NEWS FROM THE SKI DESK by Pam Holder

SIGN UP TIME IS HERE!

Here are some suggestions for getting on your favorite ski trip this '87-'88 Ski Season. Arrive early at The Grand Hotel; the doors will open at 7:30 p.m. While you are waiting, socialize with your ski buddies from last year, get additional trip information, or membership info and look over the Sitzmarke Trip Schedule.

For trip sign-up, here are some helpful reminders:

You must be a club member to participate on a ski trip.

Renewals and new members can fill out an application at the membership table. A Liftliner can help -those members with the Sheriff's badge.

Bring your checkbook.

A \$75.00 deposit is required for each trip -\$300.00 for the Switzerland trip is required (all checks payable to SCSC).

Know the rules.

This September meeting marks the beginning of Trip sign-up for the '87-'88 season. Be sure to read the applicable standing rules regarding sign-up, deposits, transfers, cancellations, etc. See your directory and the back of the *Sitzmarke* **Trip Schedule**. **A Trip Release Form** will be required again this year. Become informed about the trip before you sign up.

Ask a Liftliner - if you are in the right line for the trip you want to sign up. Read information concerning trips in the *Sitzmarke's* Trip Schedule. This insert can be pulled out to bring to the meeting. Read Trip Handout information sheets. Ask Trip Coordinator any questions before sign up.

Hit the early trips first.

Then go sign up for later trips if signing up for more than two trips.

Be ready to sign up.

Deposit check ready. Note name of trip and your membership number on check. *Fill out* your **Trip Questionnaire** application.

Can't make the meeting.

A friend can sign up for you. Each member can sign up *one* other member for a trip. Contact your T.C. after the meeting - you can sign up via the mail, too.

All in all, just be patient. The T.C. will be very busy and will try to take care of everybody. Liftliners are there to help, too, so ask. Try to keep in straight lines and do not cut in line. If going for a drink or whatever, tell the person to hold your place - not too long, though; you may lose your place to another ski enthusiast.

I look forward to seeing you at the Sign-up meeting in Sepember - we've planned a great program and the trips are even better - so be there!



WINTER PARK

Winter Park is shaping up to be the Big Event of the year in every sense of the word. It's Texas Ski Week, the best trip price of the year, the largest group of Space City skiers of any trip in a number of years, one of the largest and most varied ski areas of any trip, the most easily accessible ski area in Colorado, some of the most dependable snow conditions, and a chance to bring back the Texas Cup (since it's one of the few times we'll be taking more skiers than Cowtown).

Space City is running four weeklong trips and one short trip with 42 skiers each, so there's plenty of variety and flexibility no matter what your preference for companionship, skiing and socializing.

Texas Ski Week brings the advantage of a great trip price, \$428, for the long trips and \$361 for the short trip, plenty of parties and races, a chance to renew old acquaintances or make new ones with other Texas skiers, a picnic and scavenger hunt on the mountain, lots of discount bargains and coupons, and the infamous Winter Park Mouse Races.

Winter Park also is a great place for new skiers. The small trips will make it easy to get acquainted with the club and Winter Park's teaching facilities are among the very best. They were recently recognized by the National Ski Areas Association as an industry leader in ski education programs.

And Winter Park has even more to offer for advanced skiers. Anyone PAGE 16 who has skied the "Outhouse" trail can attest to why it was named. A recent massive expansion of the ski area has created even more options for skiers of all levels.

Winter Park is being touted this year as "a whole new Mountain." Extremely convenient (more skiing and less travel) because of its 67-mile, $1\frac{1}{2}$ hour distance by bus from Denver, Winter Park has just completed the largest on-mountain ski terrain expansion in the United States. They've boosted the number of skiable acres by 40 percent and added 33 new trails.

In the last two years, the original Winter Park and Mary Jane mountains have been supplemented by the opening of the back side of Mary Jane, exclusively for expert and intermediate skiers; and Vasquez Ridge, which has 13 new intermediate trails that are perfect for beginners who want to move up.

The three mountains are interconnected by lifts and are skiable with a single lift ticket. They offer everything from the most difficult terrain to long, wide cruising and beginner runs.

Winter Park now has a total of 96 trails and they've added plenty of new lifts that can really move skiers up the mountain and keep the lines short. There are now 18 lifts, including a brand new high-speed quad lift.

And with annual average snowfall of 378 inches and 11 trails covered by snowmaking equipment, Winter Park is one of the best bets of the year for a good snow base. The town of Winter Park has also been expanding by leaps and bounds. There's no more shortage of good restaurants, entertainment and places to party. Winter Park now has more than 40 bars, restaurants and shops, a full-service grocery, live theater, a special, lighted nighttime snowtubing hill, complete with its own lift, snowmobiling, sleigh rides, ice skating, mini-golf, and cross-country skiing.

