## FLATLANDS WINS TEXAS SKI CUP

The Flatlands Ski Club of Midland-Odessa won the Texas Ski Cup as a result of the new formula which combines the results of all five TEXAS SKI COUNCIL trips for this season. The results:

| FIRST | Flatlands | 73 points |
| :--- | :--- | :--- |
| SECOND | Cowtown | 68 points |
| THIRD | Space City | 63 points |

As you know, Space City is the only club to vote against the new rules. SCSC was 2nd at Keystone, 2nd at Sun Valley, 2nd at Crested Butte, Ist at Heavenly Valley and 2nd at Breckenridge. However, we finished THIRD overall.

The new rules favor a club that takes the minimum number of participants on Council trips. SCSC took more skiers to Sun Valley (143) than Flatlands took ALL season (100). I will try to get the rules a bit more realistic at the May Council meeing. Jim McIntyre
