HOW YOUR SKI TRIP IS PLANNED

It won't be long now! In another month you will be "hitting the tables" at the September 10 meeting to sign for this coming season's ski trips ... an opportunity to learn to ski, to conquer that black slope, to meet that new love in your life. Whatever a Space City Ski trip means to you. Many of you have skied with the Club for many years and know what a great experience our trips can be. If you are a newer member of our Club, take the opportunity to find out why a Space City ski trip is the "only way to go." If you are curious as to how your Club can offer quality ski trips, why they are inexpensive, why you come back every year ... read on.

The most frequently asked question I hear: "Isn't putting together all those ski trips an awful lot of work?" Yes, it is. But I have lots of help. While you spent your summer sitting by the pool, sailing your boat, or taking a vacation, your TCs, ATCs and DOTs have been working very hard for you planning your ski trip. As you read this article much of the trip planning has already been completed and we can give you some highlights of the coming season in the accompanying trip preview articles in this issue.

Our other great source of help is vou. Yes ... each year you return to fill up our trips, make the airplane departure (well, usually), help us pay our bills and as such establish SCSC's reputation as an enthusiastic, professional and extremely reliable operator of ski tours. When we say, in July, that we will bring 42 skiers to Big Sky the following March, we will, and the ski area and lodging properties can bank on it (which is precisely what they want to do). We can use our reputation for consistently bringing large numbers (over 600 skiers this coming season) to the slopes to obtain competitive air and lodging rates and favorable terms.

Speaking of numbers, another important factor in our ski trip planning is the emergence of the Texas Ski Council as your representative in dealing with the travel industry. Each March the Council solicits and receives bids from ski areas, airlines, bus companies, etc. for the four Texas Ski Weeks. In addition to Texas Ski Weeks, the industry representatives will make special prices available to each of the Councils' member clubs for their individual club trips. The ski industry recognizes that they can reach 19 separate ski clubs, and in excess of 60,000 skier days via association

with the TSC. This is where we begin planning your trip. The TSC sets the dates for Texas Ski Week trips and we use the proposals negotiated by the TSC to plan our trips. For example, Western, Aspen and Delta Airlines have again made bids to the TSC which we will use in some of our trips. In addition to the TSC, Space City negotiates directly with the airline industry to develop packages for our trips. We have met with Western, Delta, Continental, United, Frontier, Eastern, Southwest and US Air, and have negotiated some very attractive guaranteed airfares.

Your TC generally selects your lodging. It is the Club's policy to stay in the higher quality lodging properties. We have found that although you like cheap prices, that after you have paid your money, you don't want to stay in a dump for your vacation. Your TC tries to find lodging at a convenient location near the lifts, local transportation, night life, etc. In many areas, of course, there is a tradeoff ... the mountain vs. town, near the lifts vs. cost. Also we don't cram 8 people into a 2-bedroom condo with sofa beds, cots and hammocks. Yes, it's cheaper that way but we want you to be comfortable and have a bit of privacy. Other amenities such as a heated pool, hot tub, party room are also sought for your stay. Your TC does not necessarily look for the cheapest price, but selects the best choice of quality and amenities first and then tries to negotiate the best price.


And finally, the other key feature of a Space City ski trip ... parties and lots of 'em. Pre-trip parties, post-trip parties, wine and cheese parties, mountain picnics, apres ski, western dances ... you name it, we'll try to plan it. Your TC and ATC will plan lots of activities but the special camaraderie that you develop with your fellow skiers is what sets our trips apart from the ordinary. Help keep that tradition alive ... meet your fellow skiers at the pre-trip party, invite a new friend to share some skiing, invite that shy fellow to dance.

The heart of this entire process is the Trip Coordinator and Assistant Trip Coordinator. Your TC has experienced many SCSC trips and has usually served the Club as an ATC or Activity Coordinator. Your ATC is an enthusiastic and active Club participant selected for his or her ability to help organize the trip. In addition to their experience, the TCs and ATCs attend numerous meetings,

training sessions, and budget reviews to prepare for the task of running their trips. They work closely with the two Directors of Trips, VP -Trips, and other experienced officers to assure a well-planned, smooth-running, financially sound trip. The TC and ATC work very hard for you and deserve your support and cooperation during the trip, plus a sincere thank you at its conclusion.

Is it possible for you to go skiing cheaper than with Space City? Frankly ... yes, if you want to stay in overcrowded, lower quality, remote lodging, and risk waiting for a few cheap seats to appear on the airline market. You will spend less money, but you won't have as much fun. Unfortunately, we can't wait until Christmas in hopes that 126 cheap airplane seats will appear to take you to Copper Mountain for Texas Ski Week - Traditional and promise you a price in September.

There you have it ... the secret to our success. We don't use magic, although we do have to work an occasional miracle. Hard work, 20 years of excellent reputation and sustained performance, the Texas Ski Council, devoted leaders, and, oh yes ... we don't make any money and most important, your enthusiastic participation. Keep up the good work.




