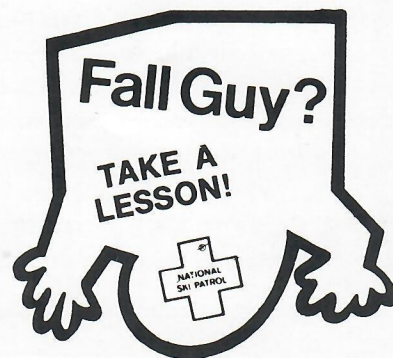
march meeting

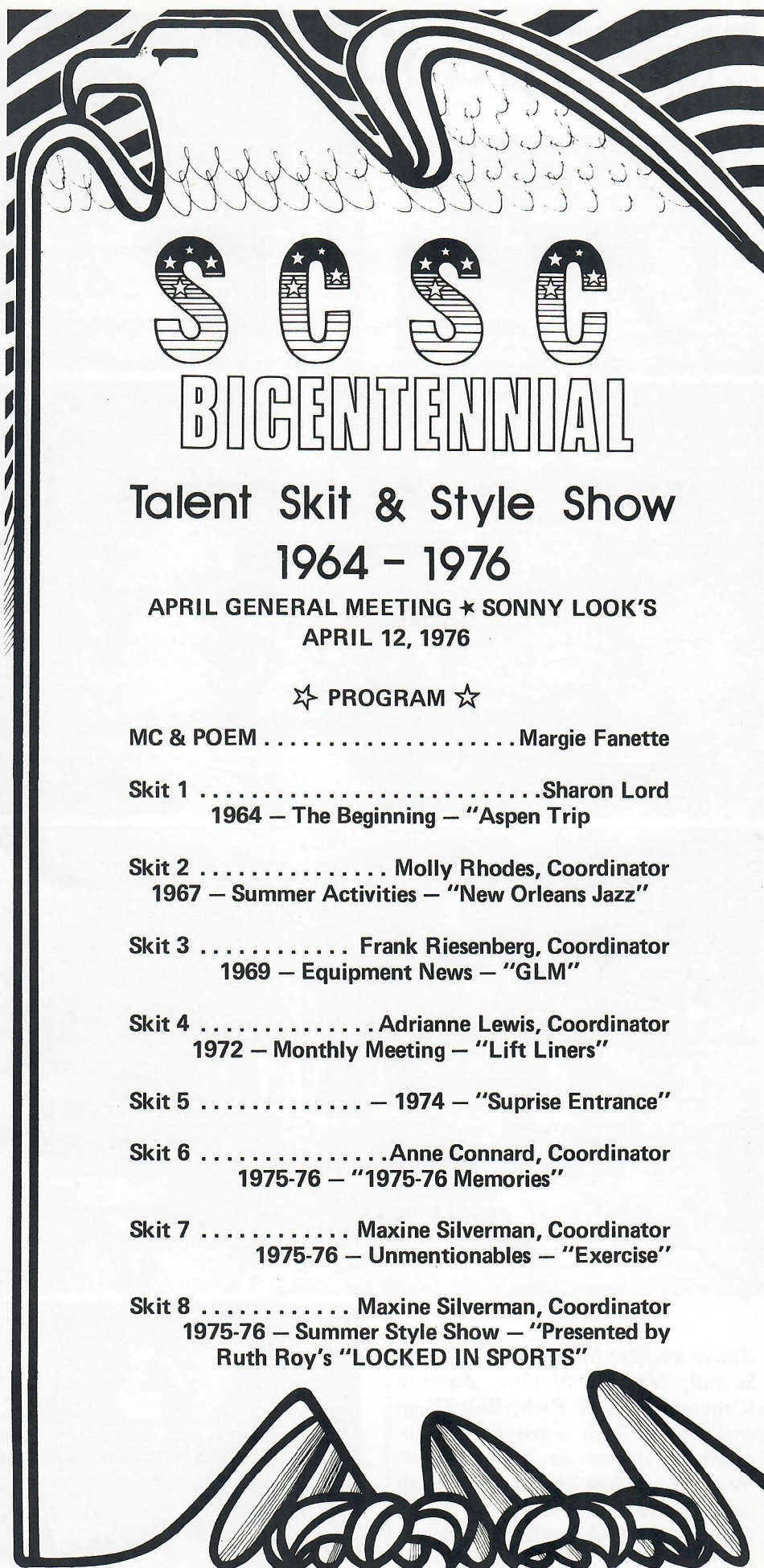

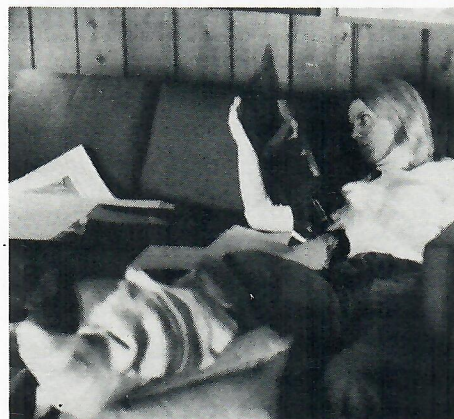
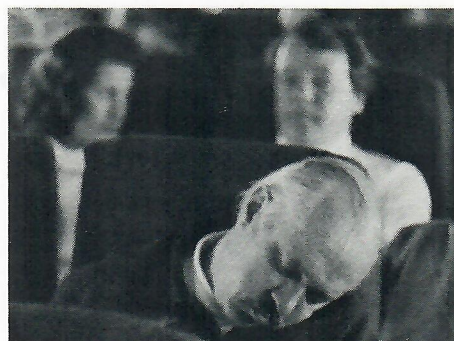
OF ALL PLACES TO GET SICK - **Susan Craft** garnered this award for "conveniently" catching the flu halfway through the trip.

