TEXAS SKI WEEK RACERS SHOULD HEED THE FOLLOWING...



STARTING TECHNIQUE

Slide both skis under the start wand until your feet are 12-15 inches behind the wand. Your skis should be pointing directly toward the first gate. Plant both poles firmly in the snow on the first downhill side of the wand. With your weight forward and eyes on the first gate, wait for the word, "GO."

"GO!" You want to move your upper body out and down the hill before opening the wand and starting the timer. Still looking at the first gate, let your upper body fall forward supported by your arms and poles.

Pull yourself forward and out of the start with a strong pole action, dragging your feet through the timing wand at the last possible moment. Then skate or pole aggressively toward the first gate. You are on your way to a gold NASTAR medal!

TURNING TECHNIQUE

Starting Your Turn: Don't ski directly at the gate; start your turn early, above and wide of the gate.

In the Fall-line: This is the toughest part of the turn due to fallaway terrain. As you approach the gate, your skis are pointed straight down the hill. To maintain control and avoid sliding at this point, get lower, putting pressure on your outside (downhill) ski.

The Next Turn: As you pass the gate, you should already be finished with your turn. Looking ahead to the next gate, you want to be lined up and in position to make another great run.

Turning Above the Gate: By initiating your turn above the gate, you will have room to make a long, even, and smooth turn. By taking this "high" line, you will be carrying more speed and still feel comfortable.

Bend your knees for a fast controlled turn. Five helpful tips:

1. As you approach the gate, start pressing your knees and ankles into the turn.

2. You should reach your lowest point as you pass the gate.

3. To utilize maximum pressure on your skis and prepare yourself for the next turn, start to extend your legs after you're past the gate.

4. Extend your legs in between the turn.

5. Start bending your knees and getting low as you approach the next gate.

Mainly be careful, have a good time and finish the race.

NASTAR's Unique Handicap System

NASTAR is based on a unique National Standard Handicap System that allows you to measure your skiing improvement while you compete with friends and compare yourself with other skiers across the country.

It works like this: When you race NASTAR, your course time is converted to a handicap. For instance, if you receive a 22 handicap, that means you were 22% slower than the "Zero Handicap." A "Zero Handicap"



TOO MUCH FOG IN DENVER BUT BEAUTIFUL SNOW IN KEYSTONE ENABLED SCSC TO WIN 2nd PLACE

To gain the racer's edge, Dale Allbritton, George Hirasaki, Ed Cain, Joe Murphy, Roy Caviness, Carlos Febles, Ron and Roberta Rambin, Marlene Vail and Nelson Turner journeyed to Keystone on Saturday prior to the scheduled trip departure on Tuesday. HOW TO LOAD

As you wait in line, remove ski pole straps from your wrists and hold poles in outside hand, away from your partner.

When your turn comes, inform lift operator if you have not ridden a chair lift before. Slide into position with skis parallel and pointing uphill. Face your partner and watch for chair which will approach from behind you. As chair approaches, grasp center bar with your inside hand. Immediately sit down and face uphill.

HOW TO UNLOAD

As the chair nears unloading ramp, check to be sure no clothing or equipment is tangled in the chair. Hold poles in outside hand and place inside hand on front edge of seat. Raise ski tips.

Stay seated until you reach "Unload Here" sign, keeping skis straight on ramp. Push yourself up with inside hand, lean forward and ski straight down ramp. Don't snowplow. Ski to the edge of the unloading area to leave room for the skiers unloading behind you. Move away from unload area as quickly as possible.


