TEXAS SKI WEEK: An Eleven Year Tradition

Here we are, several hundred SCSC skiers and party-goers ready to take off in this month for the biggest week of activities and fun of the ski club year! But how many of you know what Texas Ski Week really is? First, a little background ... then an overview of Space City's accomplishments at Texas Ski Week over the past ten years.

Did you know that Texas Ski Week is a unique event, but not for just *any* Texan? Texas Ski Week is **ONLY** for **TEXAS SKI COUNCIL MEMBER CLUBS.** You can't participate unless you are a member of a Texas Ski Council club.

Texas Ski Week is the TEXAS SKI COUNCIL. Without the combined clout and sheer numbers of all the Texas ski clubs acting in an organized fashion, do you think that 15 ski resorts would be interested in sending representatives carrying bids completed to TSC specifications all the way to Texas, and then wait through two days (19 hours this year) of negotiations to hear the Council's choice for the next TEXAS SKI WEEK? It was a difficult decision to make and SCSC officers and representatives were an integral part of the decision making process, sitting through grueling meetings for 2 days, hoping to reach a decision that would benefit YOU, the SCSC member.

Texas Ski Week is very BIG business with the ski resorts. (Total volume to the ski industry is 1.5 million dollars.) Currently the resorts ONLY deal with the TEXAS SKI COUNCIL at this magnitude. They have been ençouraging other organizations throughout the country who have heard about Texas Ski Week to organize and pattern themselves after the Texas Ski Council. The Texas Ski Council's bidding process has become a trendsetter (*i.e. Snowmass this year* presented a bid including \$12 and \$14 a day lift ticket packages when their regular rate is \$22/day - something never before offered to any other organization).

TEXAS SKI CUP COMPETITION HIGHLIGHT OF SKI WEEK

Many of you signed up for Texas Ski Week without any knowledge of the centerpiece of Texas Ski Week .. the competition for the Texas Ski Cup. You hear a lot about racing in connection with Texas Ski Week, but you may still say, "Why should I race?" Having been with the club on several of the Texas Ski Weeks when we DID win the Texas Ski Cup, I can assure you, as many of you who were on those trips know, there is no better way to cap off a super week than to celebrate being #1 with all your fellow SCSCers on Awards night.

In order to reach that goal of #1, you should race for several reasons:

1. The race is run on a NASTAR course and any skier of any ability can complete the course. (If you've never raced before, there will be clinics available which will give you practice before the actual race.)

2. Each SCSC skier who races and completes the course will earn the club AT LEAST one point for completing the course, NO MATTER HOW SLOWLY IT IS COMPLETED. (And if you're fast, you earn more points!)

3. Since the race is on a NASTAR course, you will also be eligible to win NASTAR medals for your time during the club race. (Medals give us even more points!)

Although Space City cannot (and would not) *force* every person on the TSW I, II, III, and Aspen Traditional Trips to participate in the Texas Ski Cup competition, you are definitely *expected* to participate. THIS IS THE REAL REASON WE'RE ALL GO-ING UP THERE!

INDIVIDUAL RACES

In addition to the Texas Ski Cup race, an individual race, based on scratch time only (no handicapping) is run during the week, pitting the top skiers from each club in competition against each other and for individual trophies. Early success came to Space City in this area when SCSC women swept all three top awards in the 1974 female competition at Vail during the first annual Texas Ski Week. (1st -Monique Guentenperdger - (now Knox), 2nd - Paula Tucker, 3rd - Kay Nevels). Our most recent success in this area was last year's 2nd place win by Shirley Andries at the 10th Annual Texas Ski Week. (There have been other men and women in between, but complete records seem to be nonexistent.)

SCSC AND THE TEXAS SKI CUP

Space City has always made a strong showing in the race for the Texas Ski Cup. For those of you who do not already know, Space City has (cont. on page 5)

Each participant who completes the Texas Ski Council club race course will gain AT LEAST one point in the Club competition. The two sample age brackets (above) from the extended NASTAR scoring chart show how SCSC can get extra points even if you are not a medal winner. The percentages represent the percent of time each participant can be away from the pacesetter's par time in order to get the points indicated.

won the Texas Ski Cup 5 out of the 10 past years since the first competition in Vail. Three of those wins came in consecutive years, qualifying Space City to receive a permanent banner from the Texas Ski Council in recognition of this accomplishment. However, the University of Texas Ski Club has won for the past two years, making them eligible for a permanent trophy if they should win the Texas Ski Cup, again,

The Office of Vice-President of Programs

Who's the person in charge of your Club when the President is gone? The Vice President of Programs is second in command and is also in charge of the 9 club meetings for 1400 members who get together for one purpose ... SKIING ... Outside of skiing, the members probably have 1400 other activities they enjoy and would like as part of their club. As the Vice President of Programs (VPP), he/she is responsible for such social activities and non-ski trips.

