
NASTAR IS FOR EVERYONE

Want a fun way to improve your skiing? Participate in NASTAR with your fellow skiers on your next trip!

NASTAR, NAtional Standard Race, is designed for skiers of any ability, age and sex. The course is set on an intermediate slope consisting of 12 to 30 gates, comprising a giant slalom course which any skier of any ability can complete. A daily course time is set by the area's pacesetter; this is the "clock" you race against. Gold, silver and bronze medals are awarded to those skiers that ski closest to the course pacesetter's time. Obviously, the closer one skis to that time, the higher the medal qualified for. An allowance (handicap) is made for age and sex: the younger one is, the tougher the medals are to come by, and the older one is, the easier the medals. Additional allowance is given if you are a female. So if you are a real fast old goat or goatess, to use a Liebergotism, you are virtually assured a medal. (See the chart for the percentage your time may be away from the pacesetter's to get a medal.) There is no limit on how many medals can be awarded during any one race day. Approximately 60% of the people racing at an area receive a gold, silver or bronze medal.

Participating in NASTAR improves one's skiing ability. It requires successive turns at specific points on



the slope and skiing in a confined area. Additional improved skills are better weight distribution and sharper reflexes. The ski areas conduct NASTAR clinics weekly to explain and practice start-finish techniques, ski line selection through the course, edge control, ski posture and practice runs on a race course. The lessons learned and practiced on the race course will benefit all recreational skiers regardless of ability, and this is something SCSC endorses.

Races are available during all SCSC trips. Of the more than 130 ski areas conducting NASTAR, Space City has scheduled trips to the following areas: Keystone, Steamboat, Snowmass, Aspen, Copper Mountain, Vail, Purgatory and Sun Valley. Other forms of racing will be available at Mammoth Mountain, and the Canadian version of NASTAR, Mostar (Molsen Beer is the sponsor), is available during the Banff trilp in late January.

On Texas Ski Council Trips (of which Texas Ski Week is the biggest of the year), ski clubs from throughout Texas use the NASTAR program to race against each other in friendly competition and for bragging rights. Each club member that completes the race (no matter how slowly) is awarded a point for his club toward the Ski Council race trophy. Faster times and medals count for more. Therefore, the more club members participating and medals won help SCSC win the race trophy.

Competing in club sponsored NASTAR is an excellent way to meet members of SCSC and other Texas

Example: You are a male 25 years old. Your area pacesetter skis the course and establishes a par time of 34 seconds. You ski the course in 39 seconds. You skied the course 15% slower than the national pacesetter (adjusted by par time).

Finding your age group on the chart and following the line over to the $0\cdot15\%$ category under male, you see you have won a gold medal.



An Unforgetable Skiing Experience

In January 1981, I was invited, along with 350 other Certified Ski Instructors of the Professional Instructors Association, by the Tyrolean Ski Instructors Association and the Austrian Government to participate in Austrian-American Ski Instructors Best Friend program. On the plane in New York I received an insight to how important the Austrian Government felt this program was when the Austrian Ambassador to the United States accompanied us on the trip and welcomed us on the plane.

I am a member in good standing of PSIA and am certified by the Rocky Mountain Ski Instructors Association and was a senior instructor at Taos Ski Valley. In Houston I have taught on carpet surfaced ramps and at The Mountain when it was a ski slope.

The Austrians are masters at organization and hospitality. Our bags and ski equipment were tagged in New York and arrived with us at our destination. Since only 6 were going to a particular area and 2 to a particular lodge, I found it incredible that the bags were at the lodge waiting for us.

We were met at the airport in Munich by Austrians in their native costumes and young Tyrolian girls in native dress with small casks of Schnapps drapped over their shoulders. We sipped Schnapps while we enjoyed the native music. We met our host instructors and were given gifts which included a lovely parka with "SKI HAPPYNING TYROL 81, AUSTRIA" embossed.



We were separated into eight groups and scattered throughout the State of Tyrol. I was with a group that was housed in Fugan, located in the most attractive part of the Ziller Valley. I felt fortunate because it is not an area normally frequented by foreign tourists and I was able to enjoy Austria as a native. I did have a little trouble with the lauguage but the people all knew there were some Americans in the village and they tried to speak English to me most of the time. My friend from Taos Ski Valley, Dadou Mayer, a former French Junior National Champion, was in my group and fortunately he spoke the language.

Fügan is a village of about 2700 inhabitants. There is evidence of a Church being established there in 786 A.D. and around 800 A.D. Fugan became an established parish. It is in a sheltered position in the Alps and has a relatively mild climate.

The first morning we were all transported to Kitzbuhel. We were greeted by the dignitaries of the town and paraded through the town and into a special reserved section at the annual FIS World Cup Hahnenkamm downhill race. We witnessed Franz Klammer, Ingmar Stenmark, Phil and Steve Mayer (USA), and other well known Olympic candidates and medal winners compete.

The next four days were devoted to skiing with our host instructors and other activites of the Zillertal Valley. The snow conditions were excellent. We were entertained by the people in the village. The Burgormeister (Mayor) of Fügan and his wife, hosted a party for us one evening.

Wednesday afternoon was a treat that could not be duplicated anywhere in the world. All of the instructors were bused to Fugan where we boarded a special steam train. It looked like it was right out of an old European movie. The train took us on a tour of the Zillertal valley. Before boarding the train we were entertained by a Tyrolian band and Schnapps. At each station we were met by local Austrian children waving American and Austrian flags, and each community had a special drink and local food to give us. I especially enjoyed the Jägertae (a hot drink with Schnapps, Rum and other ingredients prepared in a cauldron over an open fire). At every stop young Austrian girls boarded the train and stayed aboard for the entire trip. Our destination was Mayerhofen where we dined and were entertained by the Mayerhofen National Singers, Tyrolian musicians and shoeclapper dancers.

The next day we were bused to (continued, page 15)

Innsbrook and the village of Igls, the site of the 1976 Olympic Downhill and Bobsled races. Those who dared, could have a drink of Schnapps and take a ride on the bobsled. Perhaps the biggest thrill of my life was being number 3 man on the 4 man bobsled on the Olympic run at Igls. I have a new appreciation for the sport.

We had lunch outdoors in the Olympic Village. The mayor of Innsbruck and other Austrian dignitaries were in attendance and greeted us with a bond of friendship between Austria and the United States and Ski Instructors in both countries. The bond is especially true between Austrian and American Instructors, for Austria is where the origin of ski instruction began.


Later that day we were bused to a winter carnival being held in our honor at Seefeld. On the slopes we witnessed demonstrations by the different ski schools in Austria, free style exhibitions, floats and games on the snow, and local people in carnival costume of local derivation. There were witches, : monsters, gnomes, and animals who all joined together to drive away any winter evil or fear. There were over 20,000 spectators for these events. They also had hang-glider demonstrations, parachutists, slalom races between the two countries, and zany antics on the hill. I heard one of my fellow instructors say they felt they were in Disneyland. For the entire week I felt as if I had been lured from my bedroom window by Peter Pan and taken on a tour of fantasyland.

The next day we landed in Frankfurt, Germany. The hostages from Iran had landed there the day before. I could not help but think of the different attitudes we must have felt of the countries we each had just departed.

The lure of Austria, and especially the Zellertal Valley will again bring me to Fugan, -- soon I hope.


