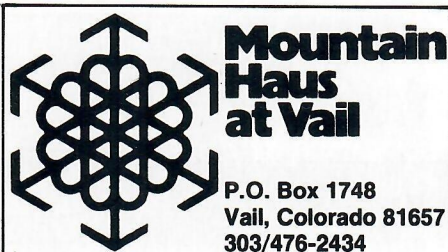


# Head of the Liftline

**K** ...is for **Chuck King** who was seen enjoying the apres ski happy hours.

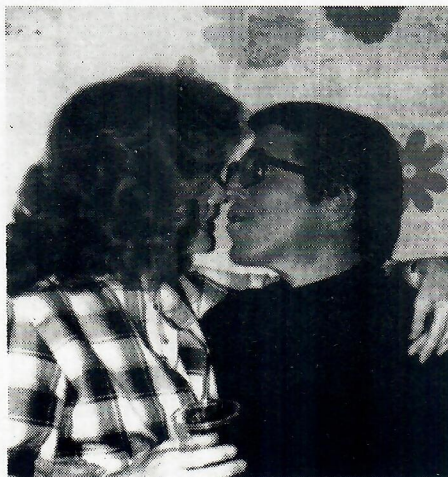

This skier is thankful that all had a good time and returned home safely. Thanks to all that helped on the trip.



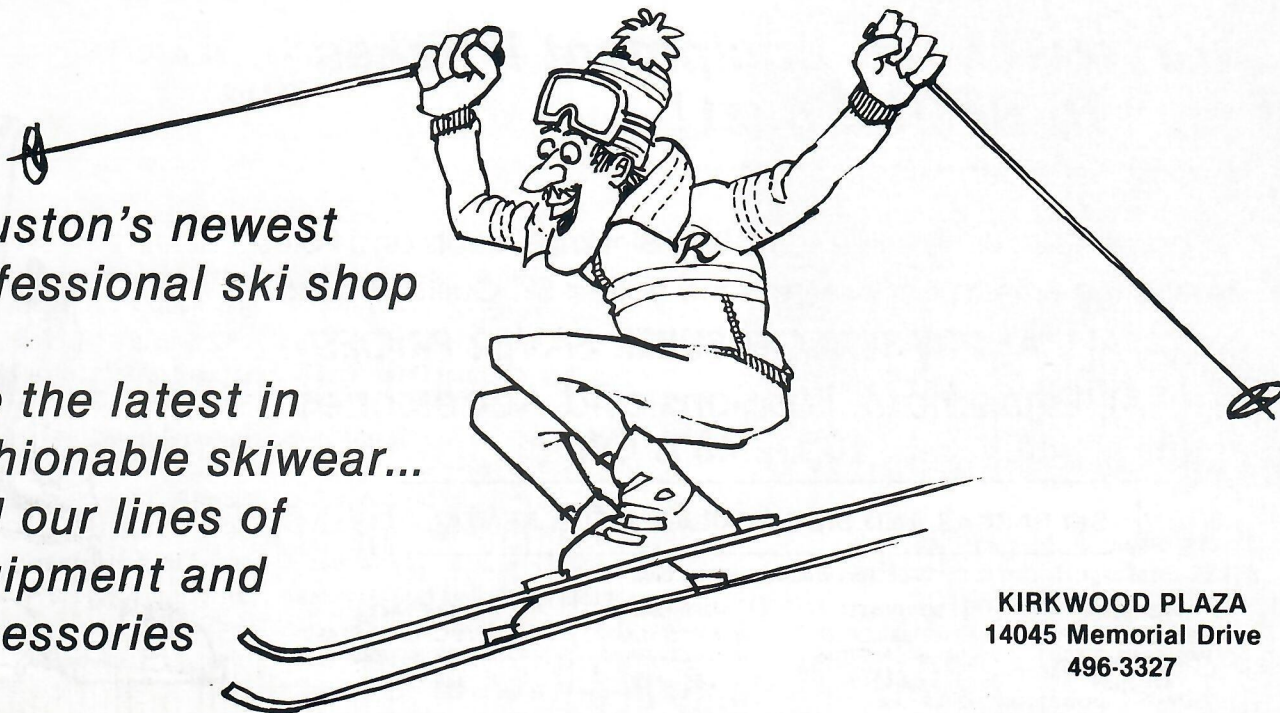

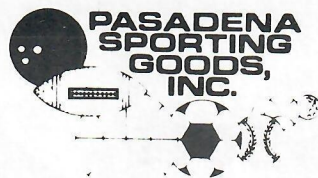
There was an international flavor to our group as Ellie Stern Appleman brought her husband Cole, his brother

Many thanks to Robert Scott and Judy Hendrix for helping to clean up the bus.



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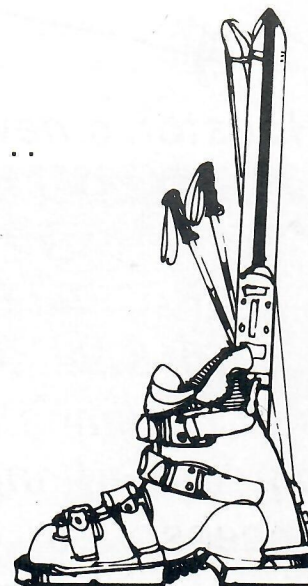
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# Ski by the Rules

You won't find center stripe markers or even a superfluity of signs, but skiing has its own rules of the road which every skier has at least a moral obligation to follow.

