be sites for Happy Hours died before we could visit them. Ann's volunteers were ready with suitable alternatives. and we must have liked it since Happy Hour attendance has been the greatest in recent years. Finally, she responded to an oft repeated complaint and provided an alternative to the cocktail party atmosphere at our monthly meetings. The team trivia sessions and others like them have proved to be popular and should accelerate the evolution of the meeting format.

Cindy Garrett's only short coming was that she didn't provide very good snow for us this year. Otherwise she and her two assistants, Blaise Guerrero and Bob Cruise, ran fourteen trips that

were well received, and which provided a minimum amount of problems. Much of this was due to the instruction manuals provided to the trip leaders which were newly organized and compiled this year. Her success was achieved despite having to replace three of her fourteen trip coordinators during the year.

I think the Sitzmarke had a much crisper appearance this year. Photo quality was enhanced, the margins were justified and the single picture on the cover highlighted the events being emphasized during the month. Also, advertising was up, costs under control, delivery was on time and at bulk rate mailing costs. While Bob Wilbanks' job as VP Publications was only excellent, he will have an opportunity to improve by repeating in this position next year.

One of **Harold Eaton's** goals as VP Membership was to fill our fourteen-hundred member limitation. While we came up a few heads short, he was successful in increasing the general awareness of SCSC. Advertising flyers descriptive of the Club were distributed to local area sporting goods stores, and booths were manned at two ski shows advertising our existence. Finally, he staffed the membership tables at our regular meetings with new member volunteers and was able to accomplish all this while getting married.

The secretary's job is not too glamorous. However, there are three very important aspects to this function in the SCSC. Pam Holder took a disorganized and bloated inventory of pins, patches and decals, marked them down and sold them. What's left is relevant and manageable. Secondly, she sold more advertising for our directory than I thought possible. She clearly exceeded her budget and, working

with Harold Eaton, produced the membership directory while the data was still relevant. She will continue on next year as VP Trips and we expect great things of her.



He has kept the executive committee and board conscious of our financial condition and has provided us with "dooms day" alternatives in the event our original budgeting went awry. He also helped us save money by reducing use of outside vendors in the record keeping function.

These six people have known their responsibilities, exercised initiative and creativity in performing them and in so doing have assisted in moving this organization forward by continuing to do what we do well and proposing changes when things needed altering. They made my job very easy for which I am grateful.

Finally, while not part of our administration, we owe a debt of gratitude to Dick Howard, Easy Thayer, John Cook, and Jim McIntyre, who were among the leadership of the Texas Ski Council, and to Eric Holm and Layna Adams, our representatives thereto. If I leave a challenge to Bill Kirk and next year's officers, it is to improve and increase the involvement of Space City in the Ski Council. One needs but to look at the relative pricing of the Council trips this year to understand why.

And now, like the Old Soldier, I will fade away to relative obscurity as Chairman of the Board.







And further credit to first time skiers and new club members Marti Toomer and Jill Newman who ran the gates and earned points for the club and finished up their first ski week ever on the Blue runs! The costume party that night finds Landon in a lovely borrowed nightgown, Arlen as the masked "Horney Man," and Marlene appearing as Wilma Flintstone where she takes the prize for Sexiest costume.

Friday. Trip nearing its end. Judy Hays gets out of her snowplow and joins the big group. After lunch Elaine challenges everyone to a run down mogul covered Resurrection on a full

APPLICATION FOR MEMBERSHIP AND RELEASE OF LIABILITY

By applying for membership in SPACE CITY SKI CLUB, INC. ("Club"), I hereby certify that I have read, that I understand, and that I agree to abide by all the Standing Rules of the Club. I understand that payments made for ski trips and other Club activities may not be refundable in whole or in part and that all payments will be handled in accordance with the applicable provisions of the Standing Rules as may be supplemented by decisions of the Executive Committee of the Club. More particularly, I have read the portions of the Standing Rules set forth below and I agree that should I elect to participate in a ski trip or in any other Club activity, all payments made by me shall be subject to said Standing Rules.

APPLICABLE STANDING RULES OF SPACE CITY SKI CLUB, INC.

