It was fun seeing everyone at the September meeting after the summer break. All of you look like you are ready and rarin' to go skiing!

You certainly were ready to sign up for trips -about 89% of the members in attendance signed up, or got on waiting lists, for this year's ski trips. Several *must* be going on more than one trip this year.

A cursory review of the past few seasons' first meetings produced some interesting facts. Eighty percent of all available trip spaces filled during 1981's September meeting, with waiting lists on three trips.

Available spaces in 1982 were 84% full with five trips having waiting lists. This year, although 50 more spaces were offered than in 1982, 87% of the available spaces were full and seven trips showed waiting lists.

I'd like to believe these improvements are the result of several developments. Apparently, a higher percentage of our total membership is going on ski trips each year, enabling us to increase trip capacity while maintaining a stable

Our group "clout" has begun to show in the low prices and the high quality of activities of TSC trips. Plus, the few deals we have been able to use this year in the way of air fares for all our trips are due to TSC efforts. By the way, did you know your membership with SCSC automatically makes you a member of TSC?

Membership V. P. Glenn Bishop indicated after the September meeting that our membership is now at 1240 and still growing. We'd like to extend a warm welcome to the 87 new members who filed applications for membership at that meeting and to all our other recently joined friends.

A strong suggestion might be made here. You'll get to know us and better enjoy your time with us at meetings and other activities if you go on a ski trip as soon as possible. Praise is due our

volunteers for the excellent organization of the September meeting. Lou Schultz, Sherry Lewis and their Liftliners should be commended for directing traffic both outside, in the waiting rooms and inside at the trip tables. The door guards did an outstanding job of holding back the "thundering herd" at the entrance and providing a



smooth, steady flow to the membership tables.

Glenn Bishop and his membership table volunteers got everyone checked into the meeting in an orderly fashion. Program VP Kay Broad arranged for the meeting room layout and entertaining ski films in the waiting areas. Linda Licarione and Linda Henderson coordinated the personnel working the drink ticket tables and the SCSC logo items that are on sale.

And last, but certainly not least, thanks to all the current officers and Board members who provided help wherever needed, especially the "body wall" at our one gap in the entrance table barricade. Please note the

changes on this month's trip schedule. Some prices and arrangements on a few trips have been changed due to this year's challenging situation with the airlines. As you may already be aware, airlines are going through a transition period...they're trying to start making money for a change!

Because of this, air arrangements have literally been up in the "air" more than once this summer. We are doing our best to get the lowest fares available under ever-changing conditions and to lock in prices wherever possible.

This year, the first in recent memory, our air arrangements are spread throughout much of the available industry... Western, Delta, United, Frontier, and we are even sharing a charter with Clear Lake Area Ski Club on Air-Cal to Heavenly Valley.

When November leaves turn golden and temperatures turn wintry, Ray Naudain wishes he still lived in Utah to be close to the slopes.

It's not that Ray learned to ski as a youngster; indeed, he was born and raised in Hockessin, Del., within an hour's drive of Spring Mountain in the foothills of the Poconos. (Spring Mountain has a 150-foot vertical and has the audacity to publicize itself as the "Mt. Everest of the East.")

Besides being home to Ray, Hockessin is known for producing DuPont executives and mushrooms. It seems Hockessin also uses superlatives - "Mushroom Capitol of the World." But, Ray is definitely not the type to hide in underground caverns, stay in the dark and thrive on horse manure.


And, Ray did not learn to ski at Davis and Elkins College in Maryland, where his dream was to become an officer in the U. S. Air Force. Ray did, however, join R.O.T.C. and march around a lot.

Ray prefers being outside. He says growing up on a farm not far from the Atlantic coast gave him an appreciation for nature that is evidenced by the earthtones and country scenes decorating his home in Houston. "I like anything outside, particularly near water."

Although Ray doesn't remember exactly when he learned to swim, he is an avid sailor, windsurfer, waterskier....just about all water sports. Ray has some advice to novices of all sports.

"Just picture yourself doing the activity well. Put your mind into the sport. Mentally picture yourself doing what you see the experts do, and pretty soon, you'll find yourself improving."

That's why Ray describes his best skiing experience as "every area, every level." Ray psyches himself into doing everything well. Except for maybe when he looks down between his skis and all he sees is sheer ice.

That can be any place on any mountain. The key is to be smart enough to walk around the spot or ski down another trail. Good advice, Ray.

You can see Ray out on the slopes in his comfortable, well-worn vest and ski pants. For the last few seasons, Ray has been skiing on Olin skis and wearing Salomon boots that he recommends for people with narrow feet.

Why did Ray join Space City Ski Club? "Well, I like to ski with a group of people and the club offers better prices and opportunities to meet new folks." He and Dan Mauk had been in the Lubbock Ski Club together, so when Ray was moved to Houston, Dan brought Ray into SCSC.