They're simple enough, needn't

cramp your style, and once you learn them, will quickly become incorporated into your subconscious actions, much as you steer your auto through traffic.

The payoff is worry-free skiing and safety for both yourself and those with

whom you share the slopes.

The National Ski Patrol System, those nice folks whose lot it is to care for those few unfortunates who suffer the consequences, has established the following guidelines:

**1** All skiers shall ski under control. Control shall mean in such a manner that a skier avoid other skiers or objects.

**2** When skiing downhill and overtaking another skier, the overtaking skier shall avoid the skier below him.

**3** Skiers approaching each other on opposite traverses pass to the right. (Like autos on the highway.)

**4** Skiers shall not stop in a location which will obstruct a trail or unloading area or impede the normal passage of other skiers, and shall not stop at a point where they are not visible from above.

**5** A skier entering a trail or slope from a side or intersecting trail shall first check for approaching downhill skiers.

**6** A standing skier shall check for approaching downhill skiers before starting.

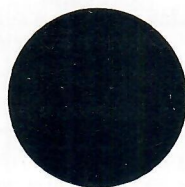
**7** When walking or climbing in a ski area, skis should be worn and the climber or walker shall keep to the side of the trail or slope.

**8** All skiers shall wear safety straps or some other devices to prevent runaway skis.

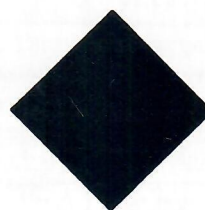
**9** Skiers shall keep off closed trails and posted areas and shall observe all traffic signs and other regulations prescribed by the ski area.

If you still have questions when you reach the ski area, contact a patrolman. He'd much rather help you before an accident than after.

## Trail Signs You Should Know



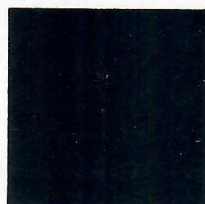

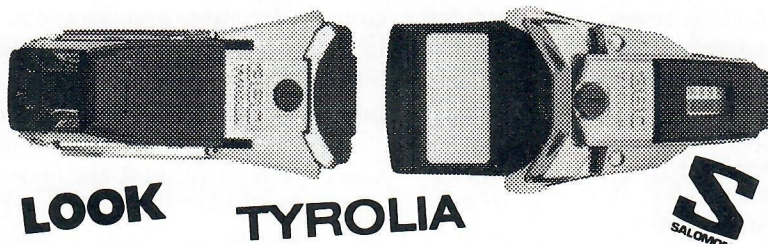

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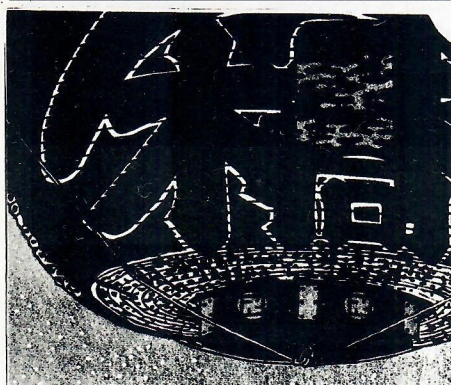

## Foreign Correspondence



Our contact in the Orient, **Gene Holland**, sent us a "Letter from Japan." Gene has signed up for two ski trips with the Tokyo American Club — a group considerably more staid than Space City, he says. The following paragraphs are from his letter, describing his plan ned trips:

"I'm set for 5 days in mid-February in Zao, which is west of Sendai near Yamagata City in northern Honshu about 8 to 9 hours from Tokyo by bus. Sao boasts powder snow, the famous "snow monsters" which are trees contorted by ice and snow into most unusual shapes, 26 lifts, 4 gondolas, a lot of cross-country trails, hot baths in the famous hot spring resort in Zao Village and some apres ski activities. We will sleep on the floor of our room at the Zao Garden Hotel on "tatami mats." The cost is 41,000 yen or about \$195.00 U.S., not counting lunches, lift

tickets, or sake. Latter very important!

My other scheduled trip through the American club is 6 days in Shiga Koken over Easter. This also is a 9 to 10 hour bus trip from Tokyo for only 36,000 yen or about \$172.00, not counting lift tickets or lunch. These costs would be at least double if we did not sleep on the floor of our minshuku or lodge, but opted for a deluxe western-style hotel. However, part of the excitement is staying in these lodges, enjoying the baths, the friendships, the noise, etc.

Shiga is not as varied as Zao, with less night life. So, it will depend on the other foreigners on the trip to provide the camaraderie. Sake is still available, however!"

Gene also said that although it might be novel for Space City to run a trip to Japan, it would be far too crowded and too expensive. Until our next "letter from Japan" — *Sayonara*.



# The Lost Year

*Remember 1980? Many folks doubt that it even existed.*

TULSA, Okla. — With 1981 heaving rapidly into view, disquieting rumor has it that 1980 never was, that it didn't happen.

Although experts remain skeptical, allegations are that some person or persons unknown did in some manner manage to get us from one New Year's Eve to the next without benefit of an intervening year.

In an attempt to pin down these rumors, independent researchers, working feverishly to legitimize 1980 before 1981 takes over, have come up with a disturbing amount of testimony in support of the theory that there was no such year:
