

Happy Hour will be at Boca Del Rio this month. Check in the *Sitzmarke* to find the details.



And once again the **last word** -VOLUNTEER - feel free to call an officer (phone numbers located on page 7) and let us know you want to help. I can tell you for a fact that the Volunteer Party was wonderful. How to Store Your Ski Equipment For the Summer



During the winter ski season your equipment takes good care of you by keeping you warm, dry and providing you with hours of safety and enjoyment. Now that spring and summer are here, it's your turn to take care of your equipment. To do this, I'll try to give you a few helpful hints.

A few essential items are mothballs, trash bags and a can of silicone spray. Let's begin with softwear.

There are two types of filler materials designed to insulate and keep you warm - man-made and natural. Man-made insulation consists of Polar-guard DuPont Zycril, Kapock, etc. Natural consists of down, lamb fleece and wool. To store ensembles, pants and parkas of manmade fillers properly, you will need a clip hanger, trash bag, and mothballs (if there is a wool content). First, wash or dry clean your clothes. Never store your ski clothes without having done this. Take your pants and lay them out flat. Take snow cuff and fold into the waistband. Now, clip the waistband and snow cuffs together on the hanger. Put the parka over pants on hanger, zipping it up. Fasten all snaps, buttons, hooks and so on.

Take a large trash bag, cut a hole in the bottom large enough for the hanger hook. Put the bag over the garments, gather the bag at the bottom, put on a twist tie and seal tightly. If you have a zipper clothes bag, eliminate the trash bag! Put clip hanger in the bag and zip it up. If there is any wool content, put one or two mothballs in the bottom of the bag before sealing. Hang in a cool, dry place for storage.

Down filled garments should be handled in the same way, but before sealing the bag, put in two or three silicone packets. You can get these from any moving and storage company. These will keep all moisture out of down. As for hats and gloves, store them in a drawer, along with goggles and other accessories. Some people say to turn down-filled gloves in-side out, but it is not necessary. Turning a pair of leather gloves inside-out can be a bear of a job. Long underwear and socks just need to be washed, folded, put in a bag, chest, or drawer, remembering to moth-proof if needed.

Now that we've touched on softwear, let's go to your skis, bindings, poles and boots. If you're a serious skier, your skis and other equipment are your pride and joy, so a little extra work to safeguard this equipment should be in order.

First the skis. All old wax should be totally removed. The edges should be flat-filed and rust removed. If there are any rock scars, they should be P-texed. Now spray generously with silicone spray. The tops should be cleaned and lightly waxed with Pledge or other such products.

Your bindings should be set on zero to release spring tension and all visible signs of oil and grease removed. Now spray generously with silicone, hitting all hinges, pins, rollers, etc. Put skis bottom-tobottom and install ski ties where the bottoms touch. Put the skis in a bag and hang up by the tips. If you have no way to hang them, lean the skis in a corner in a cool, dry place. Poles should be stored with the skis unless they are bent or broken. If this is the case, a new pair should be purchased.

Boots take a little special care. If you are still skiing in leather boots, they should have all mud and dirt removed. A light coat of Neetsfoot oil or mink oil sould be applied and rubbed into the leather by hand. This prevents the leather from becoming too dry and cracking. Be careful not to over-oil, thus preventing breaking down the boot. After applying the oil, put the boots on a boot tree and clamp down tight. This will prevent the leather soles from warping. Store in a dry, cool place. The new plastic boots need only to be cleaned, siliconed, put in a bag or on a tree (or both) and set flat on the floor. Foam and flow boots need no special care; that's part of their beauty! Have broken buckles, etc. repaired before storing.

I hope my effort to give you some helpful hints on storing and maintaining your skiing equipment has been of some help to you. If done properly, everything will be in perfect shape next season.

In the high Rockies: Exploring where prospectors dreamed

Article written by JIM PLUMMER'S father about the rugged mountains in Colorado. Thanks, Jim, for sharing such an exciting article.

