marke makers

Marty Sanford comes from a family of skiers. Her grandfather was a national cross-country champion skier in Norway before migrating to the United States. Her father skied in Canada before the days rope tows were in existence and skiers spent half their time climbing the mountains. She has a brother who skis and two cousins who are ski instructors and managers of ski shops at Vail. Marty was introduced to skiing at the tender age of four when her father took the family on weekend ski trips to areas in up-state New York where they were living.

Actually, Marty's childhood days on skis entailed as much cross-country skiing as downhill skiing. She often hiked from her front porch to the nearest slope or hill in town to ski. As a wee lass of four, "I mostly fell down the hill rather than skied down," Marty admits, "and often would fall into snow drifts larger than I. Then I would have to be pulled out by the other children." In high school, she belonged to a ski club that took weekend trips to St. Lawrence University which maintained its own ski slope. Marty realized in high school that she really enjoyed skiing because it combined both good camaraderie and recreation.

Marty has been an active participant in several ski clubs. She belonged to the ski club when she attended Syracuse University where she earned her liberal arts degree in history. Later she lived in Cleveland, Ohio, where she was named Ski Queen for her efforts working on the public relations of the Cleveland Ski Club's Annual Ski Fair. At the Fair, one of her greatest thrills was meeting Bob Beatti, then the coach of the U.S. Ski Team and who was in Cleveland to open the Fair. In 1968, she moved to Houston where she joined the Space City Ski Club.

Marty has worked on the publications for both the Cleveland and Space City Clubs. Coincidentally, both club publications were in similar stages of development when Marty had the responsibility for them. She published the newsletters during their transitions from typed, duplicated sheets to actual type-set printed newsletters. In SCSC, Marty was the first Public Relations Director. Prior to her tenure of office, SCSC had no Public Relations officer, only an editor for its newsletter, the SITZMARKE.

As a member of SCSC, Marty was also a trip chairman for the Vail A trip at Easter in 1972. On this trip, Marty organized a group of ten hearty souls for a day of ski touring. She claims some of the members loved that day of touring and some of the members are still cursing that day because a full day of ski touring is quite strenuous and tiring, considering the terrain. Fortunately, Marty is interested in and enjoys the pleasures of cross-country skiing since the serious back operation she had this year has caused her to forgo the thrills of downhill skiing.

Professionally, Marty has a double career in teaching and in publications work. While in Cleveland, she was Publications Coordinator for the Board of Education and was the youngest member on the Board of Directors of the Woman's Advertising Club of Cleveland. Her first job in Houston was Managing Editor of Travel Spectator Magazines and the Bill Roberts publications. She says, this was a great introduction to Houston because she covered many social events and interviewed many well-known persons who came to Houston for conventions or other events. Marty now teaches English at Sharpstown High School. She has been named one of the 600 outstanding writing teachers in the country by the National Council of English Teachers. One of her students was a finalist in the Council's annual writing competition. She has also, been chosen to teach a pilot course in the English curriculum. This course involves value clarification and decision making for students.

In her leisure time, Marty loves to travel, swim, play tennis, and make bread. She enjoys trying to make yeast bread and Norwegian festive breads from old family recipes.

Currently, Marty has been working on a Master's degree in Education Administration at the University of Houston, and has been planning a wedding for April. She met her fiancée, David Green, at the University of Houston. He is a non-skier but is interested in cross-country skiing.

