As Space City begins its 1983-1984 season, most of you are thinking SUMMER & FUN. But some of us, specifically your new executive committee, are already well into planning your winter activities for the coming ski year.

John Cook and the recently appointed Directors of Trips, Dick Howard and Debbie Ball, have been hard at work on plans for Space City's nineteenth ski season. In addition to the previously announced Texas Ski Council trips to Sun Valley for Texas Ski Week, Keystone, Crested Butte, Heavenly Valley and Breckenridge, strong consideration is being given to trips to Big Sky, Montana, Snowbird and Alta in Utah, a pre-Texas Ski Week race clinic, Aspen, Vail and a much-requested trip to Europe.

Keeping the response to our 1982-83 schedule of trips in mind, as well as the forecasted economic climate of Houston for 1983-84, one or two "Trips of Opportunity" (for want of a better name) or "Mystery" trips may be scheduled for the spring. For these we would wait to see what the snow conditions are, where the bargains are, and whether we still have more people desiring trips than space available on our permanent schedule.

For those of you not quite prepared to think about snow while our beautiful spring days are upon us, Kay Broad has organized an outstanding series of summer activities, including everything from a tubing trip, to scuba lessons, and our old mainstay, the Summer Bash. A reminder to newer members of the Club - we do not hold general meetings during the summer months -so be sure to come to the May meeting to sign up for summer activities, or contact the coordinators listed in the activity ads. A change in our Standing Rules. made by the Board of Directors last year, is now in effect and concerns your membership renewal. The renewal period is now May 1-31 each year. This shortened, and earlier, renewal period solves several problems we have had in the past - a membership period that did not coincide with the April 30 fiscal year of the Club, cash-flow problems when lodging and air-fare deposits for ski trips are due in the summer, and Sitzmarkes continuing to be sent to nonrenewing members throughout most of the summer, while new members coming from the wait-list had to wait until August to find out if they were in the Club.

Please be sure to fill out this survey, as this is the first time in several years Space City has attempted to get a written, analyzable, response from the membership as to your interests in ski and non-ski activities and club operations.

Glenn is presently plugging away at inputting all of the new membership information into our new Apple computer, the purchase of which was approved by the Board of Directors on March 30.

Our thanks to the Computer Committee, **Ron Smith**, Layna Adams and Jan Livingston, for their research and recommendations. Glenn will be using the services of his new Data Processing/Input Committee to complete the input process in a timely manner for the May 31 renewal deadline. So, GET THAT APPLICA-TION IN, NOW! Or - save 20c and bring it to the May 9 meeting.




GRITCH, GRITCH, GRITCH

Ever wonder what happens to the trip critiques you fill in? In this report I will highlight some of the most frequently mentioned comments of Texas Ski Week and other Council supported trips. They are as follows:

- Bigger is not necessarily better. While most participants enjoyed TSW, some missed the closeness other SCSC trips have afforded them.
- We need more verbal communication to participants in addition to the Council program handout; e.g., where do we meet, are we going as a group, how do we get there.
- Would like less emphasis on activities provided by TSC with exception of races.
- Would prefer more SCSC early evening gettogethers, but not in overcrowded condo, to become better acquainted with our own members, not people from other clubs we will never see again.
- A few of you would like a race team and trips for racers only.
- First-time skiers would like more attention given to their needs.
- It may be an understatement, but many of you feel we should not go to ski areas at semester or spring breaks.

These highlights are a summation of the improvement or comments section of the trip critiques that have been turned in as of this writing. This information will be very useful in planning future trips.

Look for the drop box at the membership table at the May meeting or fill out the membership form that is included in this month's **Sitzmarke** and put it into the mail TODAY.



WHAT SKIS SHOULD AND SHOULDN'T DO

The language of ski performance is neither exact nor well-defined. As a result, communication between skiers is often less than precise. However, here are some of the most often used words with their most often intended meanings.

Neutral-A ski performs best when it is neutral. It behaves exactly as expected when handled by a

YOU NEED LONGER SKIS IF: You tend to fall over backwards often. · Your skis wobble and clatter a lot, making a steady balanced stance difficult.

• The unsteadiness of your skis increases as your speed increases. • Your skis are so easily started into the turns that you often seem to turn more sharply than intended.

 It's difficult to vary the radius of your turns, and especially to make smooth long-radius turns. • Turns are easier to start than to

finish.

· You are not able to keep up with skiers of your own weight while schussing easy slopes.

 You pitch back and forth with a sort of uncomfortable bucking motion when skiing over small bumps.

· You are not making any learning progress.

good skier. It neither oversteers nor understeers.

Oversteer - A ski is said to oversteer when it continues turning of its own accord, especially as you guide it off the fall line. Such skis are sometimes said to be "hooky."

Understeer - A ski is said to understeer if when it is turned from its original direction it tends to continue moving in that direction even though it is no longer pointed that way. An automobile, for example, understeers when the front end breaks loose—continuing in a straight line—from the curve you steered it in.

Washout - Less-discriminating skiers say a ski washes out when they can't make it hold a carving rack. More-discriminating skiers will specify whether it is the tails that wash out—similar in effect to the fronts being hooky—or whether it is the fronts that wash out, which is understeer.

Chatter-This word is often confused with "clatter." Clatter is simply the noise made when your skis bang together, especially during a turn. Chatter also occurs during a turn, but it is more serious. Chatter occurs when the skis alternate very quickly (several times per second) between carving and skid-

ding. It's a sort of unwanted, intermittent, rapid biting and releasing of the edges, which is both tiring and inefficient. It occurs while turning on hard snow when you are going too fast for the skis to hold your desired curve. The skis might chatter because they are too short for the speed at which you travel, or too stiff.

YOU NEED SHORTER SKIS IF:

- You find it especially hard to
- ski big moguls.
- Every turn is an effort, especially at slower speeds.

You have to unweight your skis substantially for each turn.

 Your legs get tired easily, even though you are in reasonably good shape.

You have difficulty making short-radius turns at any speed.

• Skiing seems to take too much physical exertion, and is too fatiguing.

• You are not in as good shape as you used to be, your legs especially being weaker.

You are concerned about injur-

ing yourself. • The skis more often control you, rather than vice-versa. Your turning skills don't seem to be improving.

 You get moving too fast too soon on steep slopes.


