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

THINK SNOW! We are going to need it in abundance for our most ambitious ski season ever. Yes, it is time to decide when and where to ski this winter.

Last year, the club took in 342 fifty dollar deposits for trips at the September meeting. I will not be surprised to see over 400 deposits taken in this September. Last year two trips filled up at the first meeting. This year, I hope people will ONLY sign up for the trips on which they plan to go. PLEASE, don't sign up for a trip "just in case" you decide to change your mind later.

Members who put down a deposit on a trip and in reality are "just shopping" will pay a penalty of \$10.00 for dropping off of a trip, and \$5.00 for transferring to another trip.

Last year we had one "traditional" ASPEN trip (which had forty on the waiting list the first night). This year we have TWO "traditional" ASPEN TRIPS! I urge you to consider them

BOTH as the "traditional" trip because it is impractical to enlarge one trip to two-hundred people. With the "traditional" trip being split into segments one month apart, it will add some needed variety to the "traditional" ASPEN because our first trip will be during the much coveted "HIGH SEASON". THINK TWICE ABOUT ASPEN.

In August the Texas Ski Council held a workshop in Galveston. Space City Ski Club was well represented. All who attended returned more knowledgeable about ski clubs, ski trips, and skiing in general. Austin Skiers and the Longhorn Ski Club both had large groups present and the workshop probably did more to strengthen the Texas Ski Council than any previous event.

The TSC will be of benefit to all ski clubs in the state, but as usual, our benefits will be proportional to our input. Since we are the largest ski club in the state, it is our DUTY to make sure that the TSC grows to take its proper place as an organization to promote skiing throughout Texas.

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



The Texas Ski Council, an organization comprised of representatives from several active Texas ski clubs, held a workshop for club officers and trip chairmen in Galveston the weekend of August 11th and 12th.

Representatives of the Austin Skiers, The Longhorn Ski Club, and The Space City Ski Club discussed various aspects of club operations, with the greatest emphasis on air travel. Supporting this disucsion were presentations by Continental Airlines, American Airlines, and Texas International Airlines. Club representatives were given a greater insight into rate structure, scheduling requirements, preferred operating procedures and a host of other details which should make trip planning simpler in the future. trip requirements

If a trip participant withdraws from a trip after the specified final payment date, the trip participant may lose his entire payment unless the cost of the participant's withdrawal is recovered by cancellation of lodging, transportation, and other items. The Trip Chairman shall exert a diligent effort to cancel all arrangements so as to return the maximum amount to the individual. It shall be the club policy to cancel all unused accommodations so as to return the maximum amount possible to the cancelling participant. The trip showing a profit or loss shall not be a factor in determining the refund. Also, if the Trip Chairman failed to exercise a reasonable effort in cancelling accommodations or finding a replacement, the Executive Committee shall award the appropriate

refund, less \$10.00.

- 2. The Club Policy shall be that non-trip participants shall not be allowed to occupy any room as a non-registered guest.
- 3. The Club Policy shall be that there be no substitutions allowed without the knowledge of the Trip Chairman, and that new additions to the trip come from the "Wait List", The Trip Chairman shall make all substitutions.
- 4. A minimum of \$10.00 charge will be assessed on all refunds for trips with a total cost greater than \$50.00 with the following exceptions:
 - a) If the trip is handled through an agency which has a refund charge of \$10.00 or greater.
 - b) If the refund is necessitated by actions of the Club and not the individual.
 - 1) Cancellation of the trip.
 - 2) Individual was on the waiting list and never became an active participant.
- 5. A minimum charge of \$5.00 shall be assessed for transfers.
- 6. If a trip should be "weathered in", the Club Policy shall be that the additional lodging expense should be left up to the individual, collection of the same shall be left up to the lodge, and the arrangements should be made by the Trip Chairman.
- 7. Priority is given to new potential Trip Chairmen and Assistant Trip Chairmen rather than use experienced individuals. Trip Chairmen should have been on a club trip before. Present officers are ineligible as Trip Chairmen. All Trip Chairmen and Assistants are to have Executive Committee approval.
- 8. Membership in the club is not a pre-requisite for participation on non-snow-skiing trips. Currently these summer time activities are directed by the Vice President in charge of Programs. Reservations for participation in such activities require full payment instead of a deposit fee.







