
The site of the 1983 Texas Ski Week will be decided at the quarterly



### ARTICLE V: NOMINATION AND ELECTION OF OFFICERS

**Section 1.** ELECTION. There shall be an election of officers held at the annual meeting in March. Election shall be by written ballot unless there is only one nominee for each office. The elected officers shall take office on May 1st.

**Section 2.** DEFINITION. The elected officers shall be a President, Vice President-Programs, Vice President-Trips, Vice President-Membership, Vice President-Publications, Secretary and Treasurer.

**Section 3.** ELIGIBILITY. The only persons eligible to hold office shall be those who have been members for the twelve months preceding the annual meeting.

Section 4. NOMINATING COMMITTEE. There shall be a nominating committee of seven members elected by the Executive Committee prior to the January regular meeting. Not less than four nor more than five past officers of the Club shall serve on this committee. Current officers shall be ineligible to serve. Only persons who have been members for the preceding twelve months shall be eligible for membership on this committee.

**Section 5.** NOMINEES. The Nominating Committee shall present at least one nominee for each office at the regular meeting immediately preceding the annual meeting. Any further nominations from the floor must be made at this regular

meeting. Consent to serve shall have been secured from all nominees.

- 1) Time available,
- 2) Business experience,
- 3) Previous contributions,
- 4) Creativity.
- 5) Enthusiasm ... active participation in Club and related activities,
- 6) Accessibility ... location in Houston vicinity,
- 7) Stability ... risk of relocation,
- 8) Balance ... male/female, and
- 9) Team work complementary leaders.

In addition to the above, the Nominating Committee considered the following special criteria for each office:

President -run meetings, public relations, previous office held..

Programs - creativity, find and develop new leaders...

Trips - run meetings, organize, negotiate...

Membership - organize, phone access, handle details...

Publications - organize, write, creativity...

Secretary - communication skills...

Treasurer - business sense, head off problems, budget, etc...

It should be noted that the By-Laws allow additional nominations from the floor at the February Meeting.

The election will be held at the March Annual Meeting.

A tremendous amount of work takes place behind the scenes for the VP-Publications. The job is extremely demanding and time consuming, due to its strict deadline schedule and monthly mailout. Consequently, the VP-Publications job is continual throughout the year with the critical deadline months being September through May because of advance notice needed for club meetings and pertinent ski trip information.

The first and most important consideration when performing this job is organization. Early thought and preparation will create an enjoyable and smooth-running operation. Beth Nolen found that organization was the key to a successful year. Soon after Beth took office, she was able to line-up 12 volunteers to contribute feature articles and initiated a photograph contest with winning photos being used as Sitzmarke covers throughout the year.

Most SCSC officers will agree that volunteers are not always easily found. Although computerized volunteer lists are utilized, dependable people are hard to come by, and friends are usually called upon. Carol Ragan agrees that her biggest problem is finding volunteers, especially to assist in advertising throughout the year. The task of contacting businesses, arranging meetings with potential advertisers, and follow-thru work is actually by itself, a full-time job. To alleviate this problem, Carol would like to suggest a bylaw be initiated whereby the current VP-Publications Officer would automatically assume the advertising responsibilities when becoming an Officer on the Board of Directors.

However, not all of the past Publications Officers have had similar problems. Diane Matthews admits she had an excess of articles and pictures during her term of office. It appears that there were a number of enthusiastic members extremely eager to display their broad knowledge and talent! Vickie Schmid Faulkner adds that she had no problem in acquiring advertising - in fact, advertisers were contacting her!

After recruitment of volunteers and

establishment of deadlines, the actual procedure for Sitzmarke preparation is initiated. All articles submitted by the monthly deadline are edited and taken to the printer for typesetting. The typesetting is returned to the Publications Officer for proofing and the actual layout process commences with the precise placement of articles, pictures and ads. Cunthia Lackey describes this task as being the most demanding because of the exactness of the work and the time involved. It is also at this particular stage when true creative talent can really be expressed! After completion, the layout is returned to the printer for camera set-up. The Publications Officer then final proofs, and the Sitzmarke is mailed.

It's alot of hard work, but can be a fun and extremely rewarding job. When interviewed about her past office, Linda McDuffie commented that the job was very enjoyable because of the freedom involved in editing and in the selection of articles, pictures and artwork. Linda was additionally able to display her artistic talent by designing graphics for the Sitzmarke covers.

The **Sitzmarke** is actually a way of communicating the image of SCSC throughout the State and the Rocky Mountain area. It is therefore necessary to prepare a newspaper that is informative, accurate, punctual, and

aesthetically pleasing. Maintaining these qualities throughout the year can prove to be very beneficial when the **Sitzmarke** is submitted for newspaper competition to the USSA-Rocky Mountain Division. This competition occurs in the spring and is judged on a point system. Regional winners advance to national competition.

There is additionally a ski club scrap-book competition each year which is submitted for USSA regional competition. The scrapbook consists of seven volumes with topics such as community service, service to the organization (USSA), ski safety and instruction, social events, etc. Due to the large undertaking of this project, SCSC has not always entered this competition. However, during Diane Yarberry's term of office, enough enthusiastic volunteers were recruited for the scrapbook preparation. Diane admits it was very time consuming but proved to be an extremely creative project and everyone enjoyed the work.

In describing the many responsibilities of the VP-Publications, it is evident that the officer must be very well organized and able to devote a great deal of time to the office throughout the entire year. However, this office is unique in that it offers a great opportunity for self-expression and creativity and can be a very rewarding experience.


