THESE CANDIDATES ARE NOMINATED IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE FOLLOWING CLUB BY-LAWS AND CRITERIA:

ARTICLE V: NOMINATION AND ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Section 1. ELECTION. There shall be an election of officers held at the annual meeting in March. Election shall be by written ballot unless there is only one nominee for each office. The elected officers shall take office on May 1st.

Section 2. DEFINITION. The elected officers shall be a President, Vice President-Programs, Vice President-Trips, Vice President-Membership, Vice President-Publications, Secretary and Treasurer.

Section 3. ELIGIBILITY. The only persons eligible to hold office shall be those who have been members for the twelve months preceding the annual meeting.

Section 4. NOMINATING COMMITTEE. There shall be a nominating committee of seven members elected by the Executive Committee prior to the January regular meeting. Not less than four nor more than five past officers of the Club shall serve on this committee. Current officers shall be ineligible to serve. Only persons who have been members for the preceding twelve months shall be eligible for membership on this committee.

Section 5. NOMINEES. The Nominating Committee shall present one nominee for each office at the regular meeting immediately preceding the annual meeting. Any further nominations from the floor must be made at this regular

meeting. Consent to serve shall have been secured from all nominees.

- 1) Time available,
- 2) Business experience,
- 3) Previous contributions,
- 4) Creativity,
- 5) Enthusiasm ... active participation in Club and related activities,
- 6) Accessibility ... location in Houston vicinity,
- 7) Stability ... risk of relocation,
- 8) Balance ... male/female, and
- 9) Team work - complementary leaders.

In addition to the above, the Nominating Committee considered the following special criteria for each office:

President - run meetings, public relations, previous office held..

Programs - creativity, find and develop new leaders ...

Trips - run meetings, organize, negotiate...

Membership - organize, phone access, handle details...

Publications - organize, write, creativity...

Secretary - communication skills...

Treasurer - business sense - head off problems, budget, etc...

It should be noted that the By-Laws allow additional nominations from the floor at the February Meeting.
The election will be held at the March Annual Meeting.



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
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
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The following is a list published in past *SitzMarkes* telling you what to take on a week-long ski trip. The numbers beside the items are just a suggestion of the quantity, a minimum number. The sentence at the bottom about traveling with one suitcase is most important, though. Who wants to haul two heavy suitcases with clothes you probably won't even wear up and down icy steps?


Below are also some tips on how to pack that suitcase, to get the maximum into the smallest space.

What To Take	How Many
Long Johns	2
Parka	1-2
Ski pants	1-2
Turtleneck shirts	4-6
Gloves or mittens with liners	1-2
Outer (wool) socks	3-4
Inner (silk) socks	2-3
Warm up pants (optional)	1
Face mask (optional)	1
Head band (optional)	1
Ski hat	1
Ski sweaters	2-3
After ski boots	1
Chapstick	1
Goggles/sunglasses	1
Suntan lotion	1
Ben Gay	1
SCSC pin	1
Swim suit	1
Skis / Boots / Poles	
Informal apres ski wear (no coats, ties or dresses)	

If you can't get all the above items in one suitcase, leave something at home.

Remember to carry your parka. It might be cold when you arrive at the area.

We know you want to always look good



while on a ski trip — after all, we are representing Space City Ski Club — as wrinkle-free and neat as you looked at home or in the ski shop dressing room.

Not only will you be carrying clothing bulkier than street wear, some of you will have skis, boots and poles. Use a lightweight suitcase or duffel bag, preferably one with a shoulder strap. Soft bags are the easiest to carry, maneuver and pack the most things in.

An effective packing trick is the "roll and fold" technique. When packing parkas, first empty all pockets, and fasten snaps and zippers. Lay the parka flat, then fold the arms across the front. You can either pack the garment flat or fold it in half over the arms. Fold sweaters the same way, with T-necks opened up and folded down to the chest. Beginning at the bottom of the sweater, roll it loosely up toward the

neck, again making sure the arms and neck are folded inside the roll. Vest may be handled the same way. Rolling also keeps ski pants wrinkle-free when packed. Fold pants at the crease and, beginning at the ankle, roll up toward the waist or bib front.

All of this rolling gets the skiwear down to a manageable size that can be loaded into your suitcase or duffel. Slip glasses and goggles into a ski hat or glove to prevent breakage. Put your after ski boots in plastic bags — helps prevent grime from showing up on the back of your new parka. It is not a bad idea to take a couple of plastic bags to put wet ski wear into when packing to come home.

The easiest packing trick is to take parka, pants, and sweaters that coordinate, not only with each other, but also with apres ski wear.



GLUHWEIN

1/2 cup water
1 cup sugar
Clove studded lemon peel
1 cinnamon stick
1 bottle red wine

Boil water, sugar, lemon peel, cinnamon stick, until the quantity has been reduced to half. Add wine and bring almost to a boil. Serve hot!

HOT APPLE WINE PUNCH

In saucepan, combine:
3 cups apple cider
1/4 cup sugar
3 inches stick cinnamon
6 whole cloves
Peel of 1/4 lemon cut in strips

Bring to boil, stirring till sugar dissolves. Simmer, covered, 15 minutes; strain. Add one 4/5-quart dry white wine and 2 tablespoons lemon juice. Heat through. Serve in preheated mugs. Mm-mmm!

IRISH COFFEE

2 sugar cubes
2 jiggers hot coffee
2 jiggers Irish Whiskey
Dab of whipped cream

Put sugar in bottom of cup, add hot coffee, then the whiskey. Add whipped cream. Do not stir.

PLAYBOY'S HOT BUTTERED

RUM

2 oz. dark Jamaican rum
1/2 teaspoon maraschino liqueur
1 oz. lemon juice
1 teaspoon sugar
1 pat butter, equal to 2 teaspoons
Boiling water
1 slice lemon
Freshly grated nutmeg

Pour rum, maraschino liqueur and lemon juice into 12-oz mug. Add sugar and butter. Fill with boiling water. Stir to melt butter and dissolve sugar. Add lemon slice. Grate nutmeg on top. (As served at the Lake Geneva Playboy Club-Hotel.)

MEXICAN COFFEE

1 oz. Kahlua coffee liqueur
4 ozs. fresh, hot black coffee
Ground cinnamon
Sweetened whipped cream


Pour liqueur and coffee into Irish-coffee glass. Sprinkle with cinnamon. Stir. Top with whipped cream. (As served in the Chicago Playboy Club.)

SWEDISH GLOGG

(Serves 6 to 8)

1 fifth dry red wine
1/2 cup sugar
16 whole cloves
8 two-inch pieces stick cinnamon
1 cup brandy
Raisins
Peeled unsalted almonds

In a large saucepan, combine the wine, sugar, cloves and stick cinnamon. Bring to the boiling point. Reduce flame and simmer 5 to 8 minutes. Stir in the brandy. Pop a few raisins and almonds in each mug or glass. Add the glogg and serve.



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




