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

Yacht Club was better than ever.


Next . . . don't forget the




3 Months at Sea - The Beard

underwater exploring with scuba

(or Sharks I Have Known and Loved)

Man's dream of flying probably began when ancient man watched birds glide easily overhead. Man's dream of skiing most certainly began when he saw a Tibetan Snow Lizard paralleling happily down the slopes; and while he watched the fish, he began dreaming about joining those finned critters and exploring the underwater world. (Or could it be that tucked away subconsciously in our Ids is the faint memory of man's evolutionary process in the "good old days" before our ancestors crawled out of the sea and developed lungs?)

For centuries man has been using various types of diving gear . . . all receiving air from the surface via a hose . . . and all clumsy as Hell. The first "self-contained underwater breathing apparatus" (alias, "SCUBA") was developed in 1825 by William Jones who designed a cylindrical iron belt which was a reservoir for compressed air. In modern Scuba equipment, compressed air flows to your mouth from a metal tank worn on your back, through a hose and regulator which releases air only when you inhale. (Gone is the clumsy steel diving helmet that John Wayne or Tyrone Power wore to fight larger-than-life octopi in the late, late shows.)

Today's scuba diver, like Flipper's friends, wears a mask for underwater seeing, rubber fins for more kicking power, a weighted belt, and in cold water, a "wet suit" for warmth. Enough said about Scuba equipment. Too much emphasis is placed on the gear — The sport is Scuba Diving is not in playing with the equipment, but rather in the underwater exploration which the gear makes possible.


The area along the continental shelves available for exploration by Scuba Divers is approximately as large as North America, but the most pleasant diving is in warm water; such as the Bahamas, off Florida, or the Aga Khan's Sicily Dream, which is extremely clear and contains

Coral. Coral is forms of thousands of shells of living and dead polps, and is many different shapes and beautiful colors. The coral reef, affording protection to fish and other sea life, becomes the center of an active under-sea scene which could be a Walt Disney creation or Cousteau exploration. Seeing it in person is several times more exciting than seeing it on film. The variety of sizes, shapes and colors seem unlimited, and the "other world" feeling is intensified by the sensation of weightlessness, and the distortions of sight and sound which occur underwater. The refraction of light by water causes things

to seem larger; colors change toward green and blue as you go deeper; and sound travels faster underwater. Underwater sounds will all be strange to you. Background sounds of wind, birds, etc. are gone; instead you hear the fish and ocean sounds . . . and sounds of yourself sucking air from the tank and blowing bubbles when exhaling.

My special area for diving is the beautiful unspoiled coral reef extending from the lower side of the Yucatan, past British Honduras and Guatemala to Honduras . . . the second largest coral reef in the world (Australia claims the largest). I have found the diving excellent off the Bahama islands. The Scuba devotee will find the water off Hawaii is clear and fairly warm, but the reef fish seem small and the coral disappointingly sparse; not as great as the other areas. I only know of one spot in the Gulf of Mexico where coral grows; the Flower Gardens out from Galveston.

I'm not sure why underwater exploration is a sport which appeals to the same people who love skiing but it combines well as a second sport. The seasons don't conflict and diving keeps you in shape. Several Houston shops offer qualified Scuba instruction, including J. Rich, Ltd. and Scuba, Inc.
