

# BEGINNERS: How to Get the Most Out of a Ski Trip

So you're toying with the idea of taking a ski trip .. but you've never been before. Friends tell you how exciting it is, and how glamorous their favorite ski area is. But if this is an absolute first try at the sport, what are some basic considerations that are imperative to your enjoyment and satisfaction for money well spent? First of all, ignore all advice from friends. Of course, they are well-meaning and probably genuinely interested in cultivating your participation in "their" sport. But what is simply fantastic for one person may be a nightmare for another.

The most important decision for a beginner to make (once you've passed the hurdle of whether or not to go at all) is WHERE to go. Some areas are designed to accommodate beginners much more comfortably than others. For instance, such resorts as Taos, Jackson Hole, Alta, and Snowbird cater to the higher intermediate and advanced skiers, and therefore would not be advisable locations for first-time

skiers. (Even though your very best friend has made you drool with anticipation to ski powder at Alta, that's no place to begin!) Picking an area with a higher percentage of beginner and intermediate runs will maximize your skiing enjoyment by speeding your progress and boosting self-confidence. Think in terms of, "Wow! In only three days I've skied ¾ of the mountain!"

Also check into the ski school for the area you choose. Most resorts which have predominately beginner and intermediate runs have excellent beginner classes, and lessons should be an absolute priority for a first-timer ... even if it's only for two or three days. These instructors are trained to teach you the right way to ski, for the ultimate in pleasure and precision. Don't cultivate poor form and bad habits by trying to teach yourself, or learning from a friend. Lessons will also teach you to watch out for the other guy ... you know, the one who knew too much to take lessons himself. Most serious injuries are caused by skiers who ski out of control. In simple terms, this happens when you don't know what you're doing!

(\$ TIP: In calculating ski trip expenses, ski lessons -- to my knowledge -- usually include your lift ticket cost.)

Resort areas which offer a variety of activities would also be an advisable consideration. It is not at all uncommon for any ski buff to decide to take a day off mid-week to take in sightseeing, shopping, snowmobiling, skating, or just lolling around in the hot tub. Some areas offer shuttle bus service to nearby towns for shopping as well as to other ski areas for a change of scenery. These options are also nice to fall back on if (Heaven forbid!) you decide you don't like skiing.

Space City offers trips of varying tenure throughout the ski season. Together with all the other considerations addressed, this would have to be a decision of preference. As for timing, thanks to snowmaking equipment, mid-November trips are no longer dependent on Mother Nature. January and February are excellent months for skiing. (Believe it or not, you can ski while snow is falling!) Spring skiing is often referred to as the most nearly perfect, weatherwise; however, since this thought is wide-spread, so are the crowds, particuarly during Spring Break. Unless your employment restricts your vacation time to holidays, I would personally recommend that a true beginner stay home at Thanksgiving, Christmas, and Spring (continued on page 14)



Under the direction and guidance of the V.P. of Trips, two Directors of Trips, and the entire Executive Board, the T.C. arranges the various aspects of travel -- air, bus, and lodging. The T.C. then begins planning budgets, marketing, activities, and finally running of the trip. Over the Club's 20 year history, our past trip experiences have been recorded in what has become known to T.C.'s as the "Ski Trip Bible." This updated version is passed on from each generation of T.C's so that we can learn about future trip planning to those areas. Lastly, the T.C. is responsible for reporting back his experiences on the trip so future T.C.'s may benefit.

Though the trip for the T.C. is a freeby, they "...must perform their task out of love. Forget the 'free trip', it will net ... about 16 cents per hour." This is especially true with SCSC since the T.C.'s training starts in May the year before the next ski season and meets all summer in preparation for our big sign-up meeting in September.

So what is this all about? It's just to recognize those individuals who already are working for your ski trips next year and to say this is what SCSC is about. Here is one "Atta Boy" for those new volunteers who approach a new work challenge and who look forward to the rewards of doing a travel job well done!

Break. If these times are unavoidable,
try to pick a more remote area
--somewhere less readily accessible to
local cities' skiers.

The last major consideration should be that of gear and equipment. Unless you're already convinced that you're going to absolutely love skiing for the rest of your life, proper clothing should be begged, borrowed, or..rented..along with your equipment. Don't spend big bucks trying to look like something out of Ski Magazine. After all, it's a wellestablished fact that beginners fall a lot, and an expensive, colorcoordinated outfit is going to be extremely noticeable .. think about it! Skis, boots, and poles are a package rental, and should definitely be fitted to a beginner according to his/her specific needs. To me, properly fitted equipment is the singly most important prerequisite of a beginner's success or failure to reach personal satisfaction in skiing achievement.
