See you at the October Meeting.



SIDE TRIPS FROM MERCER'S CAMPOUT

Want to pitch a tent at Mercer's Campout, but the thought of all that moseying between cow watching and worm watching getting you down? Take heart, pardner. Several satellite excursions of less than 40 miles branch out from where we draw up the wagons at Chappell Hill the weekend of Oct. 16-18.

Fayetteville, 38 miles to the southwest, celebrates Lickskillet Day that Sunday. The festival dates back to the mid-1800s, when people who lived miles apart feasted together to mark the end of a harvest. The food ran out at one of the shindigs, so the story goes, and those who had yet to eat were told to lick the skillet.

You will not have to lick the skillet this year. In fact, Space City skiers are invited to participate in the kolache and beer drinking contests. To register, call Jeanette Donaldson at 713/378-2846.

The day will begin with a parade at 10:30 a.m. Other events will include an auction of everything from handmade quilts to home-canned pickles, a barbecue, crowning of a queen and dancing to polka music by the Baca Band. Made up of generations of the Baca family, this local band has played for dances since 1882.

Noteworthy apart from the festival is the Country Place Restaurant in a turn-of-the-century building. Former Houstonians Perry and Carol Thacker serve a Sunday brunch (\$6.95) 11-2.

Reservations are necessary. The Houston number is 522-0777. One party has already requested the hotel above the restaurant in early September, so festival weekend may alter normal activity.

The Thackers discovered the restaurant on a bicycle tour while getting away from the hoopla of escorting John Travolta around Houston with their limousine service.

Thirty miles to the west of Chappell Hill is Round Top. There pianist James Dick directs an international music institute on Festival Hill, the site of a former slave plantation.

Donald Weilerstein of the Cleveland String Quartet will play the violin accompanied by his wife, Vivian Hornik-Weilerstein on piano in two concerts during the campout weekend. Performances are 4 p.m. Saturday and Sunday. Tickets are \$5 and may be reserved by calling 713/249-3129. Ask for payment details.

The concerts take place in the parlors of the William Lockhart Clayton House. It is an 1870 Victorian farmhouse moved from LaGrange.

Like Fayetteville, Round Top is a fascinating German and Czech community. Its restored structures deserve a tour. The Winedale Historical Center, four miles to the east, is a museum donated by the late Ima Hogg.

The museum contains the furnished home of a prosperous cotton planta-

tion owner, the home of a wealthy medical doctor, a picnic area and nature trails, and outbuildings including a kitchen, smokehouse and barns.

Winedale is open Saturdays, 10-6, and Sundays, 12-6. Adults pay \$2.

Somerville Lake is 30 miles northwest of Mercer's. It covers 11,460 acres with a shoreline of 85 miles. Facilities and activities at numerous parks — among them Lake Somerville State Recreation Area — include swimming, water skiing, fishing, boat ramps, showers and picnicing.

Twenty miles north of Chappell Hill you may view exhibits on the history and culture of the Republic of Texas at the Star of the Republic Museum. Hours are 10-5 daily. The museum is in Washington-on-the-Brazos State Historical Park. The Texas Declaration of Independence was signed there in 1836.

The park also includes a replica of the hall where the declaration was signed and the home of Anson Jones, the last president of the Republic of Texas.

Finally, there is Chappell Hill itself, population 310. Established in 1847, it was the state education center for a time with Male and Female Institute and Soule University. Fine antebellum homes line the streets. The Chappell Hill Historical Museum is housed in an institute building. In all, 25 structures are cited as historic. Stroll through downtown for a treat.

WHEN A SKIER IS INJURED ... WHAT THEN?

You are skiing along enjoying the sun, snow, and scenery when suddenly someone has a bad fall in front of you. It looks like the person is hurt! What do you do? If you find yourself in this situation, how can you help?

First, you need to stop and evaluate the situation to see if any aid needs to be rendered. If there is an injury, you need to protect the skier from any further injury. Finally, send for help.

In evaluating the situation, you need to find out if the person is injured, if the person is conscious, where the injury is and if immediate aid is needed. If the person is unconscious, you need to check quickly the victim's ABC's - AIRWAY, BREATHING and CIRCULATION.

Check to see that nothing is blocking their airway — scarves, snow, gum or dentures could obstruct the victim's mouth or nose which would make breathing difficult. In cold weather

checking breathing is easy by the mist coming from either the nose or mouth. If the skier is not breathing, then artificial respiration (mouth-to-mouth) should be started. (In a skiing accident, one needs to be very careful in moving an injured skier. An injured skier can easily have a broken neck. In this situation, you are in a "damned if you do and damned if you don't" position and, unfortunately, what you do can only be judged on the circumstances you find yourself in.)

Thirdly, you need to find a pulse. The easiest place is the one on either side of the neck. Try it now as you read so you will know where to feel when you have to. With the ABC's in order, you need to find out what hurts. The injured party, if conscious, can usually tell you the answer to that question. If unconscious, broken bones are the least of your worries. If there is any bleeding present, direct pressure needs to be applied to the bleeding site and the skier kept quiet. In case of a nosebleed, pinching the nose between the thumb and index finger quickly brings it under control. Once things have been evaluated, you need to protect the skier from further injury. First is to make the victim as comfortable as possible with as little movement as possible. You need to prevent as much heat loss as possible by covering the victim with parkas and putting something on his/her head. (The head is the site of the greatest heat loss.) The above measures are to lessen the chances of shock which can make a bad situation much worse. If necessary, you may have to lie down beside the victim to protect him/her from the wind or blowing snow and to help add body heat. Secondly, you need to warn other skiers that there is an injured skier ahead. Place a pair of skies in a crossed or "X" fashion on the uphill side of the victim. The placement should be such so it can easily be seen by anyone to avoid running into you or the victim.

Send someone to notify the ski patrol. Try not to leave the injured skier alone if at all possible. When sending for the ski patrol, it is very helpful to tell them exactly where the injured skier is — what slope, what run, near the top, middle or bottom, etc. It also helps to

tell the ski patrol what type of injury the victim has, so they know what equipment to take with them.

Once the ski patrol has arrived, tell them exactly what has been done, where the victim hurts and then let them do their job by getting out of the way.

Hopefully, you will never be a victim or ever need to help a victim. But, it is always helpful to be prepared. Skiing ing safely and heeding warning signs will do a lot to keep you out of trouble.






