Please read them carefully and remember to attend and vote.

Two other committees are planned. They are: (1) A Travel Committee whose task it will be to figure out how we can exercise more clout with the lodge operators and, (2) a Scrapbook Committee. There is, each year, a regional competition for best ski club scrapbook and this committee probably still needs members. Let me hear from you if you would like to help. It's a fun job, really!

## ARTICLE V: NOMINATION AND ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Section 1. ELECTION. There shall be an election of officers held at the annual meeting in March. Election shall be by written ballot unless there is only one nominee for each office. The elected officers shall take office on May 1st.
Section 2. DEFINITION. The elected officers shall be a President, Vice President-Programs, Vice PresidentTrips, Vice President-Membership, Vice President-Publications, Secretary and Treasurer.
Section 3. ELIGIBILITY. The only persons eligible to hold office shall be those who have been members for the twelve months preceding the annual meeting.
Section 4. NOMINATING COMMITTEE. There shall be a nominating committee of seven members elected by the Executive Committee prior to the January regular meeting. Not less than four nor more than five past officers of the Club shall serve on this committee. Current officers shall be ineligible to serve. Only persons who have been members for the preceding twelve months shall be eligible for membership on this committee.
Section 5. NOMINEES. The Nominating Committee shall present one nominee for each office at the regular meeting immediately preceding the annual meeting. Any further nominations from the floor must be made at this regular meeting. Consent to serve shall have been secured from all nominees.
The Nominating Committee met frequently over the past four weeks to consider many well qualified members for Club office. The Committee has assembled what we feel is an exceptionally well-qualified team of experienced and enthusiastic nominees. We appreciate their willingness to serve the Club.
It should be noted that the By-Laws allow additional nominations from the floor at the February Meeting. The election will be held at the March Annual Meeting. Please bring this flyer with you to the Februrary and March Meetings.