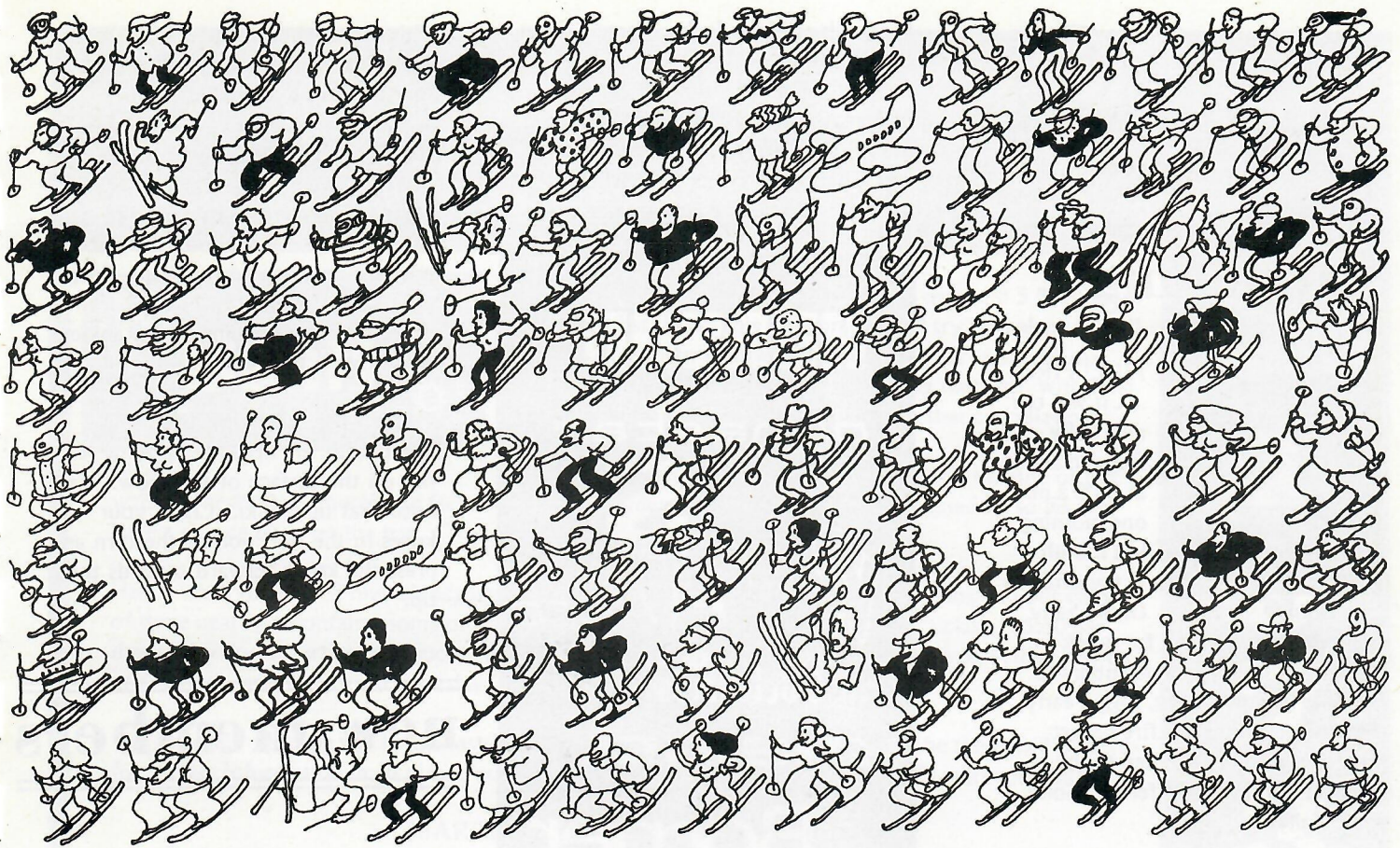

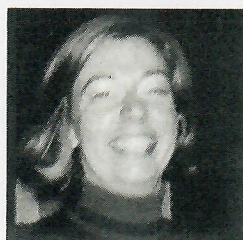

ski tips

Making carved turns is really a matter of changing the edge of your skis. When the ski is edged, the resistance of the snow deflects the ski one direction or the other. We can make the ski turn more rapidly by increasing the pressure on the tips of the skis and reducing the pressure on the backs of the skis. We do this by bending forward at the ankles and pushing the knee towards the tip of the ski.

This causes the tails of the ski to slip more than the tips and therefore the ski carves into the hill.

Here's an exercise for you to try. Start in a very steep traverse. Now press your knee towards the tips of your skis. There should be more pressure on your downhill ski. Keep your body weight towards the front of your ski by bending at the ankles. The ski will turn uphill.

