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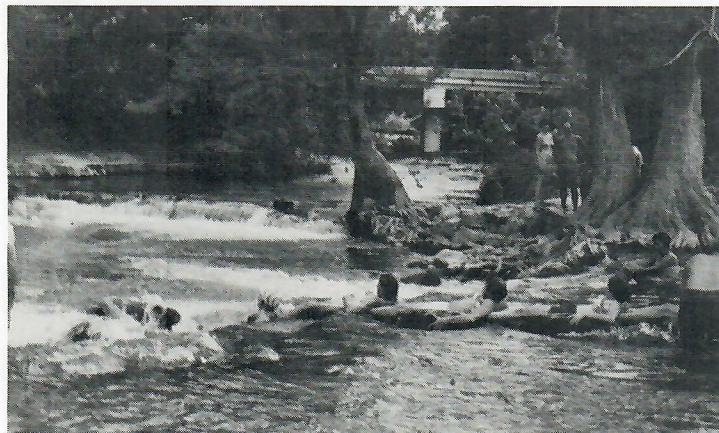
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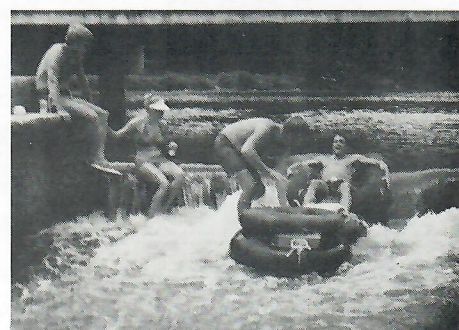


# the year of the rocks has ended

Friday night we have reserved seats for the Broadway hit musical, **"A Chorus Line"**.

Saturday night we will fly, via Lufthansa German Airlines, directly to Munich connecting for a short bus trip to Innsbruck, Austria. For the next six days, we will ski the site of the 1976 Winter Olympics! In Innsbruck, accommodations have been made at the first class Hotel Innsbruck located near the heart of the shopping district of the city.

Breakfast and dinner in Innsbruck is included in the price.

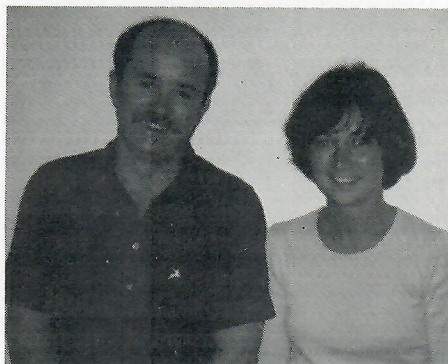

I regret to report the loss of an old friend in **St. Michel Restaurant**. Recently reconstructed and redecorated in the manner of a French country house, the atmosphere appears warm and friendly. The Duckling is still succulent and the Pepper Steak is still the highlight of the menu. There endeth the resemblance to an old friend.

Francoise, the proprietor, has lost the touch for detail that used to make dining at 2150 Richmond such a rare treat. The Belgian turned French restaurateur seems to have lost interest. The quaint European influence of old has become as diluted as the onion soup. Where

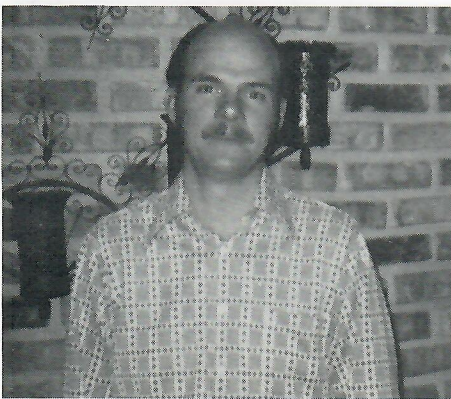
once the waitress was a native of France with a heavy accent, we now have waiters and waitresses who have difficulty with their native American tongue.

Of course he brought and served a red where there had been a white before. The salt resided in a shaker cleverly marked with a "P". The butter tasted like margarine and the French bread was tasteless. The Coq au Vin lacked wine in the sauce and chicken on the plate. Instead, there was an abundance of tomato and undercooked carrots which prompted the comment, "I didn't like it."

We won't give up on our friend St. Michel, but we won't be in any hurry to return soon. We will skip the cocktails, appetizers and expectation of good service. How can you expect good service when the gratuity is automatically added onto the bill? Instead we will concentrate on the pepper steak...still an old friend.

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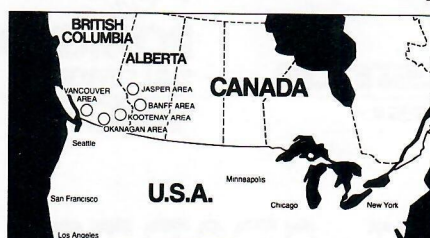