If sufficient interest is shown, I will conduct a ski school session before the Utah trip in November. We will utilize an artificial ski slope located at Lake LBJ near Austin. The slope is 100 yards long and is an excellent facility for teaching beginners. You can learn enough in two days to handle yourself with confidence. You will learn the basics about ski equipment and should be able to manuver some basic turns. Let me know at the September Meeting if you are inter-

The most important priority you can do now to prepare for a successful ski trip is to get into shape. An exercise program to strengthen the leg and shoulder muscles is good. Experts will also want to work on the stomach muscles. Running also builds your wind.

If you have your own boots, put them on for several hours a week and just walk around the house. This will help loosen up the boot and relieve bruises around the shins that can often be painful. Practice pushing your knee forward as if you were driving the knee towards the tip of your ski.

When you get to the slopes, be sure to take lessons from a certified pro.






When Dale Allbritton entered his first NASTAR competition this past February at Winter Park, he did not know a closed gate from an open one. He was more interested in skiing a race course without crashing or missing any of the gates. To his surprise, the time on his second run of the race was good enough to win a bronze medal. After this race, he really had the racing bug, bought Jean Claude Killy's book and decided to be serious about racing!

At Purgatory a few weeks later, he took two silver medals in the NAS-TAR races. He even missed a gold medal by eight-tenths of a second in the second race.

Not all of Dale's racing experiences have been as successful. A month after winning the bronze medal at Winter Park, he visited Aspen Highlands with his sights set on winning a silver medal in the NASTAR competition. Aspen Highlands, one of the most active racing areas on the NASTAR circuit, draws over 50,000 participants for the NASTAR races. Upon his arrival in Aspen with a hangover - a feeling common to many ski travelers - Dale discovered the racing competition would begin in less than an hour. Undaunted by any minor physical discomfort, Dale donned his wet look racing suit, rushed to the racing course and paid his fee.

On his first run down the rough and fast course, he lacked only four-tenths of a second to win a bronze medal. Thinking he could capture the bronze medal on his second run, he tried again. Disaster struck; he crashed and burned about 250 feet, hangover and all. From this experience Dale learned why racers do not wear the wet look ski attire.


Dale explains that NASTAR stands for National Standard Race. NASTAR is probably the largest amateur skiing organization. Every ski area, no matter how small, has a NASTAR headquarters. Dale encourages SCSC members to give serious thought to entering NASTAR competition, since it is an amateur event based on a handicap system. Skiers of all ages, both women and men, from beginners to experts, have a chance to win. To enter a NASTAR competition a skier pays a minimal entry fee which varies slightly among the various ski areas. For a second run, the skier pays an additional dollar.

Besides weekly races in the ski areas, NASTAR has awards sponsored by companies such as Pepsi Cola, Bonnie Bell, Schlitz, and Doral. Dale won the Doral award for the Rocky Mountain Region, lowering his handicap from 49 to 28 while competing in Purgatory, and receiving an orange windshirt with a NASTAR patch and a plaque. Doral presents this award each week to the racer who has shown the greatest improvement in his or her handicap within the respective five regions which comprise NASTAR across the country.

Dale began skiing approximately 20 years ago in Germany where he was living with his parents. His first boots were low-cut ankle toppers made of leather. When Dale returned to the United States, he skied mostly in Seven Springs outside of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. There he purchased his second pair of wooden skis, but this time with safety bindings. He also purchased his first high top skiing boots. Having run the gamut of ski equipment, Dale really appreciates good equipment. He recommends Killy's book for good advice on racing and buying equipment.

During his years of skiing, Dale has never broken a bone which he attributes to always skiing in control. He has skied a wide variety of areas, including Vail, Aspen, Purgatory, Winter Park, Ruidoso, Santa Fe Basin, and the five areas at Salt Lake. Alta near Salt Lake impressed him the most. He describes the powder in Alta as the most gorgeous snow he has ever seen.

Dale has been a member of SCSC for five years. This year he will be the trip chairman for the Taos trip in February. He and his wife Carolyn live at the West Point apartments. Professionally Dale has a practice in general Dentistry on Weslayan. His lowest paid employee is a bright yellow parakeet named Pretty Boy, who works for bird seed. From his cage in the waiting room, Pretty Boy offers prospective patients assorted bits of dental advice such as "Brush Your Teeth".
