### SKI TIPS By Ed Williams Certified PSIA & RMSIA

There have been a number of new developments in teaching techniques in the past two years. This past season many ski schools have adopted these techniques into their programs.


Those of you who took instructions from one of these progressive schools probably heard the instructor talk about <u>carving</u> <u>turns</u>. The reason for the new techniques is due basically to the recent developments in equipment, mostly boots. Of course there has been a lot of progress made in the design of the ski also.

The trend in boots for the intermediate and advanced skier is a non-hinged heel. Most of them are made of epoxy or fiber glass materials or a combination of leather and epoxy. These boots have caused a new term to appear in the basic principles of skiing. The term is Leverage Leverage has replaced a term in American Technique previously called forward lean. Leverage is applied by pressing either forward or backward on the ski to apply increased friction on the front or tails of the ski.

If the ski is properly edged and leverage is applied to the front of the ski the ski will carve a turn. There are no other forces applied such as heel thrust or counter rotation to initiate the turn. If you are in the intermediate stage and ready to advance your skiing techniques it would pay to consider a new boot. If you have a boot with a hinged heel you will find it most difficult to apply the proper leverage for carving turns.

## IT'S DRY LAND SKI SCHOOL TIME!

The SPACE CITY SKI CLUB is proud to announce its Dry Land Ski School will start November 18. The first class is primarily for the beginners of the Aspen Christmas Trip. (J. Rich Sports – Village)

We plan to have other sessions during the season. We need to know how many of you are interested in attending these classes. If there is enough interest we will also have classes for those of intermediate and above level skiers.

The beginners classes will consist of equipment orientation, safety and basic ski techniques. The technique taught is the American Technique with the recent modifications adopted by the Rocky Mountain Ski Instructors Association.

The intermediate and above classes will consist of a history of skiing techniques and equipment and the modern technique of intermediate and advanced skiing. We will help you understand why your skis react the way they do and give you ideas to improve your skiing.

The beginners classes will be designed to help you understand what your instructor will be expecting of you in your first days of classes on the slopes.

The intermediate and above classes will give you a better knowledge of the principles involved. This should even appeal to the skier who will not take lessons for fear it will change the style he has already learned.

The classes will be taught by Ed Williams, a member of the Professional Ski Instructors Association. He is a senior Instructor at Taos Ski School
