



Chamonix is perhaps the best ski resort in the world. It **is** the oldest. Chamonix has more **mosts** and more **biggest** than any other ski resort: Europe's highest mountain (15,800'), longest ski run (10 miles), highest vertical (7,200') and even the longest highway tunnel (7.2 miles from Chamonix to Courmayeur, Italy). You can ski in Chamonix all year round, assuring great ski conditions any time.

Chamonix, France is located one and a half hours bus ride south of Geneva, Switzerland. It is the site of the first Winter Olympics, and is the home of Jean-Claude Killy. Chamonix boasts some of the worlds toughest ski runs, but it also has some of the worlds finest intermediate ski runs and ample beginner slopes. Not only does Chamonix have super skiing, but it has apres ski of all kinds, from a gambling casino to rock discotheques. The apres ski ranges from old elegant to casual modern with lots of amusements for non-skiers.

This fantastic ski trip will leave on Friday afternoon, January 26th and arrive in Chamonix early in the afternoon on Saturday. We will spend seven nights in the Hotel la Prieure where *all* rooms have a private balcony that looks

out on Mont Blanc (Europe's highest). All rooms are equipped with twin beds. After six super skiing days, we will leave Chamonix on Saturday morning, February 3, and arrive in PARIS shortly after lunch. For our one night in "Gay Paree" we will stay at the newly decorated Hotel Cayre which is centrally located on the left bank. We will leave Paris mid afternoon Sunday, February 4, and arrive in Houston that evening around 8 o'clock.

At the rate the dollar is declining, this could be the last bargain Europe ski trip the Club can offer. You can reserve a space on this super ski trips by making a \$100.00 deposit at the September meeting. Unfortunately, we can accomodate only 40 people, so be sure and sign up early.

Only \$759.00 gets you on THE trip of the year!

As Vice President of the United States Ski Association for the past two consecutive terms,

Edgar "Gar" Bering has been expressing his individualism as well as his concern for the continuation and cultivation of the sport. The USSA is the national governing body of the sport of skiing and is charged with the responsibility of promoting skiing from beginners to our national team members, from fun races to the Olympics. The USSA also has organized lobbyists in Washington, D.C. concerned with ecological issues, the need for additional ski areas, safety and insurance.

Presently a Physics Professor at the University of Houston, Gar calls himself a Space Scientist. Perhaps his fixation on the Aurora Borealis is not surprising. What man of nature would not feel some interest in such a phenomenon as dancing lights in a far off sky? He has been studying them for quite a few years and travels to Alaska during deep winter to conduct experiments there. It is during this time that he finds a few slopes to

slip up on and take advantage of.

Well rounded in all aspects of skiing, Gar enjoys Nordic as well as Alpine skiing and devotes equal time to both. He will be at the Olympics in Lake Placid in 1980 as an official in the cross country/Nordic events. Several years ago during his tenure as a student, Gar was President of the Berkley Ski Club as well as the coach. He was into jumping for a while - off a ramp 35 meters long. Don't ask why he gave it up! His favorite places for downhill skiing are Alta and Sun Valley, Utah. Hope Valley and Yosemite, California are the best he's found for cross country.

Here in Houston you might find Gar at the Ballet or in his garden, with the Sierra Club or on the Gulf sailing as a crew member on a racing team.

A very intelligent and interesting person, Gar will stir new aspects of the sport of skiing within you. Have conversation with him and see.



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
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space city defeats special risks


