

RMD SUCCESSFUL IN OPPOSING SKIING TAX

The efforts of RMD in obtaining over 10,000 signatures on a petition expressing opposition to the proposed seven percent Colorado tax on all ski activities were instrumental in the recent defeat of this measure. An article appearing in the July Sitzmarke outlined the effect this bill would have had on the cost of Space City Ski Club trips this winter if it had been passed into law. The only organized opposition to the passage of such legislation which adversely affects the skiing community is RMD.

In addition to becoming an effective lobby for the Rocky Mountain skiers, RMD is developing into an "on the scene" representative for the flatland ski clubs and for problems relating to transportation or lodging. The success which they might have in aiding clubs such as Space City Ski Club in obtaining fair treatment in these areas will depend on their strength as an organization and the number of skiers actively supporting their efforts.

The Houston skier, and especially all members of our Club, have a large stake in the success of RMD. Their efforts during the summer in defeating the above-mentioned proposal reduced the cost of this year's skiing by up to \$15 per person per trip. We should show our gratitude by joining RMD and strengthening their ability to protect our interest.



Many SCSC members enjoy canoeing . . . but 600 miles? That's the number of miles MIKE BIROW-SKI predicts he will have canoed before January 1, 1976. Mike began canoeing as a child in flooded

ditches with neighborhood kids. He progressed to teaching canoeing at Camp Strake as a boy scout and now his mushrooming interest has resulted in forming his very own canoe club, the Downhill Yacht Club! The club is a nonprofit organization whose purpose is to promote canoeing as a sport. Most trips are fun overnight campouts including at least one communal meal, spiked watermelon, and booze. However, the trip that is most ingrained in Mike's mind was a 58 mile trek down the Pecos averaging 20 miles a day against strong winds through winding canyons. ski tips

HOW TO LOAD

As you wait in line, remove ski pole straps from your wrists and hold poles in outside hand, away from your partner.

When your turn comes, inform lift operator if you have not ridden a chair lift before. Slide into position with skis parallel and pointing uphill. Face your partner and watch for chair which will approach from behind you. As chair approaches, grasp center bar with your inside hand. Immediately sit down and face uphill.

HOW TO UNLOAD

As chair nears unloading ramp, check to be sure no clothing or equipment is tangled in the chair. Hold poles in outside hand and place inside hand on front edge of seat. Raise ski tips.

Stay seated until you reach "Unload Here" sign, keeping skis straigh on ramp. Push yourself up with inside hand, lean forward and ski straight down ramp. Don't snowplow. Ski to the edge of the unloading area to leave room for the skiers unloading behind you. Move away from unloading area as quickly as possible.

Generally regarded as the largest sewer in Texas, the Houston Ship Channel begins at the Turning Basin through the marriage of the Buffalo and White Oak Bayous and efficiently conveys the effluent of the affluent city of Houston through a myriad of industrial sites into the waters of Galveston Bay.

As a service to their fellow SCSC members, Dave Hargett and this writer, along with appropriate escorts, recently toured the ship channel area after dark to report on the unique nature of the eating and drinking establishments which line the colon of Houston.

THE ACROPOLIS RESTAU-RANT AND CLUB - 7905 Clinton Drive. This is by far the best place we found and I highly recommend going here for an evening of dining, dancing and just having fun for a reasonable cost.

The Acropolis features Fatima, the ample belly dancer and bouzouki player, Spiros Etstathiou. Both the Greek fried shrimp (\$3.95) and shish kebob (\$4.50) are excellent. After dinner you can go up on the stage and join in Greek dancing.

PIZZINIS PIZZA AND STEAK HOUSE - 927 Mercury. A good place for lunch if you're in this part of town. Buxom waitresses serve very good pizza and Italian po-boy sandwiches.

ATHEN'S BAR AND GRILL - 8037 Clinton Drive. Greek food

and music with food served from 11:30 to 2:00 a.m. With murals on the walls, this place is similar to the Acropolis but not nearly as good.

THE UNIQUE CLUB - 5903 Clinton Drive. For your safety, this place; closes at 9 p.m. Beer is sixty cents per can, there are linen tablecloths, and mirror-covered walls. Neon signs identify the restrooms. The men's restroom features several bargains such as twenty-five cents for Pandora's box - "A grab bag of sexy surprises."

IT'LL DO LOUNGE - 8013 Stedman. Nice hostesses, pool table, fifty cent beer and local insignias. This place has the oldest air conditioner in the world and maybe the oldest men's room.

HARBOR LIGHTS NIGHT CLUB AND BAR - 2327 McCarty. A live band, sixty-five cent beer, a store selling coveralls, a baby on a table full of beer bottles all made up the scene at this place around midnight. Everyone seemed to enjoy Hargett's howling to accompany the band except the man sitting behind us.

MARIA BONITA BAR - 7929 Clinton Drive. We never really got the feeling we were welcome in this place. My notes are as follows: Spanish juke box, sixty cent beer, men's john repaired with underwear, "bevy of beautiful barmaids", police cars with lights flashing, and a portrait of Maria Bonita over the bar. I don't know what all that means, but I do remember that one of our group, a beautiful SCSC blonde with long hair, almost got


picked up at the bar.
