It is very difficult for a skier progressing from the beginning stage to intermediate stage to remember all the things one is supposed to do. For this reason, I try to give my students two or three exercises on skis which will give them the feeling that they are controlling the actions of the ski.

One important exercise is steering. Think of your feet and skis as if they were wheels. To turn, pivot your wheels (skis) in the direction you wish to turn and continue to pivot them throughout the entire radius of the turn. The skis should be relatively flat on the surface of the snow (no edging) to skid around in the turn.

You might try this on a pair of short skis just to get the feel of what happens. As you pick up speed, you will find steering becomes easier and you will be able to accomplish it on the proper length ski as well.

The pivoting of the skis should be a cranking or turning action from the knee and ankle acting simultaneously. Highly important is to continue the cranking throughout the entire turn. So many of you lose the turn as the ski crosses the fall line. If you relax the steering action as the ski crosses the fall line, the ski starts going straight down the hill, you panic and you fall down out of desperation.


