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

with) all the organization necessary for such a large trip, a pat on the back to TCs Bill Kirk, Kathy Meyers, and Linda Licarione, and ATCs Billie Nowak and Tom Mullins.

Race Director Rav Naudain and his assistants Tommy Thompson and Bob Fried were able to get the gang out for the races and assure us of our second place win in the large club category. Our five silvers and 22 bronzes were an outstanding showing, but not quite enough to overcome Cowtown Ski Club's two gold, 11 silvers and over 20 bronzes.

As most know by now, the Texas Ski Cup will not be awarded until after all the club races at all five Texas Ski Council trips, and will be determined by dividing the total points accumulated by the total of TRIP participants (not just racers), and multiplied by the number of trips in which the club participates.

The number of participants on the trip who do not race (even at the slowest time possible) will hurt our standings in the Texas Ski Cup competition, so all who signed up for the remaining Council trips to CRESTED BUTTE, HEAVENLY VALLEY, and BRECKENRIDGE should keep that in mind when deciding whether to come out for the races. WE NEED YOUR HELP TO GET THOSE NUMBERS UP!

While so many were enjoying Texas Ski Week, it seems that some came to Stouffer's for the General Meeting on the regular second Monday meeting date, not noticing that we had changed the date to the third Monday, since so many (including four of

7. Stability in employment location

8. Balance of male/female ratio

9. Team work ability between other nominees

In addition to the above, the Nominating Committee considered the following special criteria for each office.

President was considered for the ability to conduct meetings, previous offices and positions held within the Club and the ability to work well with all types of people. The Vice President of Programs should be able to find and develop new leadership potential within the Club and show the creative ability to plan and organize interesting programs and activities.

The Vice President of Trips was considered for his organizational abilities, business sense and abilities to negotiate with vendors and the ability to work well with all types of people. The Vice President of Membership was considered for his accessibility to the telephone, ability to handle details, familiarity with computer operation and organizational skills.

The Vice President for Publications was considered

for writing, creativity and organizational skills.

Secretary needed communications skills, ability to type and organize. The Treasurer must have a strong business sense, ability to plan and help implement a budget and head off potential financial problems in relation with trips and activities.

It should be noted that the by-laws allow additional nominations from the floor at the February meeting. The election will be held at the March annual meeting.

At the December Council meeting the point totals toward the "Texas Ski Cup" were announced. After the Keystone Fall Round Up the top clubs based on points per participant are:

Remember, there is a new formula this year. The total points are divided by the total number of participants. The new race rules and formula were formally approved at this meeting with Space City casting four votes "NO." If you don't know why, please read on.

If a club has fewer people on its trip, but all race, the club stands a better chance at winning the cup. For example, Los Amigos had only 13 members at Keystone. University of Texas had 21. Flatlander had 23. Lone Star had 18 and Space City had 50.

It is conceivable that a club could develop a race team of ten or twelve and send them to the Texas Ski Council trips to compete in the races and win the Texas Ski Cup under this point system.

lim McIntyre was appointed to a Development Committee to study the future planning of the Texas Ski Council. Let him know what your thoughts are on future TSC efforts.

Space City is also on the preselection committee to narrow down all the bids and select which five ski areas will make presentations to the Council to select next year's trips. If you have any prejudices or favorites, let lim know.

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MOUNTAINS IN NEW ZEALAND CHALLENGE JAPANESE SKIER

The following is an excerpt of a letter from Ako Kawamura, a Japanese member of Space City Ski Club. Members of SCSC met Ms. Kawamura while skiing in Japan. She expects to join the Club skiing in California in March.

My skiing trip to New Zealand was a very enjoyable one. I stayed during the first week of August in Christchurch to ski at Mt. Hutt and four nights during the second week in Queenstown to ski at the Coronet Peak.

The best part was that there were no trees in the mountains; therefore, I found it easy to choose my favorite routes, even though the number of lifts were limited compared to the other areas.

The slopes of Mt. Hutt were quite challenging. While I was there the international ski competition was held. It was fun to see the dynamic way of skiing, particularly from the seat of the chair-lift.

The great drawback was the two-hour bus ride from Christchurch to Mt. Hutt. Of course, there are places to stay much closer to the mountains, but the accommodations are rather uncomfortable and not adequate to our standards. Also, I didn't like the washroom or cafeteria. They are not as clean and almost always over-crowded.

Whereas, those buildings at Coronet Peak are nice and clean. Its slopes are much milder than those of Mt. Hutt. The best part was that it is situated close to one of the most beautiful cities, Queenstown. It takes only 40 minutes by bus to the skiing areas.

Queenstown has beautiful lakes surrounded by the snow-covered mountains and looks like a mini Swiss village. I was fascinated by this little city. If I have a chance to revisit, I will stay much longer in Queenstown than in Christchurch.

The Boeing 747 of Air New

The Boeing 747 of Air New Zealand flies directly to Christchurch from Tokoyo via Fiji and Auckland. It is good to stay in Christchurch where the city itself is like a mini-London. I must change planes anyway to the propeller plane in Christchurch to visit anywhere else in Southern Island.

On the way to Queenstown from Christchurch, the plane stops at Mt. Cook where people have to take helicopters to ski because there are no lifts. To stay at Mt. Cook might be a bit boring, particularly after skiing, even though the mountain is so majestic and adventurous to ski.

I was amazed there were so many good eating spots, both in Christchurch and Queenstown and, the prices were quite reasonable. The New Zealanders are very warm, kind and amiable. I didn't see any grumbling and long-faced New Zealanders while I was there. They really made me feel right at home.

While I was skiing those two mountains, I came across many Australians and the North Islanders of New Zealand. I was told that their mountains were not so good to ski. They were either so little snow, too many trees or too low to have fun to ski.

The most vital fact is that New Zealand is the only place in the world, if we want to ski during our mid-summer, that has powdery snow and modern, comfortable hotels.

I'd prefer to ski in Switzerland or Austria where everything is so large-scaled and better equipped during our winter. As for the type of snow in New Zealand, I got both powdery and icy days while there. To compare the Japenese skiing resorts, the New Zealand ones were larger scaled and less crowded.

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