Space City trips I through IV will depart Houston on Saturday, Jan. 9, and return on Saturday, Jan. 16. That means there will be six full days of skiing for all four trips.

Trip V, the short trip, leaves Houston Jan. 12, and returns from Denver on Sunday, Jan. 17. You'll have 4¹/₂ days of skiing.

Upon arrival in Denver, we'll take the short, 1¹/₂ hour bus ride to Winter Park, which is the closest of any of the ski areas to the Denver airport.

Accommodations for the long trips are in the Beaver Village condominiums, which are located on the edge of the town of Winter Park and just one mile from the ski area. Free bus service will shuttle Space City skiers to and from the ski area throughout the day and also throughout the town day and night. The condos are spacious and have a swimming pool, hot tubs, sauna and laundry. The short trip will stay just across the street in similar accommodations at the Crestview condominiums.

Very reasonably priced ski rentals will be pre-arranged at a shop within

about one block of the condos. Lift tickets that provide access to the entire three-mountain area will be discounted to \$96 for six days, \$18 for one day, \$48 for three days, \$64 for four days, and \$80 for five days.

Space City trips will have several happy hours and parties during the trip, plus optional activities at night, such as snowtubing.

Texas Ski week activities will make these great facilities and

amenities even better. There will be parties, daily happy hours, souvenirs, discounts in town and the picnic and scavenger hunt on the mountain.

In addition to the Texas Cup race, which is a great chance for beginners to test their skills as well as for advanced skiers to take some medals and bring home the cup, there will be individual, head-to-head races and a fun race.

And, don't forget that this is the first time in many years that Space City

will be taking more skiers than Cowtown. Historically, we have a higher rate of turnout for the Texas Cup Race, so this is a great chance to be on the team that brings it home.

So, join Space City, the Texas Ski Council and great sponsors like Head, Raichle, Tyrolia, Oshman's and Lite Beer from Miller -- more taste, less filling -- for more skiing and less traveling at Winter Park, Texas Ski Week 1988, the Big Event of the year.



BRECKENRIDGE

Listen up, animals, time's a wastin'. We're planning seven nights in this lovely little Victorian Village (which will never be the same when we're done) in the Arapahoe National Forest. Lodging is in the Sawmill Creek Condos, in two bedroom/two bath units replete with full kitchens (microwaves), washers/dryers, fireplaces, balconies, and on premises Jacuzzi and saunas (no trekking across the tundra to warm your buns). The condos are ski-in with a short walk or shuttle ride (it stops at the front door) to the lifts. It is also set a little apart in a more woodsy setting than the ten or so other complexes located along four o'clock run. The entire town is next to the slopes and across the street from our location; it's chock full of bars, restaurants, bars, shops, and more bars. Breckenridge also provides theater, live music and museum/art activities for those remaining reasonably sober.

Departure will be on the morning of Saturday, Feb. 20, so there will be time to rent equipment and have a wine and cheese party the first evening. If people are nice to their ATC, he may be convinced to provide some fine wine for a door prize. A daquiri-based cocktail party is a strong possibility for Monday night. How about an evening sleigh ride with dinner? We could have a pot luck supper with a professional judge (yours truly) determining the best and worst dishes. Snowmobiling, cross country skiing and even heliskiing are all available. Unfortunately, sailing and white water rafting will be out of season during our visit.

Now, for those of you who simply insist on some ski-type information, we will be there for 6 ski days in late February when there should be plenty of snow and not the most freezing of conditions. There are three peaks (numbers 8, 9 and 10) ranging from 11,460 to 12,213 feet, with vertical drops of 1800 to 2600 feet. The high speed lifts and non-holiday period should give us some short lift lines. There are 50 miles of trails over 1460 acres; 26 miles of these trails are beginner and intermediate. Don't be alarmed by the seemingly high portion of advanced trails; these are mostly contained in two areas: the back bowls of peak 8 and the north face of peak 9. For

those who truly wish to be challenged (or just want to cure their hangovers), the north face of 9 is all double diamond trails. There are also NASTAR and self-timer race courses, and since we are in Summit County, there are free shuttles to Copper, Keystone, and A-Basin. All this for under \$500!!

Final Comments: Aside from the major logistical items, the other activities will receive final planning at the pre-trip party because Ginger and I intend for the trip to be what the participants want, not what we have planned. We have a week and there will be time for everyone to pursue various activities. You could imagine a laid back week at a Caribbean resort that happens to have mountains, snow, and 42 crazed Houstonians.



Faster lift lines and quick lift rides are the rule at Breckenridge where all three interconnected mountains are served by their own high-speed quad "SuperChair". Breckenridge built the world's first high-speed quad in 1982 and this year adds two new "SuperChairs". There aren't any faster chairlifts in North America.



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