To turn the other direction, step uphill with the uphill ski, placing it flat on the surface of the snow. Step onto that uphill ski. Crank your knees in the direction of the turn and press the knees forward towards the tip.

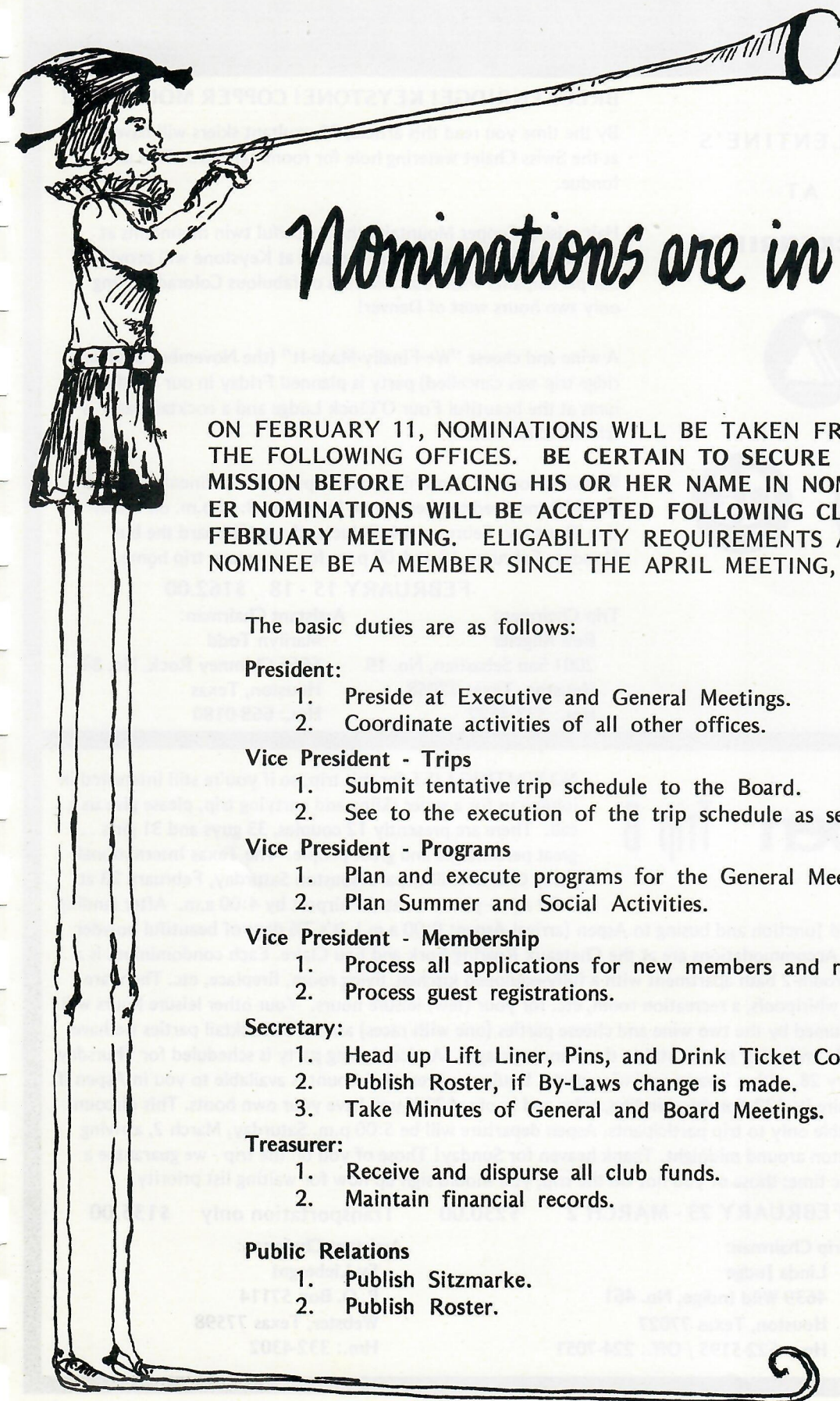

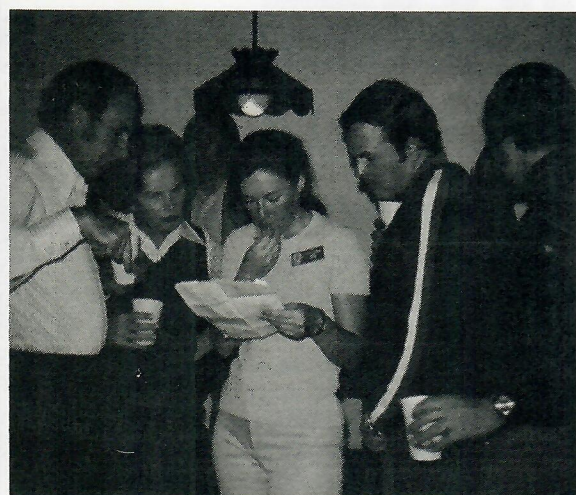


