

Ballots will be handed out at the October meeting and judging will by the membership. Mail Entries To:





ARE YOU READY FOR ... SKI SEASON!!! by Steve VanPelt



The first meeting of the Space City Ski Club marks the start of the new ski season. The ski magazines are starting to show up on the newsstands again. Between their covers are the latest in ski equipment, ski clothes, and the great places to go skiing. But what about all the stuff you already have? Where has it been since your last ski trip; in the closet? in the garage? in the attic?

Part of the enjoyment of skiing can be enhanced by having a prepared body, clothes, and equipment and there is no time like the present to start. Now is the time to go find them and inspect them for wear and tear, to see if they still fit, and to see how dirty and wrinkled they are. Repairing the tears and loose seams is a simple precedure with needle and thread. If they don't fit, you can either start on a diet and exercise program or buy the larger size that fits. (Besides with the Labor Day Ski Sales coming up, at least you can get a small discount on new clothes). If you are one of the lucky ones that find your clothes are too big maybe you can find someone to trade with. Of course it is time to get your clothes cleaned.

Where have your skis, boots, and poles been all summer? Regardless of where they were "stored" the equipment needs to be looked at closely. Check the bottom of your skis for signs of rust, dried salt and/or dirt and check the operation of your bindings. Check your poles to see how badly they are bent, and that the straps and baskets are intact. Your boots need to be checked for dirt and wear and tear. Also remember where your boots hurt your feet last season? Before the Thanksgiving and Christmas rush, it is time to have your skis tuned and waxed. (Tell the repairman not to scrape the wax off



because it will protect your bases until you are ready to ski.) Have the repairman clean, lubricate, and check the operation of your bindings. Replace any broken or missing parts on your poles. Sometimes your boots can be "punched out" to reline those pressure spots ask your repairman about it. Now is a good time to turn your boots over (so they are resting on their tops) so the flow material can spread out more evenly.

Now about your body. It is past time to get started to prepare yourself for skiing. You need to get started on a program of exercise that gets your heart rate to 70% - 80% of your maximum heart rate (roughly 220 minus your age) every other day for about 30 minutes. The way you get your heart rate up is up to you. Usually it can be done by jogging, bicycling, or swimming. Remember to start out slowly and make it fun.

It is the time to get started preparing for the ski season. With your equipment and clothes in good shape and your body ready, skiing can't help but be the best ever!





ALMOST EVERYTHING ELSE YOU WANTED TO KNOW ABOUT TEXAS SKI COUNCIL ...

I was glad to see some response to my last article. The comments were interesting to say the least.

Now that most of the routine organizational stuff has been covered, it's time to look at the important things.

1. Texas Ski Week '82 will be at Copper Mountain and Satellite trips have been planned for Aspen, Winter Park, and Park City. How were these sites selected.

Every year the February meeting of the council is devoted to site selection. A basic outline of the council requirements is sent to most ski areas. A formal bid presentation for Texas Ski Week is then made by the areas at the February meeting. Generally no verbal presentations are made with Satellite bids. These proposals include reduced lodging. lift ticket, lesson, and rental rates and a proposed schedule of events. The Board of Delegates then selects the sites they feel best meet the needs of their clubs and the Council. Last year this meeting covered two days because of the number of bids. More time was needed to adequately review the bids.

2. Will there be snow at Copper Mountain this year?

It snowed on the mountain top Friday. Two of the past seven years have been marginal snow years. The first resulted in snow making equipment being installed at many areas. After last year, areas are increasing that capacity. Copper Mountain will be able to cover 60% to 70% of the mountain with man-made snow. This area includes many runs, the base areas, and both runs that will be used for the races.

3. What are the benefits derived from sponsors for Texas Ski Week?

Most of the goodies at Texas Ski Week are made possible by sponsorship. Seven years ago TSW had several hundred participants. Last year 1400 were signed up to participate. This growth corresponds with sponsorship by Continental Airlines the last six years. Last year Coors was an equal cosponsor. The sponsors supply most of the promotional material which includes the badge, posters, racing banners and bibs, trophies, and the awards banquet. There are usually minor sponsors for some of the events and nightly parties. Obviously the quality of TSW would be less without sponsors and their amenities.


4. Will Texas Ski Week '82 have sponsors?

Yes, Continental and Coors will again be major cosponsors. Copper Mountain will obtain several minor sponsors.

5. An "activity fee" has been charged at Texas Ski Week. What does this fee cover? In the past this fee has mainly covered racing costs and a partial travel allowance for TSC officers. Last year was the first year a significant fee was charged. This covered the printed events schedule, the cost of parties and live entertainment **every** night and the racing costs along with several minor items.

Unfortunately a detailed budget and final cost report were not received, so it is difficult to determine the exact use of the fee. The Council is concerned about this and will require a detailed accounting of funds for Texas Ski Week '82. We also hope to keep this years fee to a minimum. Even with sponsorship it is difficult to provide the schedule of events and the goodies we have all come to expect without some fee.

6. What are the Satellite trips and what is their purpose?





The Satellite trips were started several years ago. The Council was receiving excellent bids for TSW from several areas each year. It was felt that due to this interest we should offer more than just Texas Ski Week, hopefully resulting in mini Ski Weeks. This would lead to larger groups, more interest, lower prices, and more amenities through sponsorship. These trips could also provide some insight into a ski area's ability to handle Texas Ski Week

with its 1000 plus skiers. This program should also promote ski area interest in the Council. The Park City trip is becoming a traditional event with the third Spring Fling next year.

Unfortunately there has not been great support from the member clubs for the Satellite program. Few of these trips have had over 100 participants. It is difficult to secure sponsors for small groups. Without sponsors, the benefits of these trips certainly



are not the same as those of TSW. Activity fees are being charged for the Satellite trips so at least some events can be provided. The ski areas are also providing some amenities. The Council officers are working hard to obtain sponsors and develop interest in these trips. If we can increase the participation on Satellites, sponsors will be attacted and the level of activities will improve.


What expenses are covered by Texas Ski Council dues?

These dues cover operating expenses. Also each officer receives a travel allowance for each quarterly meeting and Texas Ski Week. This year each Satellite trip is scheduled to have a trip chairman and part of their expenses are included in the budget.

Speaking of a budget, last year was the first time that a budget was submitted and approved by the Board of Delegates. The Council by laws now require a budget annually.






