# What Does Texas Ski Council Do For Me?

(Editor's Note: Sy Liebergot is a past president of SCSC, has this year completed two terms as president of the Texas Ski Council and currently serves as Texas Ski Council Director ExOffic io.)

I have heard the title question just about as often as "What is the Texas Ski Council?'", and I'm sure many of the readers have asked both questions at some time.

I intend to provide some facts and figures that should clearly show what Texas Ski Council (TSC) has accomplished for its member clubs and why it's vital to all of us skiers to support TSC and participate in the joint trips.

First of all, some background: TSC is a non-profit organization of 14 snow ski clubs state wide. The clubs are represented on a Board of Delegates that meets quarterly to conduct its business. The Board of Delegates is administered by an annually elected (and volunteer) 4 -member executive committee. It is important to point out that the success of TSC depends upon the interest and participation of the member clubs SINCE THE COUNCIL IS THE MEMBER CLUBS.

The primary objective of TSC is 'to obtain for its member clubs the highest quality skiing experience for the most economical cost."

Each ski season the TSC member clubs come together on join ski trips for fun, races, and economy. The major joint trip is Texas Ski Week (TSW) which celebrated it tenth anniversary this past January. Additionally, smaller joint trips are organized as economical, quality "mini-Texas Ski Weeks" that are called Satellite trips.

Texas Ski Council began in 1970 with three clubs: SCSC, Sno-Mad Skiers, and Ullr Ski Club. Membership remained small and activities were confined to a Europe trip and getting TSW off the ground - most clubs preferred to "wait and see" what the Council would produce. Fortunately, Continental Airlines became the 1976 TSW sponsor, making the event more attractive, and the growth began.


SCSC has been very influential in the maintenance and development of TSC: the first TSW was organized by SCSC past-president Jim McIntyre and 9 of the 12 TSC presidents have been SCSCers. Needless to say, SCSC has a vested interest in TSC.

TSC has evolved from its tentative beginnings to a credible, business-like organization of fourteen member clubs that account for nearly 50,000 skier days annually and enjoys a significant amount of economic clout with the ski industry. It has become the key to the organized Texas ski market and as such acts as the focal point and main communications link between the clubs and the ski industry.

From the Council vantage point, we have been witnessing a continual decline in skier participation due to the soaring ski trip costs. The ski industry, though slow to accept this reality, has responded positively to TSC's appeal to help reverse the trend.

The first, though tentative, step was taken by the ski industry when nine ski resorts bid for TSC's 1981-82 trips and most acceded to the Council's
request for net rates on lodging and lift tickets. It pleases me to inform you that analysis of the lodging and lift ticket cost for the 1981-82 season (TSW and 3 Satellite trips) produced an average savings of $\$ 59$ per person per trip above and beyond the normal group discounts! (See Table 1 for details.)

The TSC-obtained discounts for the season were highlighted by Aspen Highlands' participation with a wholesale rate for the 4 -mountain, 6 out of 7 days, lift ticket, and freebies amounting to $\$ 15$ per person at TSW and $\$ 10$ per person at Park City.

Prospects for 1982-83 ski season savings appear to be even better. Faced with an ever softening market and recognizing TSC's ability to produce more skier days than many of their wholesalers, 15 ski resorts submitted extremely competitive bids that contained wholesale and near-wholesale lodging and lift ticket prices. It gives me even greater pleasure to inform you that the analysis of the lodging and lift ticket costs for the 1982-83 season (TSW and 4 Satellite trips) indicates an average savings of $\$ 82$ per trip for the individual skier! Again, this savings is above and beyond the normal group discount available to an individual club, and is a $\mathbf{4 6 \%}$ greater savings than in 1981-82. (See Table 2 for details).

John has been a member of Space City since 1979. He completed the running of the Jackson Hole trip in 1981, and was TC for the Sun Valley trip this year. An avid skier, John tries to ski
four to five different places every ski season, and attends Texas Ski Week every year.

John is owner of Environmental Insect Control Systems, Inc., a firm selling livestock spray systems through an international network of distributors. He and his wife Priscilla have two children. John enjoys basketball, water skiing, and softball and coaches little league football in the fall. An owner of several horses, John has been Chairman of the Palomino Horse Show at the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo for the past three years. He is also a member of the Stock and Stolon Club BBQ Cooking Team.

Fellow Trip Director GLENN BISHOP will be assisting STEVE GUCKER in his role as Club Treasurer with special emphasis on the financial transactions associated with the club's trips. Additional duties will involve helping RON SMITH in tallying income from membership dues and TANIA ANDRASKO in billing commercial advertisers in the Sitzmarke.

Glenn has been an active member of SCSC since 1977, participating in many non ski activities, as well as going on at least two ski trip trips a year. He served as ATC on the Breckenridge trip in 1981 and TC on the Riff Raff

trip to Lake Tahoe in 1982. His interests include bowling and softball and membership in the Buffalo Snort Cooking team.

Glenn is a native of Port Arthur, Texas, and came to the University of Houston in 1971, graduating in 1975. He is a senior piping designer at Fluor E. \& C. and has worked there for $51 / 2$ years.

Both Glenn and John will be available to help all the officers throughout the year in any matter or project and can answer most of the members' questions if an officer is not available. Be sure to meet them and let them help you become more familiar with Space City Ski Club and its operations.

Other goodies for 1982-83: TSW at Snowmass will have available a 3 -mountain, 6 out of 7 days, lift ticket for $\$ 12 /$ day as compared to the $\$ 22$ day daily lift ticket. This is the greatest lift ticket discount in the industry. Avis Rental Co. has offered a special TSC national corporate discount card for each member of each TSC club, good for approximately $35 \%$ off (details are still to be finalized). Yet to be approved by the TSC Board of Delegates is an offer by Aspen Airways of their group airfare to any individual that identifies himself as a member of a Texas Ski Council club. Most major airlines have offered a liberal ticket purchase policy to lock in low fares as compared with outright
purchase required last year.
After twelve years, TSC is meeting its prime objective to obtain high quality, low cost ski trips for its members. This is what TSC is charged to do for you and this is what it is doing. But remember what I stated in the beginning of this article - this Council IS the member clubs, of which your ski club is a voting partner.

However, this economic euphoria needs to be tempered with the reality that our Texas clubs now need to deliver the skiers to these ski resorts that are bing so cooperative. The proven way to reduce the cost of ski trips is to access the wholesale rates and this requires that the Texas ski clubs act jointly through an organization such as
the Texas Ski Council. The ski industry responds to numbers of skiers, not just high purpose. When the industry thinks we can deliver, and we do, they deliver. This is called credibility, folks, and it goes a long way in business.

TSC now enjoys the reputation of being one of the best organized and credible ski councils in the country and SCSC is a proud part of it. We all need to be interested in it and support it.
