Following a smooth flight and a short bus ride, we were rewarded with our first spectacular views of Lake Tahoe. Heavenly received record snowfalls this season, so there was plenty of it for everyone to enjoy. Bright sunshine, gorgeous blue skies, and warm spring skiing temperatures greeted our skiers Sunday for the first full day of skiing.
