Tom Baldwin, who ran a most interesting and successful ski trip program;


Jeanne Neu, who kept the membership records accurate and current;

On behalf of the LAKE TAHOE 81, thank you Janet and Steve for a great trip.


















Now that the ski travel season is over, perhaps you will be visiting other places closer to home. We made a recent trip to Dallas, that's the home of the Club that skied away with the Texas Ski Cup. Our trip was strictly business: work, sleep and eat. Or was it eat, sleep and work?

Good food and company (Jerry had the foresight to bring along one of the fine lady accountants from his CPA firm) always improves a business trip. We visited a variety of restaurants as follows:

THE SIRLOIN AND SADDLE in the Marriott Motor Hotel on

Stemmons serves standard steak house fare in standard surroundings with standard service at standard prices. If STANDARD appeals to you, as it did the night we ate there, you will not be disappointed. More adventurous souls, with bigger pocket books, will want to try Mario's.

MARIO'S is located in Turtle Creek Village. . . call and ask for directions at LAI-II35. Mario's Magnificent Feasts feature pasta dishes \$6 to 7, fish, fowl, beef and special veal dishes in the \$8 to II range. The Lasagna was super with a deep red subtly spiced tomato sauce over what seemed to be green spinach noodles and light ricotta cheese.

The veal dishes were prepared with tender loving care. The veal piccata was served in a delicate sauce reminiscent of garlic, lemon and butter and a hint of cheese of unknown origin. The Veal and Scampi came with tiny lobster tails which provided a perfect comple-

ment to the tender veal.

To complement the succulent cuisine and fine wines the restaurant and staff have developed the fantasy of elegant dining and they are, of course, in the stratosphere. The red velvet wallpaper, inattentive service and barking coat check person belie any real elegance.

MARIANO'S sounds like Italian Mario's but Tastes Mexican. After my second visit I still have not made it to the dining room. Instead we recommend making a meal of Combination Platters of tasty cheese, beef and/or bean Nachos in the lounge. Live entertainment, good drinks and the best people watching in Dallas make for an enjoyable evening. Jerry says that Mariano's is Nuevo Laredo - Texas style. I've never been there, what does he mean?

Last, but not least, is FRIDAY'S Friday's in Dallas is Friday's in Houston.

*Sandy Coker for just putting up with me and giving badly needed moral support.


*Steve Erickson, our busdriver, for a job well done and all the extra side trips.
