



SKI TIPS By ED WILLIAMS Certified RMSIA and PSIA

Now that the ski season is over, it is time to think about protecting your equipment for next season. If you have leather boots, be sure and put them in storage in a boot tree so they will not warp and lose their shape. Skis should be checked for nicks and holes in the bottoms and filled. The edges should be checked to make sure they have not separated from the edge of the ski. Check and see if there is any delamination of the layers of metal or plastic in the ski. Check the flex of the front and back of the ski to see if there has been any break in the ski.

Store the ski in a dry and cool (room temperature) place. Place them bottom to bottom, strapping them together with a rubber ski strap. Kiss the bindings gently for releasing each time you needed them and put the skis away for next year.

Plastic boots should also be checked inside and out to see if any cracks have developed. If you have the foam filled or flow filled boots, make sure you are not losing some of the material from any cracks. Guarantees in both boots and skis often run out in a year and you will need to discover any problems before your guarantee runs out.

It has been a good year for skiing. It has really been a pleasure teaching Space City Members how to ski, both on the ramp and on the slopes, because they are all eager to learn. In thinking about next ski season, my advice is to get in shape, take lessons from a certified instructor, buy or rent good equipment, and ski within your ability.

On the night of February 17, 70 Space City Skiers were joined by 51 Austin Skiers and 11 Sno-Mad Skiers from Dallas to begin a fabulous 11-day adventure on the Continent, the first such trip run under the auspices of the Texas Ski Council. The 10-hour flight to Paris seemed much shorter, as no one had trouble napping after

the wine and liquor flowed and we partook of the delicious Air France cuisine. After a brief lay-over in Paris, a short flight to Geneva and a 2-hour bus ride into the French Alps brought us to our destination: Chamonix-Argentiere, site of Europe's highest mountain peak, the enormous, imposing 15,781-foot Mont Blanc, After checking into our condominium apartments at the Grand Roc in Argentiere that Friday night, most everyone was ready for a visit from Le Sandman. However, a few of the hardier souls (including the Trip Chairman) managed to locate a little French discotheque in town to carry on into the wee hours.

Fresh snow greeted us the following day, and the next week was spent skiing the many areas spread out along the length of the 10-mile Chamonix Valley . . . Les Houches, Les Grand Montets, La Flegere, Le Brevent, and Le Tour . . . at the same time enoying the magnificent rugged beauty of the Alps. Unfortunately, the 12-mile long Vallee Blanche glacier run was closed, but the view from the top of the Aiguille du Midi cable-car lift (highest in the world), which serves this run, was breathtaking!

The Get-Acquainted Party Saturday night accomplished just that . . with the help of unlimited quantities of wine . . . and many new friendships were formed between members of Space City and those from Austin and the Dallas Sno-Mads. Other nights were spent dining superbly in the many fine restaurants of Chamonix and Argentiere, dancing in the often unusual and always crowded discotheques, and gambling in the Casino (which also boasts anexcellent restaurant . . their orchestra that plays dinner music now knows "Edelweiss", thanks to Jay Castille.)

One of the highlights of the week was a day-long sightseeing trip by mountain-train and bus to the Valais (Valley) of Switzerland, which was carved out by the glacier of the River Rhone. This side tour, organized and personally conducted by Assistant Trip Chairman, Willi Schaufelbuhl (who comes from Switzerland), took in some spectacular scenery including the Swiss Alps, centuries-old ruins and castles, quaint Swiss villages, and vine-covered wine mountains. The trip was culminated at a rustic chalet restaurant high atop a mountain peak, where we were treated to typical Swiss dishes -cheese fondue and raclette (delicious!) ... and bountiful quantities of Fendant wine, which is made in the Valais. A Folkloric dance group performed for our entertainment. We returned to Chamonix that evening, a bit richer from having met a new country, a new culture and people.

Our one Space City skiing casualty, Barbara Masor, found the French doctor in Argentiere who put the cast on her leg to be **most friendly**, with unusual anesthesia techniques. One thing is, Barbara learned upon returning to Houston that her ankle was **not** broken, only badly sprained. Oh well, we all make mistakes!

After a farewell wine party Thursday night and, for some, a final go at the Chamonix slopes the next day, we departed for Geneva. Our Friday and Saturday nights in Geneva were particularly enjoyable as a result of Willi and his Swiss friends' knowledge and advice on the local restaurants and their specialties. Saturday provided a good opportunity to sightsee and shop in Geneva -- particularly for Swiss watches and clocks -- by bicycle, car, or on foot. Those pastry shops with the seemingly unlimited variety of Swiss chocolates seemed to turn up on every street to tempt one.

On Sunday, we flew to Paris, arriving in time for an afternoon tour of the city before going to our hotel. A night on the town was stretched far into the early morning. Only a few hours sleep and (groan) it was time to get up to catch our Monday morning Air France flight home. And so, it was back to Houston and reality. . our delightful European adventure had ended.
