



# A WEEKEND IN CANADA



Travel was my love this past summer. A week in Atlanta, doing clogging to country western music. A week in the desert of Tucson climbing the rocks, collecting eagle feathers and a sun stroke not to mention a week in Los Angelos discovering Balboa Island, Newport Beach, Disneyland, Universal Studio and seeing Elizabeth Taylor in person. Then the best of all was two weeks going across Canada. I toured the city streets of Toronto, the pounding roar of Niagara Falls, the boomtown of Calgary and up to the ski mountains of Banff, Lake Louise and Mount Norquay.

Then I discovered the most beautiful place in the world which was Vancouver. The Island of Victoria was quaint but expensive. The ferry ride was quite a thrill as you weaved between the islands. But Vancouver was charming and interesting plus being the largest city in British Columbia, Canada's third largest. One of the centers of attraction was Gastwon, the site where Vancouver began and they have the only clock powered by steam. The five pipes on the top toot out the Westminister chimes.


The most exciting was the ski mountain which is a place I would like to generate an interest in going. Grouse Mountain is 4,300 feet high and on a clear night you can see about 50 miles of the city lights of Vancouver. You can ski during the day or night and dine in the restaurant. It is only 45 minutes from the city. If you decide not to ski




Banff, Canada

you could visit a very unusual museum which consists of totem poles. But even more exciting was the Whistler Mountain which can be reached by car or on a breathtaking view by train. Whistler Mountain offers over 50 runs, 4,280 foot vertical rise, Alpine bowls, seven double lifts, three triple chairlifts, two T-bars, and one gondola. Plus, you can, at the same ticket office buy a helicopter ticket. There is a beautiful place to stay right at the base of Whistler Mountain. 