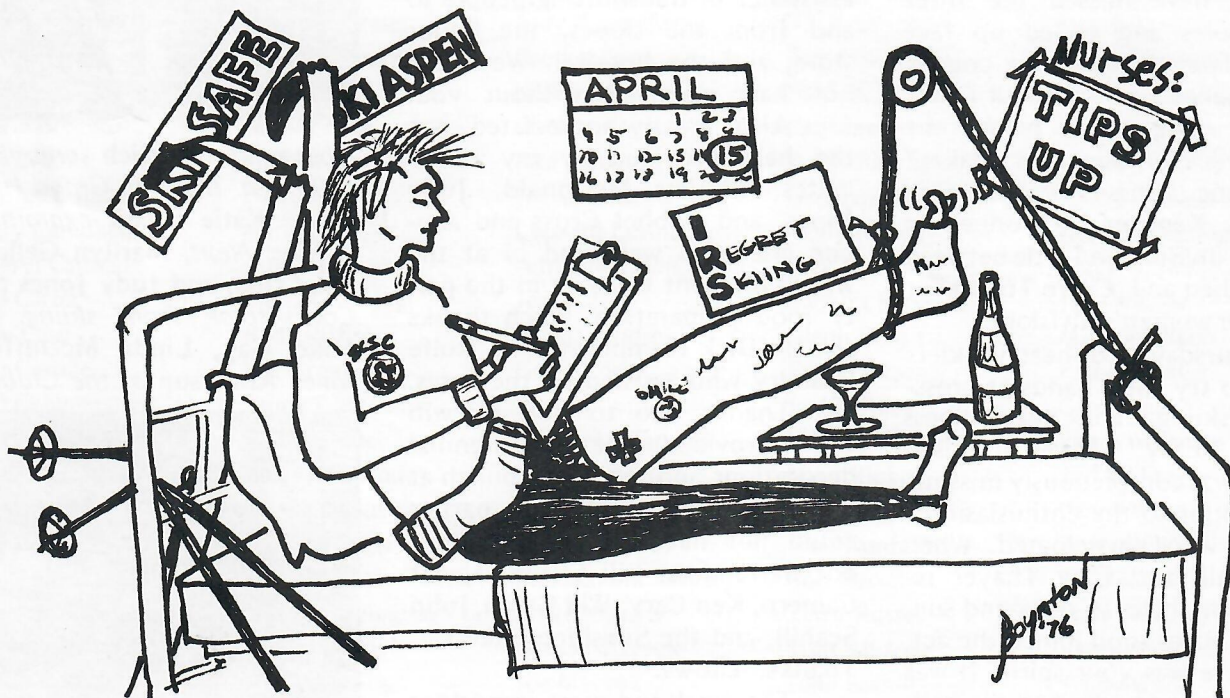