Linda, waitress - bartender morning manager, keyed open the front door of the Floradora Saloon, "Eating and Drinking Establishment."

It was well before the 7 a.m. opening hour but Linda is a friendly sort in an easy-going town and accommodated strangers waiting on the wooden bench on the sidewalk: "Come on in and have a cup of coffee while you wait."

We were up and out before daylight that morning to go several thousand feet up in a range of the Rocky Mountain chain. We were to explore where lonely prospectors once worked mining claims in veins of rock while they dreamed of wealth. Of the riches they sought, few ever found it.

Telluride, located in the rugged San Juan mountains of southwestern Colorado, was asleep in the quiet before dawn. Asleep enough that the only traffic was a jogger padding his way in the center of the main street.

"The town doesn't wake up until 10 o'clock," Linda said.

The Workingman's Breakfast Special was her recommendation and was served at the saloon's bar — a plateful of eggs, bacon or sausage and hash browns with Texas toast and bottomless cup of coffee.

It was a full-bellied start for what turned out to be a long, long day in the mountains, an unexpected and sometimes frightening adventure, especially for a non-mountain man born on the plains of Oklahoma. Here in the lofty San Juans 13 peaks exceed 14,000 feet.

Telluride, in a box canyon at 7,500 feet, is a picturesque old mining town that is fast becoming one of Colorado's ski capitals. There is new prosperity. Condominiums for the ski crowd are going up fast trying to be ready for when the snow pack is right. Old buildings, especially along Main Street, are being restored or refurbished to retain the Victorian look the town has had since it was born in a mining boom of the late

1800s.

At the turn of the century, Telluride had nearly 5,000 residents and was admittedly wild and wicked. It's population dwindled to a few hundred — until developers saw the possibilities of Telluride as a perfect alpine town.

Five double chairlifts, ski runs, trails, condos and new homes have been built. Store buildings are filled. A \$1 billion satellite village is in the planning. An 18-hole golf course is in the works in an area that already offers an assortment of both summer and winter recreations. They're planning to skim off a mesa for a new airport to accommodate large planes that now land at Montrose, Durango or Cortez, from where skiers must be transported.

Real estate prices in Telluride "are ridiculous," Linda told us.

She told of a couple who a few years back paid \$1,000 for a house and lot, "fixed it up a little and sold it for \$130,000."

Our mission that day was an early start to go up above the timberline and locate the abandoned Savage No. 1 and Savage No. 2 mines where Hawley McIntosh of Denver worked as a boy with his prospector uncles Oscar and Gator Blixt. Then there was Uncle Harry Blixt, who mostly packed supplies up the trails for brothers Oscar and Gator. Gator Blixt is still alive. He's 91 now and lives by himself in Montrose.

When he went to Telluride in 1912, Uncle Gator told us later in Montrose, "There were 10,000 people there. There were five dance halls on one street, saloons every other door, and 104 cribs." A crib, we were told, was a small private house where a woman entertained men — for pay.

Hawley had hired a 4-wheel drive Jeep for the day and the services of an experienced mountain driver, Sam Galloway. We met Sam in the lobby of the New Sheridan Hotel, a hotel built around 1895 and now refurbished. Sam introduced a friend, Mike Gerstner, who wanted to go along on the expedition as an observer. Mike was carrying a 35-mm. camera with a long zoom lens, and, like Sam, he is in love with the mountains and is sort of a part-time prospector with the common sense to make a more secure living at other occupations in the meantime. Both hope some day they'll find strikes of gold that will make them wealthy.

Because Hawley still has family connections to mineral rights ownership to one of the old claims, he had been able to obtain permission from the Idorado Mining Company and a key to the gate above Bridal Veil Falls for access to the peaks beyond.

The Jeep, I noticed, was equipped with steel roll bars and I hoped the bars weren't an indication of need.

A few hours later we were thankful that Mike had come along. Hawley and I might never have found our way back alone after we had to abandon the Jeep leaning perilously with two wheels off the trail and Sam had gone to seek help. (To be continued)




