


When awards were finally announced, it was discovered that the\_\_\_\_

# The History of Skiing

#### From Caveman to Superstar

As with all his love affairs, man's association with skiing has passages of quarrels, hatreds and reconciliations. The Scandinavians hated downhill skiing in the first instance, though it was a Norwegian peasant, Sondre Norheim, an epic if sad figure, whose experiments led to the modern ski shape and the fixed binding which made modern skiing styles possible.

Like all the oldest sports, skiing is founded on man's most elementary needs. Running, jumping, swimming and various forms of combat, are at the heart of the Summer Olympic Games. Similarly, skiing in all its forms is the center of the Winter Games. In Siberia, Scandinavia, Northern China and Canada, forms of snowshoe or ski have been used since prehistory. The Hoting ski, found in a peat bog in Central Sweden, is the oldest yeldiscovered. It is dated around 2500 BC, made of pinewood, and is 3 ft. 6in. long and six inches wide. This short, broad type of ski is known as the Arctic Ski. A rock engraving from Rodoy, northern Norway, also of about 2500 BC, shows longer skis, and, just as interestingly, a skier apparently wearing a hunting mask, for all the world like a hare quaffing from a champagne glass. As a twentieth century image it would not do so badly.

The Romans met northern people known as Skridfinns or Skrikfinns, names used by German-speaking tribes about the non-Germanic groups of the north, Lapps and Finns. Skrika was to leap, and Diaconus, a Lombard writing in Latin in the eighth century, described how the men hunted wild animals "by leaping forward using contrivances of wood curved like a bow". The first printed books of the Middle Ages depicted ski troops from the Nordic countries and Russia. It was all essentially masculine and functional, the assumption being that women never left their domestic duties to slay bear, seal, deer or their fellow men.

More sporting instincts stirred in the early nineteenth century. The people of Osterdal, just north of Christiania, now called Oslo, produced a hero-athletecomedian in Trysil Knud, who in the course of a run would snatch up pieces of clothing, throw off a few garments or slurp from a gourd of beer. Norsemen introduced skiing to the United States, no doubt sowing the first seeds of this sort of freestyle as well as the adventurism of langrenn, or cross-country. Gullik Knedsen and the brothers Ole and Ansten Nattestad from Nymedal emigrated to Illinois to start a flourishing tradition of skiing on the Rock Prairie of Beloit, near Chicago, in 1841. Their letters home encouraged John Thorensen to emigrate from his village of Tinn, in the province of Telemark in 1838. Seventeen years later he was the only applicant for the job carrying mail over the Sierra Nevada. On January 3, 1856, he left Placerville, California, to carry the mail to Genoa, Nevada, and after an epic 90 mile trail-blazing journey he arrived three days later. The legend of "Snow Shoe" Thomson, as he had now become, was born. For nearly 20 years he was the human link uniting east and west of the United States by mail, because of him letters taking only 12 days to travel between San Francisco and New York instead of the three months it took by clipper round the Horn.

Thomson's skiing was straight running, wherever possible, with braking achieved by a long, stout pole held across the body and pressed into the snow. Turns were executed by stepping round, and stops by jabbing in the pole. With only a crude toepiece to attach boots, the heel flopped up and down, rendering control of the rough, flat blade-shapped ski extremely difficult. Back home, things were beginning to change, but in the most unlikely way. On February 8, 1868, a man of 43 in rough, country garb, went among the gentlemen of Christiana at their annual ski championships at Iverslokka, and to their dismay won all four competitions -style, jumping, loipe and free running. Aftenblad, February 10, 1868, wrote: "Sodre Auversen Norheim from Norgedal won all four disciplines with the notation "Outstanding". For the "Jump with Ski Pole" he was awarded the additional qualification of "virtuosity"... With a short stick in one hand, which he used rather like a walking stick, and his hat in the other, he starts his free run at very great speed, making a number of small jumps, each about two or three ski lengths clear of the snow, landing each time with the grace of a dancer and in perfect balance. Until you have seen this man, now aged 43, ski, you have not been skiing."

Sondre Auversen, or carpenter's son, adopting the Norheim from the feudal manor which sponsored him,

against all tradition had defeated his social superiors, to their chagrin, with a new style of equipment married to a new technique. It was another two months before Aftenblad described the heel binding of twisted osiers by which Auversen anchored his heel to his ski. The ski itself, fashioned by his homemade plane, adze, saw and chisel, was revolutionary. For 10,000 years and more, people had skied on skis three metres long, crudely shaped, heavy and fixed only by a toe strap. They were barely in control of them, certainly at any kind of speed. Auversen's reputation in Morgedal was as a bad or lazy workman, a dreamer. His wife sometimes had to beg to supplement her own income from needlework and Auversen's feeble contribution. His time, however, was not being totally wasted. From his whittling and his chipping came a ski of 2 m 40 cm, which was fully 60 centimetres, or two feet, shorter than the clumsy skis of the time. Not only that, he waisted the ski to 69mm, compared with 84 at the front and 76 at the tail, in other words widths which are little changed by ski manufacturers today. The upshot were skis that, for the first time, ran straight and true, and were much more controllable for jumping and turning.

Auversen never entered another competition. In 1870, when he returned to Oslo, the competition was cancelled for lack of snow. When a ski "factory" failed in Morgedal, Auversen emigrated to America, and he never returned. His death place is unknown, and only a slim granite memorial remains to him at Morgedal. It says, "Sondre Auversen Norheim - Father of Modern Skiing". To all but a few ski historians, inside and outside Norway, he is unknown.