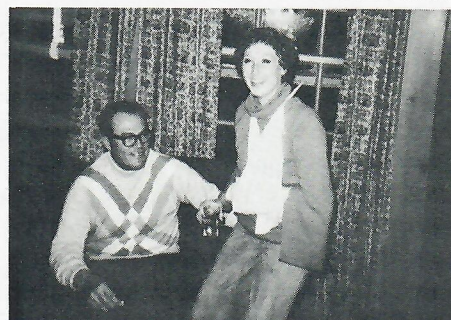

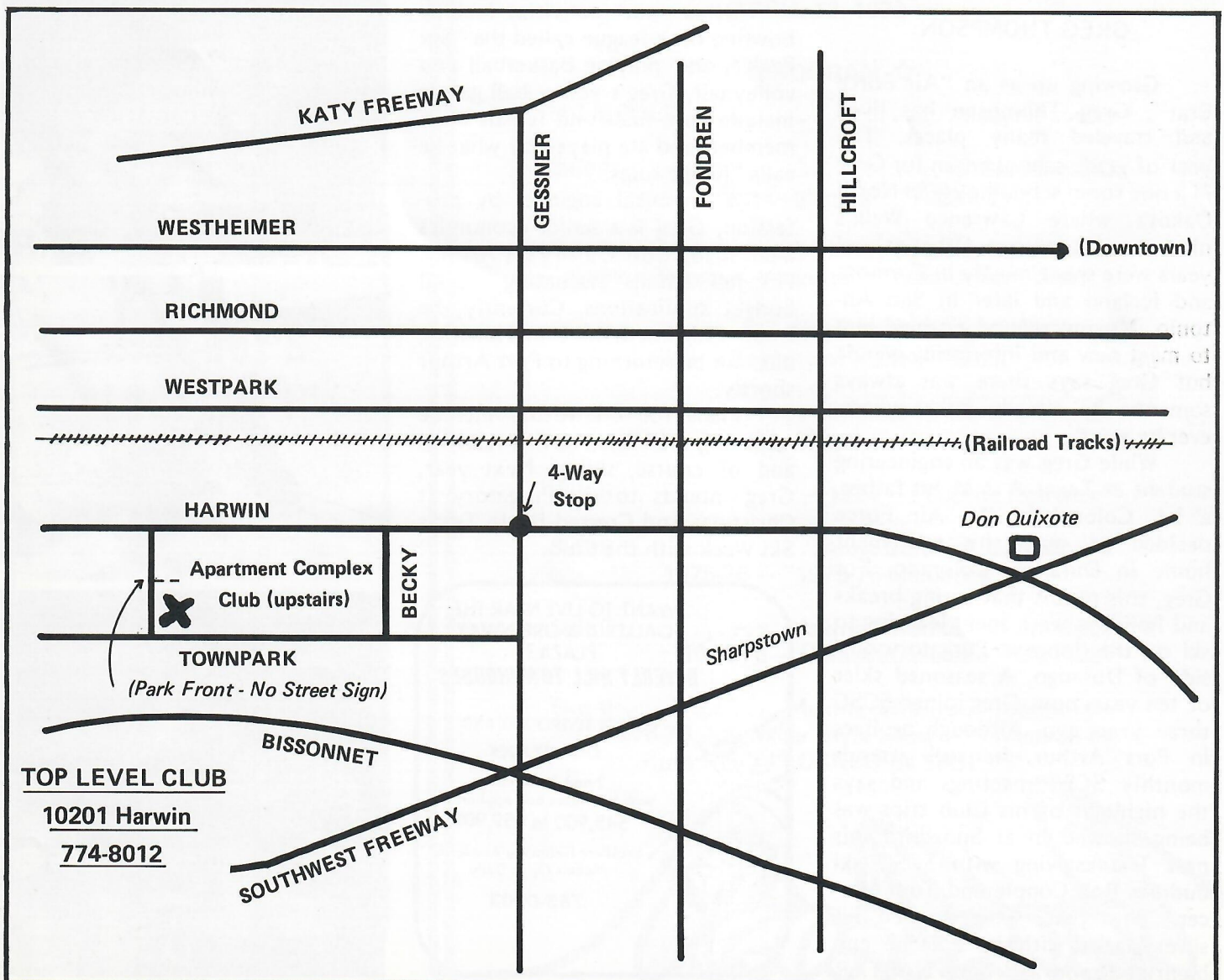