The VPP is important because the non-ski activities are good training grounds for the volunteers that make your Club possible. The VPP probably coordinated such an activity at one time and has worked in your Club for several years. Also, the VPP is one of the seven officers who will serve an extended year on the Board of Directors or may be elected to President before serving on the Board.

In scanning the **SitzMarkes** of ten years ago, we find four outside activities other than the nine general meetings: a weekend to the horse races, Wurstfest at New Braunfels, BBQ party at the Houston Yacht Club (now the Summer Bash), and a Luau at Galveston Island. The \$10 membership fee also allowed you a choice of nine ski trips for 861 skiers (577 single/284 married).

The duties for the nine monthly meetings ten years ago were fairly simple, with an agenda of movies, style show and the traditional follies that covered ski events for the year. Guest speakers were two Olympic gold medal



winners speaking on racing and ballet skiing.

As the years have progressed, the purpose of the Club has remained skiing. The membership was frozen at 1400 due to the tremendous pressure on our volunteer officers. Cash flow has increased to a quarter-million dollars and membership is now \$20.

Today, the VP of Programs (VPP) is still responsible for nine monthly meetings but there is more emphasis on skiing safety. More programs are aimed at informing the members how to care for ski equipment, doctor's notes, and information for beginners. For the body, today's programs still keep the club informed on the latest ski fashions, but more outside activities have been added for keeping the body in shape: exercise clinics, ski lessons, shape-up-day in the park, jogging, and canoeing, as well as tournaments for tennis, softball, and racquet ball.

The large monthly meetings have grown until this past September's



meeting (always our largest) added a new twist to avoid a long entrance line by handing out sequence numbers for admitance into the trip sign-up room. At the monthly meeting too many people can cause uncontrollable noise, but it's a noise of happiness as it provides a meeting place for the members to see long lost or newly acquired ski buddies, or a friend they approved for membership. However, the age-old concern for a room large enough for our crowds never dies as skiing becomes more and more popular, but our current location and split rooms for "listening" and "talking" seem to solve some of that problem.

The membership talents still blossom at the follies, but now the follies is a close second to a broadway play - showing talents in singing, dancing, acting, and scenery art. We're also discovering artists in the field of photography with an annual photo contest. Close friends have developed and meeting each other has expanded into monthly happy hours. Now we even venture to different parts of Mexico for shopping or scuba diving, and camping trips, casino parties, or sailing to Red Fish Island. Yes, non-ski activities are a good training ground for our ski Trip Chairmen and Assistant Chairmen, who may also be your future officers.

The VPP has the exciting job of finding these volunteers and meeting people that will be the core of the Club in several years. It's exciting to see people get involved and see personalities change as people gain organizational experience and pull together for a Club they believe in. As new people get involved, the VPP enjoys the personal creativity of developing activities and programs, and training that is so necessary for a Club of this size. The VPP needs you, as a member, for volunteering and for input on activities, so don't be bashful to continue to volunteer or add input.

However, just the fact that you, as a member, requested an activity is not enough to create a successful activity. Much coordination and planning is (cont., page 7)

needed. A calendar of events has to be laid out for the complete year and coordinated with volunteers. Too much of one activity can cause poor attendance because it was not popular with the majority, OR too many people in attendance at some functions can be a disaster if the numbers are not planned for.

And don't forget, as a non-profit organization, we don't want to lose money or make money on a function. So a budget is important, and all activities have a chairman with a budget that must be monitored by the VPP. The budget is then presented to the Executive Committee for review and approval.

Even after ten years, you will still find your VPP arriving early to set up the tables while making sure the volunteers are arriving and setting up before the doors open; preparing for a main speaker, but cringing when no one seems to listen (yet your officer listens patiently when someone says we need more speakers); arranging for your voting on a by-law change as well as an honest election for the new officers; hiding from McIntyre or Ron Smith (officer's inside joke) to avoid explaining why there are not enough bartenders working; and smiling in

amazement that another meeting was pulled together.