STEAMBOAT AT CHRISTMAS

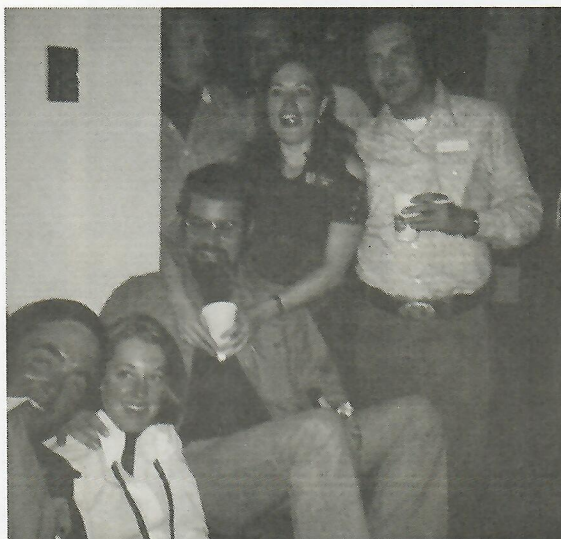

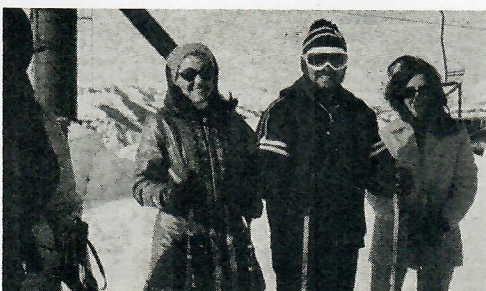
bout the walk to the village, but everyone who made the trip is now a qualified mountain climber.

Only to find himself in a hospital mold.*

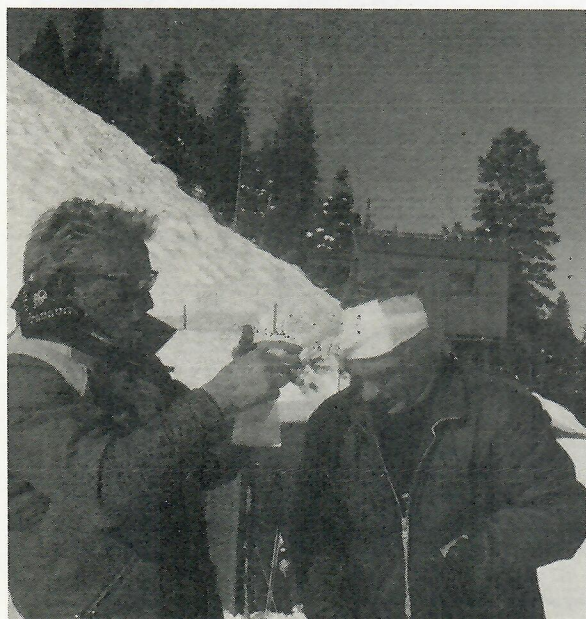


*Yes, it was broken right below the knee,
