


Head of the Liftline



TREASURING



Expect 40% of the trip participants to show up for the post-trip party. Expect over half of the officers and board members to show at the first 5 or so pre-trip parties. THE ORIENT EXPRESS - ULTIMATE SKI TRIP

"You have Carte Blanche, go anywhere in the world" was Trip V.P. Mo Granda's response to my offer to run a ski trip. What a challenge...the ultimate ski trip. But where to go? Europe? it's been done; New England? I broke my leg skiing ice there; Portillo or New Zealand? too much lead time required; Japan? do they ski there?

It was not easy to find out about skiing in Japan. The 1972 Winter Olympics were held in Sapporo and a World Cup event took place in Furano in 1980. However, the American press has avoided coverage of the inscrutable Japanese skier. English descriptions of the ski areas were virtually impossible to find. Only an occasional travel writer, who didn't know a lift line from a waist line, would mention the million plus visitors to the Sapporo Snow Festival, and wonderful skiing at nearby Olympia. Our man in Tokyo, Gene Holland, provided the best information: a snow report listing more than 100 ski and skating areas, ski articles and pictures published for English speaking residents of Japan and reports from the Tokyo American Club with prices and helpful hints (don't plan on renting large size boots).

Other first hand reports conflicted: crowds vs. no crowds, reckless skiers vs. polite lift line manners; \$100 dinners vs. inexpensive little restaurants. There was only one way to find the truth! Round up sixteen adventurous Texans and head further west.

Around every corner there was a new experience, sight or adventure, Betty Pierce took her first ski lessons from an instructor who could not speak English; Bobbet Olsen interrupted a formal Japanese dinner to feed a wild fox; Roy and Alice Kuchera learned to eat sashimi (sliced raw fish): Jay Castille tinkled the ivories at world famous hotels in Tokyo and Hong Kong; Harold Eaton studied late night culture in Kyoto and was locked out of the inn; Kim Geary learned to avoid the evil pachinko parlors while husband Dec practiced his kamikaze act on the slopes; Sadie Madole found the camera bargain she was seeking while

Lou Erdelyan searched the Orient for an acupuncturist; Sheryl Rogers struck gold in Hong Kong while hubby Bob Tripp ran interference through the crowds; Duff Trimble discovered Kentucky Fried Chicken while wife Angie discovered department stores; Connie Hinshaw found new opportunities to practice her negotiating skills on Hong Kong merchants. Finally, Bob Olsen found enough other things of interest to fill twenty rolls of film.

We found most of the good reports about Japan to be true and the bad reports to be untrue. Our hosts were indeed gracious, helpful, courteous, friendly...the Boy Scouts could not find better role models. Meals were quite reasonable: \$8.50 for beef Sukiyaki and drinks in Furano, \$12 for two hours of beer and Genghis Kahn feasting at the Sapporo Bier Garten, \$13 for dinner, whiskey and floor show at a night club in Sapporo, free samples of delicacies in the Tokyo department stores and \$5 to \$10 dinners in the small restaurants. The above prices include tax and service charge (no tipping in Japan). Gourmet eating adventures were easy on the pocketbook.

Even the lift tickets were reasonable at about \$12 and lift lines were nonexistent! Despite five days of holiday skiing, we waited in short lift lines only 3 or 4 times.

The ski runs at Furano, Tiene Olympia and Tiene Highlands were more than adequate for beginner **Betty** and hot dog **Harold**. Olympia lacked challenging runs while neighboring Highlands had plenty of the steep stuff, powder and trees ... sometimes all on one run. these areas both afford an ocean view and panorama of the city of Sapporo. The City has a population nearing that of Houston, a working transit system *(including a modern subway)* and night life for every taste.

Japanese skiers exercise great control while sliding by in their designer outfits. No blue jeans on the slopes in Japan; interesting because casual attire was appropriate everywhere else. We were the only ones observed screaming down the slopes or crashing tips over tops in the powder. Looking good, or putting on a good show, is important in Japan. One student explained that his countrymen feel shame, as well as discomfort, from a tumble in the snow. Hence, the natives practiced their superb racing form while we had the deep powder to ourselves.

The memories are plentiful. Here are just a few: our first taste of the Orient from the demure Japan Airlines hostesses; looking for our always reliable guides among the throngs at international airports; a walk among the blooming trees in the Japanese garden at the Takanawa Prince Hotel in Tokyo; Spring skiing in Furano ... rain, ice, corn snow changing to powder and packed powder; lunch at the cozy mountain restaurant; backless single chairs on the lifts and hanging on for dear life; new friends waving good-bye as we left Furano.

That's just the beginning. Who could forget the holiday crush of crowds in Tokyo?...at the temples, shopping streets, the zoo or in the subway. Modern architecture contrasted with traditonal pagoda roofs. Learning the correct characters for "exit", "men's" or "ladies" room. Sleeping in the balcony at the Kabuki play. Riding the 130 mph Bullet Train to Kyoto. Participating in a tea ceremony. Watching crafts people make wood block prints, weave silk and decorate cloisonne' vases. Whirlwind visits to an assortment of palaces. temples and shrines. Nearly missing a flight.

Seen along the road: children in school uniforms; grocery stores with otsumi (snacks); and beer and saki vending machines; fish hanging out to dry; hillside rows of tea plants; Mt. Fuji in the haze, modern harbors and bridges, old tile roofs.

The dinners were memorable...sukiyaki in Furano, hairy crab in Sapporo, udon lunch in Tokyo, sashimi and tempura in Kyoto and a ten course Peking Duck banquet in Hong Kong. but those were only the highlights. The noodle shops, bakeries, department stores and specialty shops all tempted our easily seduced palates.

The greatest experiences were our interactions with new acquaintances. We certainly got to know each other well. But the folks who made our trip such a success were new friends. They were helpful, friendly and interesting people like Karrou, call me Carol, who gave us an introduction to Hokkaido. The Prince Hotel desk people who were always happy to write out directions in Japanese to ease communications problems with cab drivers. It seemed all our hosts were willing to laugh with us at our language difficulties. The Japanese we met had a terrific sense of humor and a ready smile. We will long remember Mama San and the lavender bouquet gifts that were our send off from her restaurant in Furano; who could forget the staff at the Iksumatsu Inn in Kyoto? Of course, we could use the family bath but be ready for dinner at 7. We will especially remember two boys and two girls on Spring break in Furano. On the eve of our departure, they left a message: we wish you a safe and peaceful journey.

We found a side of the Orient that the typical tour or business traveller does not get to see. Spending time in the ski areas and off the beaten track allowed us to experience another culture from the inside. The universal camaraderie of skiers opened doors for a unique adventure on the Orient Express. May all your journeys be as safe and peaceful.



By-Law Amendments Election Results

Both proposed amendments were passed at the April General meeting. As amended, the By-Laws will read as follows:

ARTICLE III: Membership: Section 6, first sentence shall now read:

ARTICLE III: Membership: Section 7, shall now read:

Section 7. MEMBERSHIP RENEWAL. Membership in the Club shall be for a period ending April 30 in each year. Applications for renewal of membership may be accepted through May 31 of the respective year; applications received by the Club thereafter shall be treated as though received from an individual seeking to become a new member.




