




### IN SUPPORT OF THE PROPOSED BY-LAW CHANGES

At the November meeting, the motion was made to amend three sections of the by-laws of Space City Ski Club. The first is Article 2.8, which deals with activity eligibility. Simply stated, what we are trying to accomplish with this amendment is to have a maximum of one family-oriented trip per vear. This would allow members who have minor children to ski with their children on an SCSC trip. No person who prefers strictly the company of adults on a ski trip would be required to go, although by-laws to serve as Presithere would be no restriction against members without children going on the trip. It was the intent of those who supported this amendment that priority would be given to members with minor children. Typically, these trips would be to familyoriented ski areas, rather than to the more popular singles-type places. With the relatively large number of members who have minor children, it was felt that it was finally time to try this approach.

Articles 3.2 and 4.3 are strictly language clean-up amendments that the By-


Law Revision Committee of 1982-83 did not catch prior to publication. All that is being done is to change the word "elected" to "elective." Article 4.3 is a little bit more specific, in that it would allow someone who replaces an elected officer sometime during the term to eventually serve as President. As an example, if someone was elected as Vice President of the club, and one month later was transferred to another city, his or her replacement would not be eligible under the current dent of the club because that person is an elected rather than an elective officer. The replacement officer would have served 11 months of term, yet would not be eligible, while the original elected officer who served only one month would be. Again, this is strictly a clean-up of language that was missed by the original By-Law Revision Committee.

Your support for all of the amendments is strongly requested, and I will be happy to answer any questions that anyone may

have.



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