Did you remember as you left, happy and content, that you left your drink glass on the floor? Did you listen to the program that you griped about not having, but was arranged for your benefit? Your VPP will still be at the meeting long after you have left, checking budgets; working on a few more details and wondering what to plan for a volunteer party, at the end of the year, to show the volunteers appreciation for helping and caring; and thinking of all the valuable experience that he/she has acquired as well as the personal pleasure of being creative in a variety of activities.

Today, for the VPP, there are more activities to coordinate, still nine general meetings a year, executive committee meetings monthly, and quarterly board of director meetings. The VPP, as well as all executive officers, should attend the pre- and post- trip parties. Every non-ski activity requires a meeting with the chairman, and some members expect the VPP to be at every function. Some of those functions require special arrangements with several visits to the area. Speakers must be requested in advance for meeting programs and/or safety tips presented. When a chairman drops the action, your VPP must also carry on so YOU'RE not aware of a problem.

Space City Ski Club is a well rounded Club with ski information, spirits to consume, companionship, and good organization. But most of all, we are a Club that promotes snow skiing. Space City is your ski Club, a Club that your VP of Programs officer helps to make possible because another VPP helped by volunteering and training.



Hotel Portillo stands alone on the mountain pass between Chile and Argentina. The only evidence of a ski area were the several lifts starting upward from the hotel.



Hotel Portillo was constructed in the 1930's, and has all the charm and atmosphere that a rustic ski chalet should have. The hotel is equipped with all the necessary functions to sustain life, a large bar, ski shop and other items. The entire area, including the hotel, is located on military property, which accounts for the lack of a fantastic night life.

During the day, Portillo is a wide expanse of bowls, chutes, and meadow skiing, all above the tree line. Only fifteen kilometers from the highest point in the western hemisphere, Portillo is a top of the world, (or bottom depending upon your point of reference) ski area. With a base of thirty feet at the end of the season in October, the mountains of Portillo had received the best snow in Chilean recorded history.





REPORT FROM TEXAS SKI COUNCIL

The fall quarterly meeting of the Texas Ski Council Board of Directors was held in Houston on December 5th. The main topic of discussion was the upcoming Texas Ski Week - 1983. Representatives from **Texas Skier** magazine, Aspen Skiing Company/Snowmass, Coors, Continental, and the United States Ski Association were special guest speakers.

Plans for Texas Ski Week were finalized, with everything from broomball and the Texas Olympics to C&W dancing and an Aspen night - all organized around the Texas Ski Cup races.

Due to the unprecedented numbers of Texans planning to participate in this Texas Ski Week (over 1,700 at last count), the Texas Ski Cup race will be spread over three days, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. Through the luck of the draw, Space City's placement in the order of racing will probably be on Thursday afternoon.

Each Texas Ski Week participant will receive a "goodie" bag upon arrival, including a schedule of events (produced by **Texas Skier** magazine), favors from Coors and Salomon, and a special Texas Ski Week bandana from Continental Airlines.

T-shirts being produced through **Texas Skier** magazine for Texas Ski Week will feature the ski week badge on the front - a gold five-pointed sheriff's badge enclosed by a circle. All Council Satellite trip T-shirts will be blue and feature a Texas-style skier above the name of the ski area hosting the event.

The Satellite trip program is proving to be very successful this year, with 449 participants from ten clubs at Keystone, 399 from nine clubs signed up for Copper Mountain, 322 from nine clubs for Purgatory, and 210 from nine clubs for Sun Valley. The Texas Ski Council Trip Coordinator for the Copper Mountain trip has resigned and Space City member **Janet Pickell** was selected as the replacement.

Bid requests for the 1983-84 season have been sent out to all the ski areas. There will be a pre-selection - by Tania Andrasko

elimination by a 7 member committee elected by the Board of Delegates, and the final area selections will be made from ski area bid presentations at the council's winter quarterly meeting, to be held in San Antonio, February 26 & 27, 1983.

Texas Ski Council incorporation was officially completed at the meeting as well. Our thanks to **Keith Eastin**, Space City delegate to the Texas Ski Council, for his hours completing the legal work necessary for incorporation.

John Cassidy, United States Ski Association representative (USSA), invited each of the 15 Texas Ski Council clubs to join in the organization and formation of the recently reorganized Rocky Mountain Region of the USSA. Mr. Cassidy mentioned the advantages of membership in the USSA, with its discounts, coupons, newsletter, etc. The Council clubs expressed their desire to have a bigger voice in the RMR and USSA's organization and operation if they should decide to join. Club membership in USSA allows individual members to join USSA for a \$4 discount.