5.0 TRIP PENALTIES

- 5.1 If a trip participant withdraws from a trip after the specified final payment date, the trip participant will lose his entire payment unless he or she can be replaced from the waiting list, or the Trip Coordinator is able to recover some or all of the participant's costs by cancellation of lodging, transportation, and/or other commitments. The trip participant will be entitled to the entire amount recovered by replacment or cancellation of arrangements less the cancellation fee stipulated in section 5.2 of these Standing Rules and any extra expenses incurred by the Club in cancelling any of the previously made arrangements. The trip's showing a profit or loss will not be a factor in determining the exact refund due. Also, if the Trip Coordinator failed to exercise a reasonable effort in cancelling accommodations or finding a replacement, the Executive Committee will award the refund, less the cancellation fee.
- 5.2 CANCELLATION FEES.
 - A. A participant may forfeit his full deposit if he fails to notify the Club in writing of his intent to wilthdraw prior to the published final payment dates. A minimum charge of \$10 will be assessed for each trip cancellation, and such charges will be increased by \$5 per month for each additional calendar month or portion thereof the participant's reservation is held prior to cancellation. Cancellation fee, however, may not exceed the amount of the trip deposit.
 - B. A participant cancelling from more than one trip shall be charged \$25 in addition to the calculated cancellation fee for each cancellation subsequent to the first cancellation.
- 5.3 A charge of \$5.00 will be assessed for each trip transfer.
- 5.4 Deposit, transfer and cancellation charges for non-domestic trips shall be determined by the Executive Committee and included in the trip release as well as in all trip publicity; in no case shall these requirements be less than those provided in section 5.2 and 5.3 of these Standing Rules.

7.0 RESTRICTIONS

- 7.1 Allowing non-trip participants to occupy any room as a non-registered guest is strictly prohibited, and in violation of Club policy and subjects the member to disciplinary action.
- 7.2 The illegal use of controlled substances during Club trips, or on any other official Club function, is in violation of Club policy and is strictly prohibited.
- 7.3 No substitutions of trip participants shall be allowed without the knowledge and approval of the Trip Coordinator, and new additions to the trip shall come from that trip's Waiting List. The Trip Coordinator shall make all substitutions.

8.0 MISCELLANEOUS

- 8.1 TRIP SIGN-UP. No member shall be allowed to sign up for any ski trip prior to the September regular meeting.
- 8.2 WEATHER. If a trip should be "weathered-in" the additional lodging expense will be left up to the individual, although the Trip Coordinator will assist in making accommodation arrangements, and collection from sale shall be left up to the lodge.
- 8.3 NON-SKI TRIPS/ACTIVITIES. Reservations for participation in such activities may require full payment, instead of a deposit fee.

I hereby appoint the Club, its officers, and agents, as my agent to perform all acts and to enter into any and all contracts as may be deemed desirable in connection with any ski trip or other Club activity. I understand that the Club acts only as coordinator and accepts no responsibility for the services of any person, ski area, airline, motor coach, hotel or any organization whatsoever rendering any of the services or accommodations being offered on any trip. Ski trip and other activity fees are based upon current tariffs and are subject to change without notice. The Club accepts no responsibility in whole or in part for any delays, delayed departure or arrival, missed plane or other carrier connections, loss, damage or injury to person or property, mechanical defect or failure of any nature howsoever caused, or for any substitution of hotels or of common carrier, with or without notice, or for any additional expenses occasioned thereby. I fully understand that the Club is a voluntary association run by volunteers who have no special training in conducting ski trips or other activities. By participating, I do not rely on the expertise of any director, officer, activity coordinator or the agents of any of the foregoing. I agree that I am solely responsible for my personal safety and conduct and for meeting all payment deadlines. Should I miss a departure, I understand that I may not be able to recover any part of my trip or activity payment. I agree to indemnify and hold harmless the Club, its directors, officers, and agents or contractors from any loss, cost or expense incurred by or atributable in any way to me in connection with any ski trip or other activity. I agree to abide by the Bylaws, rules and regulations of the Club and the rulings of Trip and Activity Coordinators in connection with any ski trip or other activity.
